This special performance will showcase Igor Stravinsky's *A Soldier's Tale*, a theatre work whose initial tour was delayed by the 1918 flu pandemic, mirroring the delay our performance experienced due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Our QCSO @ the Movies series is back with the ever-popular *Harry Potter*<sup>™</sup> Film Concert Series, and Holiday Brass returns with sounds of the season joined by organist Chris Nelson.

# Mark Russell Smith

Music Director & Conductor

Mark Russell Smith returns for his 13th season as Music Director and Conductor of the Quad City Symphony, and continues to demonstrate as a performer, educator and community leader, the consummate musicianship and passionate commitment to the art of music-making that have endeared him to audiences and musicians alike. Since 2008, he has brought a newly focused artistic vision to the organization, and has welcomed YoYo Ma, Midori, Joshua Bell, André Watts, Garrick Ohlsson and other musical luminaires to the Quad City Symphony stage. The orchestra continues to invest in its community, a vision of the utmost importance to Smith and the entire organization. The entire orchestra's commitment to continuing to bring music to its audience throughout the Covid 19 pandemic was widely applauded and further solidified the orchestra's and Smith's roles as cultural leaders in the Quad Cities.

An active music educator, Smith was named Artistic Director of the Greater Twin Cities Youth Symphonies in the fall of 2012 and has served as Artistic Director of Orchestral Activities at the University of Minnesota since 2007. In that role, was the instigating artistic force behind the University of Minnesota School of Music's Britten Peace Project, which combined musical and historical study with community engagement, culminating in critically acclaimed performances of Britten's War *Requiem* in Europe and America, collaborating with German and American music students, professional musicians and the Nobel Peace Prize Forum. In 2016, he spearheaded the St. Matthew Passion project, again joining German and American students with study and performances on both sides of the Atlantic. Recent projects include appearances with the Joffrey Ballet, conducting Stravinsky's *Rite of Spring*, as part of a larger exploration of that work, commemorating its 100th anniversary. Formerly Music Director of the Richmond Symphony Orchestra, a position he held from 1999 to 2009, Smith was praised for his innovative and approachable programming and is widely credited with fostering the orchestra's unprecedented artistic growth. He returned to guest conduct the orchestra in 2019.

As a guest conductor, Smith enjoys a burgeoning international reputation that has already brought him engagements and re-engagements with prestigious American orchestras, including the St. Louis Symphony, the Houston Symphony and the St. Paul Chamber Orchestra. With the Minnesota Orchestra, he made his critically acclaimed Sommerfest debut in 2006 and made his subscription series debut in March of 2009, and returns regularly as a guest conductor. An active opera conductor, he has appeared with the Virginia Opera, leading

Mozart's The Magic Flute to critical acclaim, among many others. Other recent appearances include debut performances with the Orguesta Sinfonica de Costa Rica and the Spokane Symphony, and a return to Verizon Hall with the Curtis Orchestra in an all-Wagner program with Eric Owens and Heidi Melton. He regularly returns to his alma mater to lead the Symphony Orchestra of The Curtis Institute of Music, and led the orchestra on tour in China and Korea in the fall of 2011. Smith's debut at the Nomus Music Festival in Novi Sad, Serbia was met with critical and audience acclaim and led to immediate reengagement. Other recent and upcoming appearances include the Santa Barbara Symphony, Brazil's Orquestra Sinfôniea da USP, the Hartford Symphony, Orquesta Sinfonica de Xalapa, the Phoenix Symphony, the Colorado Symphony, the Eugene Symphony, the Curtis Opera Theatre, the Jacksonville Symphony, the Berkshire Choral Festival, the Eastern Music Festival, the Tulsa Philharmonic, Orchestra London (Ontario), and the European Center for Opera and Vocal Art in Ghent, Belgium.

A champion of the music of our time, Smith was the Director of New Music Projects for the St. Paul Chamber Orchestra, and developed that orchestra's Engine 408 series, working closely with living composers and added his unique perspective to enhance that orchestra's great tradition of fostering new works. He again collaborated with YoYo Ma and members of the Chamber Music Society of Minnesota in Hún Qiáo (Bridge of Souls), a concert of remembrance and reconciliation featuring world premieres by

Korean, Japanese, Chinese and American composers. A firm believer in the use of technical innovation to reach world-wide audiences, he debuted in 2002 with the Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra, conducting the final round of the first Minnesota International Piano-e-Competition, where he led six concerto performances that were streamed live over the Internet. He has led the Minnesota Orchestra in the Competition's final round since 2004 and returns each summer.

