## MoDOT drops I-70 bridge into Missouri River

The old steel Interstate 70 bridge crossing the Missouri River at Rocheport is no more. Crews detonated charges Sunday morning, dropping the truss of the 63-year-old bridge into the river.

Interstate traffic was halted prior to the scheduled demolition and resumed once crews cleared debris and inspected the new bridge, which was opened in July.

The blast was scheduled to take place around 7:30 a.m. but was delayed due to fog.

A 2,000-foot perimeter around the bridge was closed, including portions of the Katy Trail and the Missouri River. But that didn't stop spectators from watching the demolition from river access areas. The Les Bourgeois Bistro and A-Frame Winegarden along the

Missouri River bluffs in Rocheport opened at 7 a.m. for onlookers.

The detonation dropped 1,100 feet of truss, including 6 million pounds of steel, into the Missouri River. The demolition team was tasked with removing the pieces of the truss from the river within 24 hours of the blast in order to reopen the river channel to boat and barge traffic.

The old continuous two-span subdivided truss bridge over the Missouri River and the Katy Trail connected Boone and Cooper counties, spanning 3,018 feet. It was constructed in 1960 and underwent extensive rehabilitation in 1993.

The demolition invokes memories from 25 years ago when MoDOT performed a similar

detonation of the Missouri River Bridge between Howard County and Boonville.

According to the Missouri Department of Transportation (MoDOT), the bridge carried 34,000 vehicles and 8,227 commercial vehicles daily. The 2015 State Freight Plan estimates between 31 and 46 million tons of freight moves through this corridor valued at slightly less than \$100 billion.

In 2011, nearly 600 million tons of pass-through freight moved through, making up nearly 59 percent of the total tonnage of goods moving through the state. Almost 40 percent of the pass-through freight moves by truck, primarily on the interstate system. Current projections indicate that

the pass-through traffic will increase in the future, reinforcing the role of Missouri as a Freight Connector State.

MoDOT said the old Rocheport Bridge had reached the end of its useful life and was deemed in need of significant rehabilitation that would have required restricting I-70 traffic to one lane in each direction for an extended period of time, potentially causing hours of backups. This rehab would have only extended the useful life of the bridge by about 10 years.

The new bridge was designed with a life span of 100 years. MoDOT says it is constructed with safety enhancements that will help to reduce crashes. It will also provide twice the width of the old bridge, allowing for the expansion

of Interstate 70.

Other innovative enhancements on the new bridge include a high friction surface treatment and pavement sensors to reduce weather-related incidents, wet reflective striping, and a linear delineation system (a line of reflective signs along the barrier wall) to help make the lanes and the bridge more visible.

In addition to the state's focus on bridges, Missouri is currently expanding I-70 to six lanes (three heading west and three heading east) across the entire state. Governor Mike Parson signed the nearly \$3 billion bill last month in hopes to relieve traffic congestion along a 200-mile stretch of I-70 between St. Charles and Blue Springs.

## Remedy owners buy Miknan's building

Fayette has a new restaurant coming to town. The owners of Remedy have purchased a building on the east side of the Fayette square that, for the last decade, housed Miknan's Main Street Pub.

Miknan's shuttered in late May.

The new eatery will be called TJ's Diner and Bar after owners Tristan Head and Jill Sunderland, and will serve as a diner for breakfast and lunch and a restaurant and bar in the evenings.

TJ's is expected to open in early October. Consequently, Remedy will close its doors just days after it celebrates its one-year anniversary. Head said that some of the menu items from Remedy will make their way over to TJ's.

Further details about the new restaurant will be published when they are announced later this month.

Needing Letters of Support for Pool Grant

To the Editor:

The Fayette Historic Preservation Commission with assistance from the Friends of Historic Fayette Memorial Pool are reapplying for a Land Water Conservation Fund Grant through the Department of Natural Resources for the renovation and upgrade of the Fayette Swimming Pool/World War I Memorial.

Last year we applied for the LWCF Grant for the Fayette Swimming Pool. Unfortunately, we did not receive the grant. There were 51 grant applications submitted and only 10 were chosen.

The City of Fayette has given us approval to reapply for the grant this year. Our focus again will be the renovation of two restrooms in the back of the pool to ADA compliance for public use and

upgrades to electricity. Depending on the cost of these items, we hope to be able to address other items of improvement such as new windows. This will provide patrons of the splash pad, baseball field and the park in general accessible bathroom facilities. The maximum amount that we can apply for this year is \$500,000. The grant requires a 50% match; 75% of the match must be secured for us to apply.

