# **A Small Hurricane** of Emotions

Jonathan Demme's 'Bob Marley Stay With the Rhythm' pushes beyond the boundaries of the screen

Onscreen there is a reggae group playing. The leader is singing and dancing. He raises his hand up to the heavens, beseeching God. The sound of the music is hypnotic. His body is moving fluidly as he dances with the music, but then his movements change. He's bouncing up and down like there is a string running from the heavens above him right down through his body. It looks like the string is being yanked so that he jerks upward, not dancing now but something more direct, jumping up and down. It's not like how a marionette moves: There is only one string, not several, and there is nothing coordinated about his movement.

Sitting there at a screening, I am certain that these are moments when he is connecting the earth to the music, and the music to God. I don't think that this was what he believed was happening. It is what I know was happening.

That God is the deceased Ethiopian Emperor Haile Selassie makes no difference. The film is Bob Marley Stay With the Rhythm, a work in progress by filmmaker Jonathan Demme, who hosted the screening. The singer is Bob Marley. Much of the traditional history, musical evolution, and biographical information that are the meat and potatoes of many documentaries is here, but only to provide context for the film's higher vision. Marley as an entertainer, a musician, a singer, a star, a prophet, an indigenous political leader, and a member of so many families is the story but the story is not the main point.

What drives the movie beyond the boundaries of the screen into something multidimensional is the same force that drove Marley his whole life: music. Reggae music is for dancing, listening, inspiring, bringing people together, and celebrating - but it also is a form of prayer and a way of talking to God. Reggae is religious, seeking the holy; it combines what comes up out of the Jamaican soil with the dreams, lives, and beliefs of the people.

This film is not a quick-cut, chop-shop bio, and it's not a well-made, smooth, narrative PBS music documentary with famous talking heads and snippets of hit songs.

Instead, shortly into this film it becomes overwhelmingly clear that Demme's eye is on a greater prize. Bob Marley Stay With the Rhythm is an evocation, a celebration, and a prayer. The film is not just about Bob Marley - though it tells of the man, his music, religion, country, family, history, and people – but it is out of him.

After the screening, Demme joked that they had seriously considered using "A Film by Bob Marley" as a credit

but didn't. No problem, as Marley's authorship of the film is as obvious as Demme's.

Bob Marley does not just use bits and pieces of music to illustrate the story; it is as one with the music. There is more than an hour of live performance footage. The film's interviews, archival footage, and narrative notes are used to tell of reggae, Bob Marley, the Wailers, Rastafarians, Jamaica, the island's people and politics, but that is

mostly as a means to an end. More than wanting you to receive information, Bob Marley wants you to be plunged into an emotional and spiritual world, that of Marley's music.

There are shots of where Marley grew up and played, interviews with friends and fellow musicians - the film is an organic celebration. Marley, his music, and the film all come out of the people, their history, island, religion, and music.

Music is an integral part of Demme's life. All his films have carefully considered soundtracks that are never gratuitous but always add another layer of meaning and emotion. He has long used breaks in his Hollywood schedule to make music films. Since his first effort in 1980, the Suburban Lawns doing "Gidget Goes to Hell," he's made any number of music videos and worked with such artists as Bruce Springsteen, Suzanne Vega, the Neville Brothers, New Order, and the Feelies. Along the way, Demme also made a number of longer-form music films, including a short film on Ginger Baker (one of his first directing efforts), Sin City: Artists United Against Apartheid, and Neil Young Trunk Show. Some audiences know him best for his performance films, perhaps, most notably the seminal Stop Making Sense and Neil Young: Heart of Gold. Each of Demme's music videos, performance films, and music-related documentaries stands alone, but when considered together, they are an extraordinary body of work, far more than the sum of their parts.

Demme doesn't overload his films with MTV flash or resonant narrative vignettes. Some filmmakers who shoot music seem almost embarrassed by it, misdirecting the audiences' attention to meaningless montages of bright and flashy things. Other filmmakers quickly slide into cliché. The worst are those who lacquer on layers of crap, which too often results in elaborate, fantastic extravaganzas that come across like Fellini outtakes, hallucinatory indulgences, or Gene Kelly dances so badly misremembered that they stagger instead of glide. Those films are no longer about music but instead about the filmmakers.