Smith grew up in a musical family in Phoenix, Arizona where he began the serious study of conducting while still in his teens. He is a graduate in cello performance of the Juilliard School, where he studied with Claus Adam, and of the Curtis Institute of Music, where he studied conducting with Max Rudolf and Otto-Werner Mueller. While at Curtis, Smith was first prize winner in the National Repertory Orchestra Conductors Competition, and upon graduation, was named Assistant Conductor of the Opera Company of Philadelphia and the Philadelphia Singers. From 1989 to 1994, Smith served as Associate Conductor of the Phoenix Symphony Orchestra and from 1992 through 1999 served as Music Director of the Cheyenne Symphony Orchestra. His dynamic personality, creative programming, and focus on outreach helped revitalize the Springfield (MA) Symphony, where he served as Music Director from 1995 through 2000.

Smith resides in Minneapolis, where his wife, Ellen Dinwiddie Smith, is a horn player with the Minnesota Orchestra. They have two sons, Alexander and Noah.

### Musicians in the Schools

The QCSO maintains a deep connection with local school districts through school presentations and performances featuring QCSO musicians and guest soloists. For more than 50 years, professional musicians have been inspiring thousands through instrument demonstrations, ensemble sectionals, masterclasses, and solo and chamber ensemble performances.

### Group Lesson Program

Launched in 2017 at the Boys & Girls Clubs, the Group Lesson Program (GLP) has expanded this year to include a program with Spring Forward Learning Center in Rock Island. The GLP provides students the opportunity to receive twice-weekly group cello or violin lessons from QCSO instructors. Participants are provided with a new, appropriately sized cello or violin and all the accessories needed to fully engage in music study.

### Symphony Day

Every year, more than 6,000 fourth and fifth grade students are introduced to the symphony orchestra and classical music through an engaging performance by the Quad City Youth Symphony Orchestra. This program is carefully designed to incorporate National Core Arts Standards and each participating classroom is provided a resource guide to expand the students' learning beyond the performance. Since its inception in 1988, more than 150,000 youth have attended the event from approximately 30 school districts and nearly 200 public, private, and home-study classrooms. The 2021 Symphony Day reached 12,000 students from the Quad Cities and beyond.

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# Garrick Ohlsson, piano

Pianist Garrick Ohlsson has established himself worldwide as a musician of magisterial interpretive and technical prowess. Although long regarded as one of the world's leading exponents of the music of Chopin, Mr. Ohlsson commands an enormous repertoire ranging over the entire piano literature and he has come to be noted for his masterly performances of the works of Mozart, Beethoven and Schubert, as well as the Romantic repertoire. To date he has at his command more than 80 concertos, ranging from Haydn and Mozart to works of the 21st century.

In 2018/19 season he launched an ambitious project spread over multiple seasons exploring the complete solo piano works of Brahms in four programs to be heard in New York, San Francisco, Montreal, Los Angeles, London and a number of cities across North America. A frequent guest with the orchestras in Australia, Mr. Ohlsson has recently visited Perth, Brisbane, Melbourne, Sydney, Adelaide and Hobart as well as the New Zealand Symphony in Wellington and Auckland. In February 2020 he accomplished a seven city recital tour across Australia just prior to the closure of the concert world due to COVID-19. Since that time and as a faculty member of San Francisco Conservatory of Music he has been able to contribute to keeping music alive for a number of organizations with live or recorded recital streams including a duo program with Kirill Gerstein with whom he will tour the US in winter 2022. With the reopening of concert activity in the US in summer 2021 he appeared with the Indianapolis and Cleveland orchestras, in recital in San Francisco, Brevard Festival and 4 Brahms recitals at Chicago's Ravinia Festival. The 21/22 season began with the KBS orchestra, Seoul followed by Atlanta, Dallas, Seattle symphonies, BBC Glasgow and European orchestras in Prague, Hamburg, Lyon and St. Petersburg. In recital he can be heard in Los Angeles, Houston, Kansas City as well as Poland, Germany and England.