As you may know our pool, an art deco designed by Lansing, Michigan civil engineer Wesley Bintz, opened on July 4, 1936. The design of the pool is unique as it is an above ground. The pool was built with money from a Works Progress Administration project funds, as well as City of Fayette and State of Missouri funds. Mr. Bintz designed many pools

throughout the United States but unfortunately not many are still in working condition or even still stand. Our pool is listed on the National Historic Registry and is designated as a Local Landmark.

We are asking for your support for the new grant application. As the pool is Howard County's WWI Memorial, your support will be invaluable.

We are needing letters of support and donations/pledges that could be included in our grant proposal. Please send your letter by October 31, 2023.

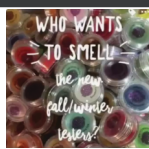

### RON McMILLAN

1947 – 2023



Ron McMillan, age 75, of Columbia, passed away on September 8, 2023, at the Harry S Truman Memorial VA Hospital.

Visitation will be held on Wednesday, September 13, from 5 until 7 p.m. at Memorial Funeral Home in Columbia. Funeral services will begin at 11:30 a.m. on Thursday, September 14, also at Memorial Funeral Home. Interment with full military honors will follow at 2 p.m. at Jacksonville Veterans Cemetery in Jacksonville, Missouri.

Ron was born to Charles "Dude" and Marjorie (Crews) McMillan on October 30, 1947, in Fayette, Missouri. After graduating from Fayette High School, Ron completed three tours in Vietnam with the Army First Calvary. He achieved the rank of Staff Sergeant and received multiple commendations. Ron was always proud of his service and remained an advocate for veterans throughout his life as a member of the American Legion Post 202, serving as Commander of the American Legion Riders and Honor Guard and an Honor Flight escort. He also rode in Run For The Wall, an annual nationwide motorcycle ride to honor veterans, POWs, and those MIA. Ron rode once from Missouri to Washington, DC, and again from Missouri to California, then all the way to Washington, DC, and back home.

After meeting through mutual friends, Ron and Velma Suiter were united in marriage on August 12, 1972. From this union, two children were born: Lisa and Patrick. Although he had many jobs throughout his life, being a dad was always his favorite. He loved taking family trips and

refereeing between the kids' sports games. Even after the kids grew up, Ron maintained his involvement with local sports for many years, especially as an umpire for baseball and softball and as past President and board member of the Diamond Council. Of course, it was a family affair. He and Lisa created many memories working fast-pitch softball tournaments together.

Family ties were always a constant for Ron. He joined his father in running Mac's bar in Fayette. He later opened his own restaurant outside Fayette, Ron's Smokehouse. He loved to smoke foods and passed his enthusiasm on to his own son, Patrick. When Lisa's son Henry came on the scene, Ron was thrilled to have a new buddy to take trips with. As Ron's health began to fade, he decided to take two "Bucket List" vacations with the whole family: one to South Dakota and another to the Smoky Mountains. He simply refused to stop living life on his terms.

Ron is survived by his wife, Velma McMillan, of Columbia; daughter, Lisa Dolliver and grandson, Henry Dolliver, of Columbia; and son, Patrick (Melanie) McMillan, of Houston, Texas. He also leaves behind three siblings: Dana (Gus) Jacob, of Overland Park, Kansas; Brian (Peggy) McMillan, of Fayette; Laurie (Tim) Regan, of O'Fallon, Missouri; and a brother-in-law, Larry (Doris) Suiter, of Blue Springs, Missouri, as well as his mother-in-law, Christine Howard, of Boonville, Missouri. 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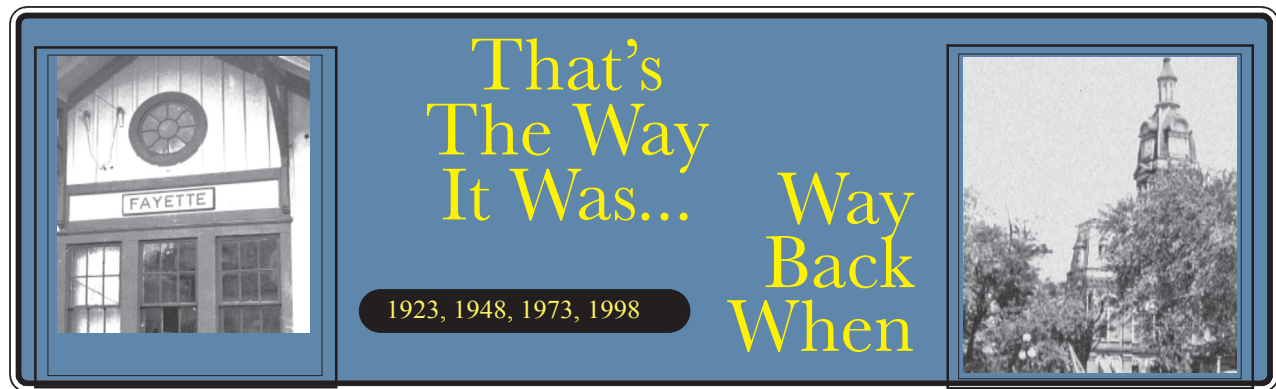
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### 100 Years Ago