Demme trusts the music so completely that he focuses almost solely on it. As proud as he is of these films, he works to keep himself unobtrusive and invisible to viewers by resisting overly stylish turns, editing that is more about fancy cutting than music, superfluous decorations, and personal interpretations by the filmmaker. The films are not about him but about the music

But Demme knows that music is more than just artful sounds, that it is something deeper and more connected. The filmmaker bores down on the music being made and the musicians making it. Instead of applying layers of lacquer, he goes deeper and deeper into the music itself, knowing there is more there that can be conveyed by getting into it as intensely and with as few obstructions as possible.

As a lifelong music fan, Demme also knows that the experience of watching music really includes so very much more than sound; one can go on listing only the most obvious. There are the musicians and their instruments, playing, and performances. The song's sound, lyrics, chorus, structure, theme, music, and tempo. Live shows are impacted by sound, lights, other audience members, the room, and what you can see and hear. All of the above don't even begin to touch on the music's resonance, the emotions conveyed, the memories evoked, and the feelings inspired.

Demme and I have talked about the moments of transcendence that come when one listens to live music. Standing there – aware of the musicians, room, and audience – you suddenly find yourself listening to the music not just with your ears, but with your heart, mind, soul, personal history, and imagination: You find yourself in a rare and wonderful state.

When watching a movie, one can also become overwhelmed by a small hurricane of emotions - evoked not just by what is on the screen but by the very ideas, cinema, style, and language of the filmmaker.

In both those cases, the whole is much greater than the sum of its parts. It stops being just watching a movie or listening to music and becomes something nearly indescribable.

Demme's goal is to marry music and film, combining the unique experiences into something greater than the sum of the parts. His body of music works offers a library of approaches to filming music. Stop Making Sense relies on the Talking Heads' dynamic stage shows, but it is also about building momentum, the multilayered construction of a rock performance. Heart of Gold is elegiac, with few backgrounds and brilliant lighting, like a series of brightly hand-colored postcards someone is sending you from different places and past travels. It is also of the present; it is immediate and, when dealing with the past, very much looking back on it.

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
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Bob Marley is designed to be experienced more than just watched. Unlike many concert films, it is not just an archival record of an event. Pushing beyond narrative, it aims for viewers to let go on a cognitive level, sensually barreling along through spiritual white-water rapids, normal distinctions fading away until everything melds together - until there is only the man, his music, and God.

Coda: I executive-produced one music documentary (Be Here to Love Me: A Film About Townes Van Zandt) and am a talking head in another (The Devil and Daniel Johnston). Both of those films received mostly very positive reviews (though, of course, there were some negative ones). Some of the reviewers acknowledged they'd never heard the artists' music before seeing the film. Almost all of those, whether or not they liked the films, weighed in with their opinions of the music. It seemed obvious that these films were portraits of artists, not sampler CDs. Still, most of these Polaroid judgments were offered with authority and without hesitation.

Even beginning to form a critical opinion on a musician's work from a film seems ridiculous. Rarely is a performance shown that is not truncated in some way. In too many concert films, the enormity of the show, the look of the audience, and the constant roaring overwhelm the music.

Bob Marley is different. If you don't know much about him or his music, you will by film's end. If you are a longtime listener, you will leave in bliss, probably to go right home to put some Marley music on and turn it up loud!

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#### **OUTSOURCING IMPACTS RIDERS**

Dear Editor,

In Lee Nichols' article about the outsourcing of jobs at Cap Metro, there was no mention of the impact on the riders at MetroAccess (formerly called Special Transit Services) by this policy ["Cap Metro Shifts Routes, Riles Drivers," News, July 10]. Most of the riders on MetroAccess don't have another way to get where they want to go. If it were not for this service, most of these citizens would not be able to hold a job, and many would be homebound.

Over the past couple of years, Cap Metro has been outsourcing this service to save money. The contractor, called PTS, pays its drivers less than union drivers at Cap Metro are paid, which makes the PTS drivers less likely to do quality work. PTS puts cars on our city streets that are visibly undermaintained and often dirty, inside and out. Some of our passengers have refused to ride with PTS even though that can limit their access to a ride.