An avid chamber musician, Mr. Ohlsson has collaborated with the Cleveland, Emerson, Tokyo and Takacs string quartets, including most recently Boston Chamber Players on tour in Europe. Together with violinist Jorja Fleezanis and cellist Michael Grebanier, he is a founding member of the San Francisco-based FOG Trio. Passionate about singing and singers, Mr. Ohlsson has appeared in recital with such legendary artists as Magda Olivero, Jessye Norman, and Ewa Podleś. Mr. Ohlsson can be heard on the Arabesque, RCA Victor Red Seal, Angel, BMG, Delos, Hänssler, Nonesuch, Telarc, Hyperion and Virgin Classics labels.

A native of White Plains, N.Y., Garrick Ohlsson began his piano studies at the age of 8, at the Westchester Conservatory of Music; at 13 he entered The Juilliard School, in New York City. He has been awarded first prizes in the Busoni and Montreal Piano competitions, the Gold Medal at the International Chopin Competition in Warsaw (1970), the Avery Fisher Prize (1994), the University Musical Society Distinguished Artist Award in Ann Arbor, MI (1998), the Jean Gimbel Lane Prize in Piano Performance from the Northwestern University Bienen School of Music (2014), and the Gloria Artis Gold Medal for cultural merit from the Polish Deputy Culture Minister.

# Daniel Won, clarinet

One of Chicago's most sought-after clarinetists, Daniel Won maintains a versatile music career as performer and educator. Daniel has performed with many of Chicago's premier ensembles, including the Chicago Symphony, Grant Park Symphony, Chicago Philharmonic, Chicago Opera Theater, Music of the Baroque, Chicago Sinfonietta, and the Joffrey Ballet. Since 2016, he holds the Lance O. Willett Principal Clarinet Chair of the Quad City Symphony Orchestra in Davenport, Iowa.

In demand as a chamber music collaborator, Daniel has appeared in concerts with the Chicago Symphony's MusicNOW ensemble, Eighth Blackbird, Chicago Chamber Musicians, the Callisto Ensemble, and the University of Chicago Contemporary Chamber Players, and he is a frequent guest artist for the Quad City Symphony's Signature Series. In addition, Daniel has spent the last six summers performing in a chamber setting with Midsummer's Music in Door County, Wisconsin. His chamber and orchestral performances have been featured live on radio stations across the country, including KUSC in Los Angeles, WFMT in Chicago, WVIK in Iowa, WBOI in Indiana, and Wisconsin Public Radio.

Daniel earned a Bachelor of Arts degree from UCLA, and a Master of Music degree and Post-Master's Certificate in Performance from DePaul University. His principal teachers were Larry Combs, John Bruce Yeh, and Gary Gray. In 2013, Daniel was named one of DePaul University's *14 Under 40 Alumni Making a Difference*.

# Benjamin Coelho, bassoon

Benjamin Coelho, Professor of Bassoon, has been at The University of Iowa since 1998. A native from Tatuí. Brazil, Ben started the bassoon at the age of ten at the local conservatory. In the early 1980's he came to the U.S. to study at Purchase College Conservatory of Music, where he received his BFA. He received his Master of Music degree from Manhattan School of Music and did additional graduate work at Indiana University. His bassoon teachers include Clóvis Franco, Donald MacCourt, Arthur Weisberg, and Kim Walker. Ben has appeared as soloist, chamber musician, orchestral musician, teacher, and clinician in many countries on five continents. An enthusiastic proponent of new music,

Ben has commissioned, performed, and recorded works by European, American, and Latin American composers. As a recording artist, he has released seven critically acclaimed CDs garnering praise from numerous national and international media. Ben finds great joy and fulfillment as a teacher and pedagogue. He has been an invited clinician to workshops across the United States and abroad. His students are successful teachers in public schools, private studios, universities, and colleges. They also have been accepted to prestigious graduate programs and summer festivals, as well as positions in symphony orchestras. Ben has played as principal bassoon with



several orchestras in Brazil and the USA. Currently, he is the principal bassoon with the Quad City Symphony Orchestra and is a member of the Voxman Reed Trio. Ben lives in Iowa City, Iowa with his beloved wife Karen and their wonderful daughters Liliana and Julia.