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## Falcons block last-second field goal to win thrilling L&C opener

**Junior DL Jacob Wood blocked kick as time expired**

The Fayette Falcons won a last-second thriller over Scotland County, 36-35, Friday night at home after junior Jacob Wood blocked the go-ahead field goal as time expired in the fourth quarter.

After giving up a two-touchdown halftime lead, the Falcons went up by one point late in the fourth quarter. But Scotland County drove all the way to the Falcon 10-yard line on its next possession. With just 4.7 ticks left on the clock, Scotland County set up for the field goal on second down. If good, the Tigers would march off the field with a two-point victory. That's when Wood got a hand on the ball to block the kick and preserve the heart-stopping victory for the Falcons.

The home stands erupted, and the Falcon sideline jumped for joy as the game clock read all zeros with the score Fayette 36, Visitors 35.

"We sent two or three people through the gap and told them to blow it up," said Fayette coach Kole Hinton.

The Falcons called a timeout before the field goal attempt with the hopes of freezing the kicker.

"We prepared for it. He'd been on the money all night, so I didn't think they'd try to go for anything else," Hinton said. "The big thing was understanding that we had to block it."

The play came at the end of a rough second half for the Falcons, who led 28-14 at halftime. Scotland County turned the tables on Fayette in the third quarter. After taking over at midfield for their second drive of the half, Tigers freshman quarterback Dane Blessing connected with senior Elias Hatfield on a long pass play to the Fayette 22-yard line. Two plays later, Hatfield ran for a five-yard touchdown. The point-after-kick was good, bringing Scotland County within one touchdown.

The Tigers struck again on their next drive, which started on the Fayette 38 after Hatfield intercepted a pass from Fayette quarterback Kaleb Friebe. Moments later, Blessing hit junior Vince Dale for a touchdown pass. Once again, the kick was good, tying the game at 28-28.

Scotland County then took the lead halfway through the

fourth quarter on a 1-yard run by Hatfield to go up 35-28.

"They made some adjustments, finding where our weak spots were," Hinton said about the second-half turnaround. "We still had a few mental errors. They just don't show up until people highlight it like they did. In the first half, we were able to get away with it."

"Offensively, we just kept shooting ourselves in the foot. That was just them wanting it more than we did. We ran the same stuff in the second half that we did in the first."

With time slipping away, Fayette had only one more chance to score. The Falcons inched their way downfield. On third-and-seven, with 1:55 left on the clock, Friebe hit junior running back Micah Estes on a pass to the SC 13-yard line to give Fayette a fresh set of downs within striking distance. Two plays later, sophomore powerhouse Carter Vroman blasted the ball across the endzone from two yards out to bring his team within one point of the lead with 42.3 seconds left.

With the game on the line, Hinton called a timeout to set up the play for the two-point conversion. The play would be a pass to tall sophomore wide receiver Payton Oeth.

"I'm always a guy that wants to go for it," Hinton said. "It still looked a little shaky because they'd been

trailing him all night. I told him we were going to throw it up, and he was going to go get it. And he got it."

Friebe took the snap, rolled out to his left, and slung the ball to Oeth in the corner of the endzone.

"We pulled Payton to the left, trying to sneak him through traffic," Friebe recalled after the game. "He found the gap. The safety was on him, so I had to find a place to put the ball where the safety couldn't get it. Payton put a heck of a catch on it."

The successful conversion gave the Falcons a one-point lead with 42.3 seconds remaining.

"The only thing I was really thinking was, 'Don't

drop this,'" recalled Oeth after the game. "He threw it, and I was kind of covered. It was a dime from Kaleb Friebe. He just placed it perfectly. You couldn't ask for a better play."