If the Chronicle really wants its readers to understand what is going on at Cap Metro, in relation to outsourcing, then do an in-depth story on the impact of this policy on people who can't defend themselves. Don't just talk to the Cap Metro managers or the union officers, but go out and talk to the riders whose tax dollars are paying for these services. Talk to the riders of PTS to see if they feel safe when they are riding in those vehicles. I have seen the quality and depth of the Chronicle's articles when it is mad about something. How about getting mad about something that affects some of our most needy citizens?

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

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



- Austin ISD and the Pearce Middle School community continue to plan a response to the Texas Education Agency order to close or "repurpose" the school because of inadequate test scores the district has less than 30 days to arrive at a plan. State 'accountability' judgments only move downward

While there's already plenty of finger-pointing in progress over the pending closing or "repurposing" of Pearce Middle School, there's one inevitable result of the state's decision: It will certainly punish the victims. Shutting down a school in July - or "repurposing" it in some yet unknown way that will leave families, students, teachers, and staff uncertain of the school's actual structure until sometime in late August - does absolutely nothing to improve the educational opportunities or the teaching of those students. What the abrupt decision does do is throw students and families into weeks of uncertainty, during which they need to decide where and how the students will be attending school in the fall. Moreover, the decision also threatens to displace dozens or hundreds of already at-risk students into other schools similarly under the "accountability" gun - meaning that next spring's high-stakes test prep at those new schools will be performed under even more pressure.

Nice move, Robert Scott.

The commissioner of education announced his decision via a letter to new Austin ISD Superintendent Meria Carstarphen on July 2 – her second day on the job – despite legislative revision of the state law just a few weeks ago that quite explicitly allowed another year for schools like Pearce to meet the state's rising test-score

standards. Under the threat of closure, Pearce students had exceeded standards in all but one of the state's myriad "cells" of rising expectations – eighth-grade science – and had every reason to believe they had responded to the challenge sufficiently to earn another year's grace and progress. Instead, Scott dropped the hammer, announcing, "This pattern of continuing low performance [five years of 'unacceptable' ratings] is not acceptable and currently is unmatched by any other campus in the state."

Two people centrally involved in the revision of the law, state Reps. Dawnna Dukes and Donna Howard (both Pearce alums) were frankly blindsided by Scott's decision, they said at a June 10 Pearce community meeting. Howard told me she believes there's a political backstory to the decision but remained at a loss to suggest what it might be. Dukes angrily told the group that she had learned of the decision first through the media – "I was stunned" – and was still uncertain who was responsible for its abruptness. Nor did she accept Scott's argument that he had no other choice: "Their hands were untied by the legislation this year."

- PERRY BORROWS FROM THE FEDS Remember that \$555 million in federal stimulus money for unemployment insurance that Gov. Rick Perry made a big noise about rejecting? Now he's planning to pay Texas' unemployment benefits with an interest-free loan - from the federal government. The Texas Workforce Commission has received authorization from the U.S. Department of Labor to borrow up to \$160 million from the Federal Unemployment Trust Fund for July. TWC spokeswoman Ann Hatchitt called it "a safety net" that the state will use to supplement the state unemployment compensation fund. According to legislative guidelines, there should be \$864 million currently in the state fund. As of July 14, it held only \$119 million, and new unemployment figures due on July 17 are expected to show its burden increasing. Although Texas has not had to use this line of credit since 2003, the commission anticipates it will need to start using the loan in the next week and has calculated that its total debt could rise to \$643 million by Oct. 1. ## **SUMMER NOT-SO-BLOCKBUSTERS**

When the council's away, commissioners must play BY WELLS DUNBAR

"In a world where big city politicians vacation all summer ..." The above should be read in that unmistakable, ominous movie announcer voice. Because before the Hustle goes any further, let me credit this column to the current Twitter hashtag #dullmovies, which tags posts of imaginary voiceovers or taglines for movies that should never be made. (Here's one from Tweeter colestratton: "Two guys. One girl. Lots of Highway. 'Commute: The Motion Picture.'")

Certainly, every flick can't be a megaplex blockbuster, but with the City Council on hiatus, it's fallen to the city's multivaried boards and commissions to mint the summer sleeper hits. Or to put it another way:

"Now it's up to a ragtag band of volunteers to steer the city. They're taking care of business - and taking out the trash."