# Matthew Onstad, trumpet

A Wisconsin native, Dr. Matthew Onstad serves on the faculty of the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater, where he teaches applied trumpet, coaches chamber music, performs with the Whitewater Brass Quintet, and teaches World of the Arts. # Michael Cox, trombone

# Tony Oliver, percussion

Tony Oliver is a percussionist and music educator based in the Quad Cities region of Iowa and Illinois. He is a member of the Quad City Symphony Orchestra and recently completed his twenty-first summer as solo percussionist and timpanist for the Lake Placid Sinfonietta, a professional chamber orchestra in the heart of the Adirondack Mountains in upstate New York. As an educator, he coordinates all things percussive at Augustana College in Rock Island, Illinois, teaching courses in classical and contemporary percussion studies and courses for music educators.

He also directs the Augustana Percussion Ensemble and the Augustana Concert Band, which is the college's second, all-campus wind ensemble. Apart from performing and teaching, he is a member of ASCAP as a composer and as a publisher, with his imprint, Curving Walkway Publications, distributing works for percussion near and far. Tony is an artist with Pearl/Adams percussion and holds degrees from the University of Iowa (BM, MA) and the Mason Gross School of the Arts at Rutgers University (DMA), where he was a graduate fellow.

# Naha Greenholtz, violin

Canadian violinist Naha Greenholtz was born in Kyoto, Japan, where she began her violin studies at age three. Since her solo debut at 14, concerto performances have included engagements with the San Francisco Ballet, National Ballet of Canada, and National Repertory Orchestras, as well as the Vancouver, Quad City, Burnaby, and Kelowna Symphonies. In the Madison area she makes regular solo appearances with the Madison Symphony and the Middleton Community Orchestra.

Naha also maintains an active career as an orchestra musician. In addition to her duties as Concertmaster of both the Madison and Quad City Symphony Orchestras, past performance highlights include guest concertmaster appearances with the Oregon, Omaha, and Memphis Symphonies, the San Francisco Ballet, as well as the Calgary and Louisiana Philharmonics, among many others. In recent seasons she has served as guest concertmaster with the Chicago Philharmonic (in collaboration with the English National Ballet) and made her Australian debut in a concertmaster residency with the Australian Ballet in Melbourne. From 2011-2014 she maintained a partnership with the National Ballet of Canada in Toronto, performing and touring frequently with the company as guest concertmaster and soloist. Additionally she has performed often with the Cleveland Orchestra both domestically and abroad. She began her career in 2007-2008 with the Louisiana Philharmonic and later with the Milwaukee Symphony.

Naha has participated in music festivals throughout the US and Europe including Kneisel Hall (Maine), Taos (New Mexico), Spoleto (Italy), Lucerne (Switzerland), Bach Dancing and Dynamite Society (Wisconsin), and the New York String Orchestra Seminar at Carnegie Hall. She is currently on



artist faculty at Renova Music Festival (Newcastle, Pennsylvania) and since 2012 has been Artistic Director of QCSO's *Signature Series*.

Naha studied with Donald Weilerstein and Joel Smirnoff at Juilliard and with William Preucil at CIM. Other teachers have included Andy Dawes, Akira Nagai, and Judith Ingolfsson. She performs on a 1778 Antonio Gragnani violin.



# David Scholl, bass

Double Bassist David Scholl enjoys a career as an active performer and educator. Currently he serves as principal bass of both the Madison and Quad City Symphonies. Previously he has been a member of the Illinois and Dubuque symphonies. Chamber music highlights include: Chicago Symphony's MusicNOW series, University of Chicago's Contempo series, Bach, Dancing, and Dynamite Society, as well as concerts with the Pro Arte and Spektral Quartets. In addition to his private studio, David has served on the faculties of the University of Wisconsin - Madison, Birch Creek Music Center, and the UW Summer Music Clinic.

David earned his BM and MM from Indiana University where he studied with Bruce Bransby. Additional training comes from his time as principal bass of the Civic Orchestra of Chicago, Aspen Music Festival, and Alex Hanna. David lives in Madison, WI with his wife, Ria, a violist, and their two cats.