The game appeared to be well in hand for Fayette. But a big kickoff return by Scotland County freshman Beau Triplett to the Fayette 34-yard line gave the Tigers a final chance. SC inched its way to the 10-yard line before finally setting up for the ill-fated field goal with 4.7 seconds left.

The Falcons ended the game with 430 total yards of offense. Vroman ran for 220 of the team's 302 rushing yards on 16 carries with three touchdowns on the ground.

Estes picked up 67 yards on 14 carries. Friebe ran the ball seven times for 28 yards.

In the air, Friebe finished 8-for-17 for 119 yards, two touchdowns, and an interception. Oeth led the receiving game with five grabs for 90 yards, two touchdowns, and the winning two-point conversion.

"He doesn't realize how talented and good he really is. And he's so coachable," Hinton said about his sophomore wide receiver. "This is his first time on a varsity field. But he's so talented. He has decent speed, and he can go up and get the ball."

## Claas picks up first win as Bulldogs take down Marceline

The Harrisburg Bulldogs picked up their first win of the season at home Friday, defeating Lewis & Clark Conference powerhouse Marceline, 28-20.

The win was also the first for Bulldogs coach Brennan Claas, who is in his first season as a head coach.

Coach Claas hails from Macon, and friends and family were in the stands to watch his first home game. "It was pretty special," Claas said on Saturday. "It was nice to see everybody. I'm just super proud of the kids."

Friday's win was the second in a row over Marceline. Harrisburg is the defending Lewis & Clark Conference champions, and defeating the Tigers was a good start for the title defense.

Harrisburg struck first with a seven-yard rushing touchdown by sophomore Caleb Sagers midway through the first period.

Sagers scored again in the second quarter, this time on a pass from junior quarterback Trace Combs on a busted play.

"It was a great play by those two to keep it alive," Claas recalled. "[Sagers] made a great catch running across the back of the end zone. Combs kept that play alive. It was a great play by him to roll back to his weak side, turn his hips, and throw an absolutely perfect ball to Sagers in the endzone."

The Bulldogs would build their lead to 22-0 through nearly three quarters. But Marceline found its footing, turning what should have been a disastrous play into a touchdown. After the snap went over the head of the Tigers' quarterback, he picked it up and ran 80 yards for a touchdown to put Marceline on the scoreboard.

"He picked it up and just outran our guys. And then all of a sudden, they got a whole lot of momentum and fed off of that," Claas said.

Trailing 22-6 after three quarters, the Tigers scored twice more in the fourth quarter.

"They found another gear," Claas said. "They changed up their defense, it seemed like, and caught us off guard. They've got some speed, and when they found the edge, we had a hard time containing them."

That's when Harrisburg went back to its bread and butter. Again, it was Sagers. This time from six yards out to give the Bulldogs an eight-point lead it would hold until the final buzzer.

Sagers finished the night with 135 yards rushing on 27 carries with two touchdowns. He also caught three passes for 33 yards and a score.

"He's coming along very nicely," Claas said. "He sees the game better right now than he did at the beginning of the year. He's making some cuts, and he ran hard and broke some tackles and a few third and fourth-down conversions. It was a great game for him, and he had a big smile on his face all night."

Combs had another solid night as he continues to improve at quarterback. The southpaw completed 11 of 15 passes for 167 yards and a touchdown. He also made a diving rushing touchdown in the second quarter to put the Bulldogs in front by two scores.

## Brown, Eagles pick up first win in gritty road game

The Central Methodist football program secured its first win under first-year head coach Dave Brown on Saturday when the Eagles gutted out a 16-11 road victory at Culver-Stockton College.

Coach Brown and the Eagles improve to 1-1 overall, while the Wildcats remain winless at 0-3.

Central opened the scoring with a 33-yard field goal from Oscar Simon in the first quarter. The offensive drive began with a sack and fumble recovery by the CMU defense on the previous possession at the CSC 24-yard line.

Simon added to Central's score with a 25-yard field goal at the 9:41 mark of the third quarter to extend the lead to 13 points. He added Central's final points early in the fourth on a 45-yard field goal make.

The Wildcats found life in the final seven minutes of the game, scoring 11 points over a span of four minutes. Culver scored a touchdown and cashed in on a two-point conversion to get on the board, then followed with a 35-yard field goal to cut Central's lead to five.

Culver would hold Central on the following possession and had an opportunity pull ahead with a score. But the Eagles had the clock advantage. The Wildcats came as close as the CMU 31-yard line before time

expired, preserving the victory for Central.