Recycling, actually. The Solid Waste Advisory

**Commission** has been a methane flame of activity in recent months (see our earlier reporting on the shunting-aside of Solid Waste Services Director Willie Rhodes, a continued push for a city-run materials recycling facility, a controversial contract that bills the city for recycling, and a department study slated to cost more than the city's comprehensive plan). Last week, commissioners returned with another big-ticket item: attempting to close the loophole that prevents smaller apartment complexes and offices from offering on-site recycling. Under the current rules, only apartments, businesses, or offices with 100 or more units or employees are required to offer it. "If we're gonna have any hope of getting anywhere close to zero waste in 30 years, we have to dramatically reduce the amount of waste from apartment buildings, condo buildings, office buildings," says Rick Cofer, SWAC vice chair.

At SWAC's last meeting, Cofer was named to lead the new Recycling Ordinance Reform Committee, which wants to close the loophole. "It's been in the back of everyone's minds for a while," says Cofer, pointing to a 2007 task force that studied the problem and recommended broader recycling guidelines; in 2008, then-director Rhodes canned the idea, opining it shouldn't happen until "all task force members and newly impacted stakeholders are in agreement." Now, Cofer said, "there's some folks who would like to delay this some more, until there's a [SWS] master plan and a new director," but, he continued, "we can start working on this ordinance because we all know what the problems are." The first steps are identifying the stakeholders - reluctant groups like the Building Owners and Management Association and other real estate interests but also, according to Cofer, "enviros, zero-wasters, Liveable City," and more. "It's got to come out of someone's pocket," he concedes about potential cost, but it's "really in the long-term environmental and economic interest of the city to recycle more and waste less." He's hoping for the first meeting in 30 to 60 days.

"But when someone pulls the plug ..."

That was the issue at the **Board of Adjustment** meeting this week, where Shady Grove was set to request a variance as part of its efforts to switch from restaurant to cocktail-lounge zoning, thereby allowing an 85-decibel limit for outdoor music instead of the current 70 decibels. But then the plug got pulled on that, too by the Grove's representative, Paul Linehan, president of Land Strategies Inc. Linehan requested a postponement for additional time to pore over the details (likely

parking-related - nightclubs require 50% more parking than restaurants) and to work with the Zilker

Neighborhood Association. "We're trying to make a win-win out of it," he says. The postponement delays the Grove's

hearing until Aug. 10. If anyone's still doubting the trouble restaurants can have in rezoning - or the overwrought rhetoric against music on Barton Springs - then a trip to www.zilkerneighbors.net should disabuse you. There, you'll find a Zilker-area flier

warning of "6th STREET BARS COMING TO YOUR NEIGHBORHOOD SOON," and "more parking in our neighborhoods, more traffic, and more drunks."

"... will it send everything down the drain?"

Obviously, with council gone, a lot is winding through boards and commissions. But failing a proactive council approach, the system could be heading for a Roland Emmerich-style apocalypse. A 2007 reorganization of the B&C system - which has been amended and revised 11 times – now states an appointee's tenure is tied to the appointing council member's; when it's up, so is yours. (Some boards, the terms of which are spelled out in law or the city charter, are exempt; for example, Planning Commission members serve two-year terms.) So between the new rules and the slate of newly inaugurated council members, out of the 412 B&C positions at the city, 244 have terms that are expiring or are unfilled "at this moment," according to B&C coordinator Candy Hinkle. Against that backdrop, council needs to spend the next few weeks at B&C central casting - or the whole production could shut down.

#### The Blame Storm

The community meeting was shellshocked, filled with sadness and unfocused anger. AISD trustee Cheryl Bradley provided the sound bite of the day - "I will be damned if I allow this school to be closed!" - yet first hesitated to speak at all, since previous speakers (Dukes among them) had suggested that it was the district, not the state, that had failed Pearce and its community. Yet Bradley received a standing ovation for her defiant speech, and the demand most commonly expressed (by Dukes and others) was for a "reversal" of the TEA decision.

The only outright accusation came from the Rev. Sterling Lands, who was asked for a benediction and instead declared (without offering evidence), "The man responsible for what's happened came here 10 years ago' (i.e., retired Superintendent Pat Forgione), and he called the closure a "done deal. ... They did this over a year ago." (District officials insist such charges are false.) Despite the reiterated sentiment that the community very much wants to save its neighborhood public school, Lands exhorted the crowd (he said metaphorically), "Stop trying to make the plantation better and burn the plantation down!" (In fact, it would seem Scott has already done as Lands recommended.)