# Kyle Knox, guest conductor

Over the past two seasons Kyle Knox has assumed the positions of Music Director of the Wisconsin Youth Symphony Orchestras and Associate Conductor of the Madison Symphony Orchestra. His festival credits include Tanglewood, Spoleto (Italy), Santa Fe Chamber Music, and Bowdoin Summer Music Festivals, as well as the New York String Orchestra Seminar. He has recorded for the Koch and Naxos labels and has been featured numerous times on NPR's *Performance Today*.

Kyle has premiered works by Osvaldo Golijov, Tan Dun, Sean Shepherd, and Huang Ruo among many others. Nico Muhly's chamber work *Service Music* (2004) was written for and dedicated to him. His debut album, a recording of Conrad Susa's chamber opera *Transformations* (the work's world



premiere recording) will be released soon.





# Courtney Lyon, artistic director

Courtney Lyon has been creating choreographic works for Ballet Ouad Cities as Artistic Director since 2009. Notable works include Dumbarton Oaks, Alice in Wonderland, Billy the Kid, The Firebird, Romeo + Juliet, The Promise of Living, and Rite of Spring with Orchestra Iowa. Recent choreographic debuts include "For America" in the spring of 2021, "Paris en Pointe," which premiered in conjunction with the Figge Art Museum's "French Moderns: Monet to Matisse, 1850-1950" and "Glassworks" premiering in February 2019 inspired by the "Louis Comfort Tiffany: Treasures from the Dreihaus Collection." In April of 2018, Lyon's Dance "Four" Piano, commissioned by Orchestra Iowa, was performed alongside Grammy-winning pianist Emanuel Ax at the Golden Key Gala in Cedar Rapids, IA. In 2016, Ms. Lyon took inspiration from Gary Kelley's book "The Dark Fiddler" and the music of Paganini' Caprice 24 for a special performance at the Figge Art Museum. Her Bolero set to Ravel's piano arrangement for four hands, was invited to close the 2015 Crème de La Crème at the Gallagher Bluedorn, can be seen on Iowa Public Television's Love Stories, and has been a much

requested encore performance. Other full-length ballets *The Nutcracker*, *Cinderella*, and *Romeo* + *Juliet* have appeared on Iowa Public Television, with *The Nutcracker* receiving the 2014 Argpatch award for Best Live Action in Entertainment.

Ms. Lyon has created curriculum and content for BQC's community outreach programs including The Ugly Duckling: A Message of Acceptance Told Through Dance, Dance Me a Story; Exploring Literature Through Ballet, The *Nutcracker* and the DREAMS program. As a principal faculty member of BQC School of Dance, she has created and implemented a comprehensive syllabus for beginning through preprofessional ballet students. To support her teaching of classical ballet technique, Ms. Lyon has completed two pedagogue courses that involved study of the 1st through 5th years of the Vaganova syllabus with John White, an authority of the Vaganova teaching method and former dancer and Ballet master of the National Ballet of Cuba, as well as intensive training exploring the bio-mechanics of movement with physicist Kenneth Laws and master coach Arleen



Sugano. She attended the Central Pennsylvania Youth Ballet's Teacher Intensive workshop with Marcia Daly Weary and has participated numerous times as a choreographer for the Glenda Brown Choreography Project. She is a requested keynote speaker for civic groups throughout the Quad Cities area, has been a guest speaker on several local arts related radio programs and podcasts, and has been invited to sit on area grant panels. Ms. Lyon is a recipient of an Iowa Arts & Cultural Emergency Relief Grant for an individual artist.



# Nicholas Bartolotti





# Jillian Van Cura




Zyla has been a featured performer in both the QCSO's Masterworks and Signature Series programs. He was a featured soloist with the 2009 American Wind Symphony Orchestra, performing the world premiere of Kaoru Wada's Toone for Horn and Wind Orchestra. In 2019, Zyla made his New York City solo debut as a part of the International Computer Music Conference where he performed Russell Pinkston's *Zylamander* for horn and Max/MSP.