Cambridge finished the game, completing 18-of-31 passes for 295 yards and a touchdown. Dudley led the receiving corps with five catches for 106 yards and a touchdown. AJ Allen nearly cracked 100 yards, finishing the game with 97 receiving, including a 41-yard catch in the fourth quarter.

Fayette native and Eagle sophomore Garren Vroman led the rushing game with 10 carries for 46 yards, including a long of 18. Cambridge picked up 44 yards on 11 carries. Charles Johnson had 19 carries for 18 yards.

Altogether, Central racked up 409 total yards of offense compared to 372 for Culver.

Simon was a perfect 3-for-3 on his field goal attempt and converted his lone extra-point attempt of the night.

*Historically Yours*  
**Dorothea Lange, documentary photographer**

Just as Mathew Brady was one of the first "photojournalists" during the Civil War, Dorothea Lange was one of the first "documentary photographers" during the Great Depression.

Born on May 26, 1895, in Hoboken, New Jersey, Lange decided on a career in photography before she graduated from high school and without ever owning or using a camera. Her training began at Columbia University and later from informal apprenticeships with several NY photography studios.

Lange and a female friend left New York in 1918 to see the world, but got sidetracked in California when they were robbed. Settling in San Francisco, Lange worked as a 'finisher' in a photographic supply shop. There she met other photographers and an investor who backed her in starting her own portrait studio. This satisfied Lange until the Great Depression. Then she turned her lens toward the street and became known as one of the first "documentary photographers."

Fourteen million people in the US were out of work, many of them homeless. Drought and dust storms added to the havoc in the mid- and southwest. During the 1930s approximately 300,000 men, women, and children migrated west to California. Lange and her camera wandered the highways and byways documenting the extent of the social and economic upheaval of the Depression. Her work led her to one of FDR's New Deal agencies, the Resettlement Administration (RA), which was later renamed the Farm Security Administration (FSA).

Lange's photographs, which were distributed to newspapers across the country, brought the plight of the poor and forgotten to public attention. Her most famous work is Migrant Mother which was taken and published in 1936. It depicts a mother looking off into the distance with two of her children at her sides and an infant in her lap. A black and white print is on display in the Museum of Modern Art in New York City. Dorothea Lange died on October 11, 1965, in San Francisco, at the age of seventy. She was survived by her second husband, two children, three stepchildren, and numerous grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

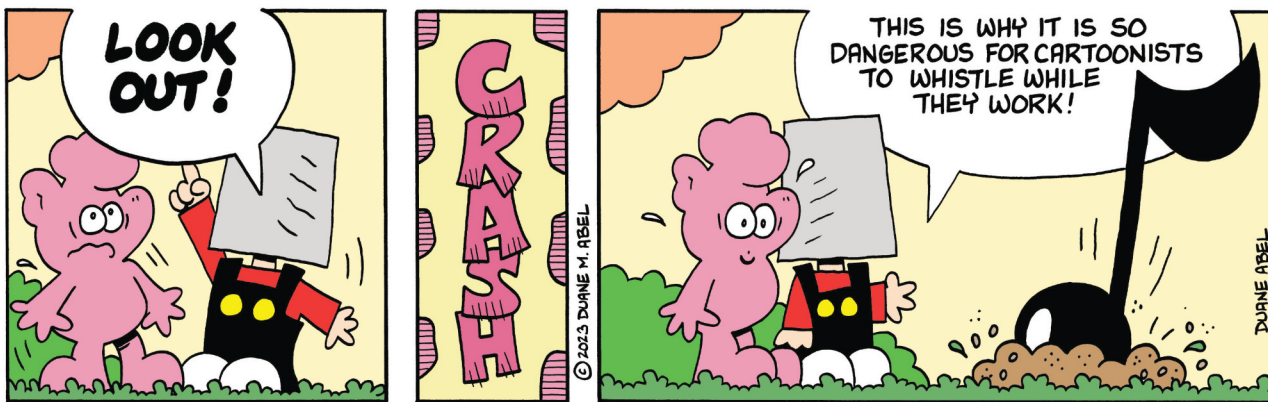

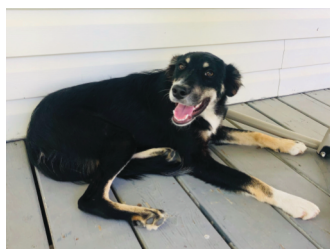