Even more mysteriously, community activist Allen Weeks, who chaired the meeting and began it near tears over the TEA decision dashing his and his neighbors' heroic efforts to improve Pearce, followed Lands by saying, "I agree with him." But if Lands is indeed right, then why bother saving Pearce or Reagan High ... or Webb Middle School, saved once dramatically by community effort and now likely the overwhelmed destination of many at-risk Pearce students?

#### The Commissioners' Guts

There remains only a sliver of hope that some compromise plan can be reached that will save Pearce for at least most of its students. Despite Scott's express, written order of "closure," officials have since been insisting that "closure" doesn't exactly mean that, and a repurposed Pearce in theory can accommodate most current students. But the timing of the decision is enormously disruptive, and

subsequent assurances about repurposing while agency officials condescendingly dismiss district efforts to do so – only serve to confirm suspicions that the decision, in implicit defiance of current legislative policy, is in fact an attempt by state officials (especially Rick Perry appointee Scott) to demonstrate how tough they are in dealing with the supposedly "liberal" Austin school district. That is, is it expedient that one Austin school should die for the sake of a Republican gubernatorial primary?

TEA spokeswoman Debbie Graves Ratcliffe, usually more circumspect in her language, didn't dispel such suspicions when she told the Statesman that perhaps Austin "didn't think we would have the guts" to close the school. What the hell does Ratcliffe think this is - a backroom poker game, with the Pearce students as the chips?

The agency and its cheerleaders - corporate education lobbyist Sandy Kress and Texas Association of Business honcho Bill Hammond - point to Pearce's "failing in eight of 10 years [of test scores]" as sufficient reason to condemn it and the school district. Do they ever note that in that same 10-year period, Pearce (and its neighborhood) has changed dramatically, from a majority African-American student population to a 70% Hispanic school, for which official-test obsession and often even English-speaking is a novelty, amidst a large majority of workingclass, multijob, economically disadvantaged families, and in a state where corporate lackeys like Hammond continually block any attempt to raise the minimum wage?

Has the state of Texas stepped in with the financial and educational resources inevitably required to educate such a student population? Or has it instead spent the last two decades refusing to adequately or equitably fund public schools, indeed, mired in court fights against any such adequate or equitable spending and with its Legislature always prioritizing property-tax cuts over public education?

Rhetorical questions all. But while the state and the district mull over historical niceties, the young families in my Northeast Austin neighborhood can now add to their worries over being "accountable" - for jobs and groceries and rent and gas and utilities ... – with yet another confounding worry:

Where are the kids going to go to school next month?

## TEA TO PEARCE: DROP DEAD

According to the Texas Education Agency, Commissioner of Education Robert Scott's decision to close Pearce Middle School, announced last week, isn't the end. It's supposed to be a fresh start for the campus and the community, and Scott is waiting for the district to deliver a new plan for the new academic year. District staff are now working on that plan, based on the realignment proposal that was already in place but with more emphasis on science and the teaching of English as a second language. But district leaders and stakeholders fear Scott has set impractical deadlines that mean they cannot assure parents, teachers, and students that there will be a Pearce to attend in the fall.

The latest decision goes back to the state's school "accountability" standards. On July 2, Scott sent a letter to new Austin Independent School District Superintendent **Meria Carstarphen**, officially informing her that Pearce had fallen short for the fifth consecutive year. In fact, after a yearlong, community-supported effort, the school had reached the standards to be classified "acceptable" in social studies, writing, reading, and math. However, only 39% of all students taking the TAKS test passed in science, falling short of the current 50% requirement. Scott told her he would be dissolving the school but giving the district the ability to present a "repurposing" plan to reopen the doors in August. "It was a surprise on multiple fronts," said AISD board of trustees President Mark Williams. "One, the timing. and two, the actual decision."

The decision on its face seems simple: Five years of failing grades was enough, and TEA Communications Director Debbie Graves Ratcliffe said that Pearce's "long track record came into play." In his letter to Carstarphen, Scott noted that the school had been in trouble eight out of the last 10 years. As a result, he wrote, "State law establishes an expectation that the students assigned to Pearce be provided a more effective learning environment."