As a chamber musician, Zyla has performed with the S.A.T.B. Trio, Quad City Symphony Brass Quintet, Illinois Brass Quintet, the Pittsburgh Brass Project, and the Looking Glass Wind Quintet at the Banff Chamber Music Festival. Zyla is a founding member and was featured on the 2021 recording of Alpine Symphony Revisited by the Horns of the Heartland (HOTH) ensemble. Zyla feels most at home in the symphony orchestra and is grateful to have served as principal horn of the Champaign Urbana Symphony Orchestra and the Evansville Philharmonic Orchestra. He has also performed with ensembles such as Lyric Opera of Chicago, Omaha Symphony Orchestra, Illinois Symphony Orchestra, Grant Park Music Festival Orchestra, West Virginia Symphony, Peoria Symphony, and the Heartland Festival Orchestra. Internationally, he has performed as principal horn of the Philhamonie der Nationen (DE) and the Orquesta Filarmonica de Jalisco (MX).

During the COVID-19 pandemic Zyla launched, "Because...", a bi-weekly podcast based on a children's book by Mo Willems in which Zyla serves as the host and producer.

Mr. Zyla earned a bachelor's degree in Musical Arts from West Virginia University, a master's degree in Horn Performance from Carnegie Mellon University, and has completed doctoral course work in Horn Performance and Literature at the University of Illinois. His teachers include William Caballero, Thomas Jostlein, Bernhard Scully, Robert Lauver, Virginia Thompson, C. Scott Smith and Luke Zyla. Zyla is a teaching artist in the QCSO Private Lesson Program (PLP) and serves on the faculty of St. Ambrose University and Augustana College. Prior to moving to the Quad Cities full time, Zyla was the Consortium Instructor of Horn the University of Evansville. He has been a guest clinician and teacher at the University of Illinois, Illinois Wesleyan University, Southern Illinois University, and Eastern Illinois University.

Away from the QCSO, Marc resides in the Rock Island, IL with his wife, Rachel Price, and their team of rescued cats and dogs.



# Karim Sulayman, tenor

Lebanese-American tenor Karim Sulayman has garnered international attention as a sophisticated and versatile artist, consistently praised for his sensitive and intelligent musicianship, riveting stage presence, and beautiful voice. The 2019 Best Classical Solo Vocal GRAMMY® Award winner, he continues to earn acclaim for his programming and recording projects, while regularly performing on the world's stages in opera, orchestral concerts, recital, and chamber music.


Emerging from the music industry's devastation by Covid-19, Karim resumed live performances in June 2021 with Britten-Pears Arts at Snape Maltings in the UK in chamber music of Hahn and Vaughan Williams with the Kaleidoscope Chamber Collective. In July 2021 he reprises his performances of Frank London's Ghetto Songs on tour in Germany, and he appears with Alarm Will Sound premiering Part I of David T. Little's monodrama What Belongs to You, based on Garth Greenwell's acclaimed novel, which is set to premiere in its entirety in 2023. He continues the 2021-22 season with his role debut of Prologue/Peter Quint in Laine Rettmer's new multimedia production of Britten's The Turn of the Screw in Miami. He brings his acclaimed interpretation of Handel's Messiah to Winston-Salem Symphony, and returns later in the season for Haydn's Creation, and a filmed program highlighting the intersection of Latin, Spanish and Arabic music for CAP-UCLA's Tune In Festival. He makes his Carnegie Hall solo recital debut in his original program of Schubert songs, Where Only Stars Can Hear Us.

Recently Mr. Sulayman debuted at Stockholm's Drottningholms Slottsteater creating the role of Claudio Monteverdi in the world premiere of Syskonen i Mantua, a pasticcio of Italian Baroque music with new music composed by Andreas Edlund and Djuro Zivkovic. He also created the role of Albert for the world premiere of Laura Kaminsky's Some Light Emerges at Houston Grand Opera. Recent seasons have also featured major role debuts in operas of Monteverdi: Nerone in Florentine Opera's new production of L'incoronazione di *Poppea*, the title role in *L'Orfeo* in a USA national tour with Apollo's Fire staged by Sophie Daneman, and Testo in II combattimento di Tancredi e Clorinda with the Australian Brandenburg Orchestra staged by Constantine Costi.

Sulayman's thought provoking programming is highlighted in his growing discography which includes his GRAMMY® Award winning debut solo album, Songs of Orpheus, which was released to international acclaim on the AVIE label. Named "Critic's Choice" by Opera News, and praised for his "lucid, velvety tenor and pop-star charisma" by BBC Music Magazine. His second solo album, Where Only Stars Can Hear Us, an album of Schubert Lieder with fortepianist Yi-heng Yang was released on AVIE in March 2020 and debuted at #1 on the Billboard Traditional Classical Chart and has received widespread critical acclaim, including being named once again as "Critic's Choice" by Opera News, and included on the New York Times' "Best Classical Music of 2020."

In other visual media, he is featured in the ARTE documentary *Leonard Bernstein – A Genius Divided*, which premiered throughout Europe in the summer of 2018 and was subsequently released on DVD. His performance of Bernstein's *Mass* with the CSO was broadcast on PBS Great Performances and he appeared on the second season of the acclaimed series *Dickinson* on Apple TV+.

Prior to his return to Iowa, he served as Minister of Music and Organist at First Presbyterian Church in Fort Wayne, Indiana.

Mr. Nelson earned his Bachelor's

degree at Bethany College, Lindsborg, Kansas, and his Master of Sacred Music Degree at Luther Seminary in St. Paul, Minnesota in conjunction with St. Olaf College in Northfield, MN. His teachers include Cathy Rodland, John Ferguson, David Cherwein, Jesse Eschbach, Pamela Ruiter-Feenstra and Sharon Hettinger and his conducting instructors include Anton Armstrong, Robert Scholz, Greg Aune, and Joel Panciera.

Mr. Nelson has presented workshops on service playing and improvisation

for the American Guild of Organists, and has led hymn festivals for the Association of Lutheran Church Musicians regional conference. He has performed solo recitals and accompanied choirs throughout the United States and Canada. Locally, he has performed with the Nova Singers and the Big River Brass Band. Outside of his responsibilities at St. Paul Lutheran Church and Augustana College, you might see him out running on the bike path or any of our local trails.

### Andrew Parker, oboe

Dr. Andrew Parker is currently Associate Professor of Oboe at the Butler School of Music. Previously he was Assistant Professor of Oboe at the University of Iowa. Andrew has provided master classes throughout the country and beyond at such institutions as the Royal College of Music in London, University of Michigan, Temple University, Rice University, the University of Florida, the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, Luther College, Mannes Preparatory Division, and the University of Virginia to name a few. He has been the guest artist at several double reed events around the country and has performed at numerous International Double Reed Society conventions. He also served as an adjudicator for the National Youth Orchestra, hosted by Carnegie Hall and the Gillet-Fox International Oboe Competition.

Andrew maintains a rich career as an orchestral musician, soloist, and chamber player in addition to his experience as a teacher. He has appeared as a guest soloist with the Quad City Symphony, the Great Falls Symphony, The Puerto Rico Philharmonic, and the University of Texas Symphony Orchestra. He has also played in many orchestras in North America, including the National Arts Centre Orchestra, the Florida Orchestra, the Fort Wayne Philharmonic, the Richmond Symphony, the Ann Arbor Symphony, the Flint Symphony, the New Mexico Symphony, the Santa Fe Symphony, the Great Falls Symphony, and the Plymouth Symphony. Andrew is currently the principal oboe of the Quad City Symphony Orchestra.

In addition to his collegiate teaching and performing experience, Andrew has also taught and coached chamber music at various international music festivals, including the Round Top Music Festival, Music in the Mountains, Oboe Fest in San Juan, FEMUSC festival in Brazil, the Hartwick Festival in New York, and the Kinhaven Music School in Vermont.

Andrew's solo album, *The Singing Oboe*, was released under the MSR Records label in 2014. The album was featured as CD of the week on the Boston station 99.5 WCRB. He recently released an album entitled *Portraits in Music* which features works for oboe, bassoon, and piano. He has also released an album of Handel trio sonatas with Nancy Ambrose King called *Handel: The "Halle" Sonatas*, HWV 380-385.

Andrew received his education at the Eastman School of Music, Yale University, and the University of Michigan.



### Marian Lee, piano

Marian Lee made her New York City debut at Carnegie Hall's Weill Recital Hall as winner of the Artists International Award and has appeared as soloist and with orchestra internationally in Austria, Belgium, Italy, France, Norway, Russia, Azerbaijan, Turkmenistan, Poland, Brazil, Byelorussia, Estonia, Hong Kong, Thailand, as well as in Lincoln Center, the Kennedy Center's Millenium Stage, Seattle's Benaroya Hall, Moscow's Tchaikovsky Hall and Rachmaninoff Hall, and the Hermitage Winter Palace in St. Petersburg, Russia. In liaison with the U.S. State Department, Lee also received numerous grants in support of performances abroad and is a former Fulbright and International Research and Exchange (IREX) scholar.

Recent professional activities include performing the Bach f minor concerto with the Quad City Symphony Orchestra, annually performing violin and piano duos with QCSO concertmaster Naha Greenholtz on QCSO's Signature/WVIK series, and performing with other illustrious artists such as with Philadelphia Orchestra concertmaster David Kim, and former concertmaster of Milwaukee Symphony Frank Almond. She has also held master classes in Hong Kong, Delaware, Louisiana, Alabama, Illinois and Iowa and has the distinct honor of being the first female solo pianist to perform on Iowa Public Radio's Steinway Café, which is available to watch on YouTube. This season, Marian will be performing Beethoven concerto #3 with Clinton Symphony and Tchaikovsky Concerto #1 with Muscatine Symphony.

Marian made her initial concert debut in high school performing with Ann Arbor Symphony Orchestra and Flint Symphony Orchestra in Michigan. She entered The Juilliard School as a scholarship student receiving a Bachelor of Music under the guidance of Gyorgy Sandor, whose own piano professor was Bela Bartok at the Liszt Academy in Hungary and is the author "On Piano Playing: Motion, Sound, and Expression," a staple in the piano pedagogy literature. She went on to receive a Master of Music degree in piano performance with Seymour Lipkin, winner of the prestigious Rachmaninoff Competition and artistic director of Kneisel Hall Chamber Festival. Subsequently, she was awarded the coveted Fulbright Grant to study with Naum Shtarkman, a Tchaikovsky competition laureate, at the Moscow Conservatory in what was then the Soviet Union. During her three-year stay, Dr. Lee witnessed the fall of the Soviet Union and toured extensively within the former USSR. Upon her return to the United States, Dr. Lee completed her doctoral degree at the Peabody Conservatory of Music at The Johns Hopkins University with Boris Slutsky, the youngest winner of the William Kapell Competition in College Park, Maryland.

Dr. Lee previously taught at the University of Delaware before moving to the Quad Cities. She also taught at the University of Iowa as a sabbatical replacement for Dr. Ksenia Nosikova. In 2012, Marian Lee moved to Davenport, Iowa and is currently the associate professor in piano and serves as head of the keyboard area at St. Ambrose University. As an active teacher and frequent adjudicator, Dr. Lee is a proud member of the Music Teachers National Association (MTNA), National Federation of Music Teachers (FMTA), the Iowa Music Teachers Association (IMTA), Quad City Music Teachers Association (QCMTA), and was past president of the Delaware Music Teachers Association (DSMTA). Marian Lee is the founder and director of St. Ambrose University's Summer Piano Camp for 9-12th grade pianists. Dr. Lee will also serve as a jury member in the 2022 Bangkok International Piano Competition.

### The National Anthem

While several compositions have the honor of appearing multiple times on 102 years of playbills, one piece has the distinction of being performed more often than any other, The Star-Spangled Banner. General Manager Elsie Von Maur instituted the custom of placing it at the beginning of every program immediately after the attack on Pearl Harbor, December 7, 1941, which was a Sunday performance date. Those in attendance rose to sing the lyrics in patriotic fervor. It immediately became a fixture at all future concerts, accompanied by audience participation with every crisp rendition.

The custom remains today, but it endured a memorable community controversy. It was removed from one concert in November, 1990. Vocal and written objections from some patrons and members of the public were swift and stinging. The negative reaction was enough to outweigh considerations that the national anthem was distracting to the music and uncomfortable for senior patrons due to the standing factor. While opinions were judged to be about 50-50 on the issue, the intensity of the voices to return to tradition ruled the day. The Star-Spangled Banner resumed its place on the program for the December concert, where it continues to wave over the land of the free and the home of the brave.

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
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