But it's the accountability law itself that's got stakeholders angriest. Scott's decision was done under House Bill 3, the new school accountability standards passed in the last regular session. Under the old rules, when a school failed to hit the standards for five successive years, it was automatically closed or repurposed. Under the new rules, the commissioner has the discretionary power to give a one-year extension. "The old law would have made it mandatory for us to close Pearce; the new law makes it permissible," said Ratcliffe. However, she added, "It still comes down to a judgment call."

AISD trustee Cheryl Bradley thinks Scott should rethink that call. Pearce is in her district, and when she heard Scott's decision, she said, "You could have bought me for a penny; I was just that shocked." As for Scott's decision, she added, "It does not say, 'I care about the people that I'm supposed to be here to take care of." Speaking to a hastily organized public meeting at the school last Friday, Bradley declared she would fight the closure: "I will be damned if I allow this school to be closed."

As a lawmaker and a Pearce alum, Rep. Dawnna Dukes, D-Austin, was equally shocked. Pearce is right in the heart of her district, so she followed HB 3 closely in the session. "There were so many assurances that closure would be a last resort," she said, "It's almost as if the bill didn't pass."

Education Austin President Louis Malfaro was in Washington for a conference when he heard about the closure. He found Scott's "eight out of ten years" argument particularly infuriating, since it's based on where Pearce was and not where it is now. He said, "If any school has made its case that the community is rallying behind it and it's making academic improvement, that's Pearce."

There are also major concerns that Scott and the district were receiving seemingly contradictory messages from TEA staff, especially the management team and the campus intervention team deployed by TEA at Pearce last year. Williams said, "We worked with them the entire

year, and I don't feel that there was any indication to us from them that this was the direction we would take." In fact, on June 10 TEA awarded Pearce a \$50,000 Investment Capital Fund Grant to create a food garden, intended as the cornerstone of nutrition teaching in science and math curriculum. He added, "The management team had told us that they were supportive of us continuing." Not so, says the TEA. "Maybe that's something they said orally," Ratcliffe said, but she pointed to their April to June status report, in which they simply told Scott's office that Pearce was on track to fail

Whatever signs may have been sent earlier, Williams said the timing of the announcement compares poorly to the 2008 decision on repurposing Johnston High. Back then, Scott sent the district a letter on June 4: The last day of the academic year but a month before the board broke for the summer. This time, there was a month's less warning, at the heart of the summer vacation season, posted the day after Carstarphen took over the district and more than a month before the next scheduled board meeting.

# Pearce ... Reagan ... Eastside Dominoes?

Pearce isn't the only school in the district to draw Commissioner of Education Robert Scott's attention - there's also Reagan High School, expected to enter its fourth year classified as academically unacceptable when testing scores are officially released later this month. But rather than close Reagan, Scott wants the district to bring in private firms to address the school's problems.

In his July 2 letter to incoming Austin ISD Superintendent Meria Carstarphen, Scott informed her that, while the school would stay open and the current administration stay in place, he wants more oversight (a TEA campus intervention team is already in place) and for more new reforms to be implemented. He also ordered that the district submit a plan to bring in private tutorial and instructional services, as well as outside staff development. Not that he's reaching into state coffers to pay for these additional services. "These professional services must be acquired at the expense of the district and/or campus,"

Many have noted that this is the fourth school in East Austin to recently find itself under the threat of TEA-enforced closure: Webb Middle avoided the axe in 2007, but Johnston High became Eastside Memorial in 2008. Now it's Pearce, and Reagan is where Pearce was last year. Board of trustees Vice President Vince Torres dismissed the idea that there's some kind of conspiracy. "I can categorically say that there was no plan by the district to close [either] school or force a repurposing," he said.

But if either Pearce or Reagan closes, stakeholders fear a domino effect east of I-35. The district has already drawn up contingency plans for both schools, with options to either

redraw the attendance zones or simply transfer students elsewhere in the district. Either way, if Pearce closes, the majority of students are expected to go to the two nearest Title I middle schools that are not above 115% of capacity, Dobie and Webb.

Allen Weeks, president of the St. Johns Neighborhood Association, fears that moving so many kids around, especially after the disheartening experience for the Pearce kids of watching their school close, means "it's almost guaranteed that these kids are going to get off to a very poor start." With so little time to find additional staff and facilities for other schools, he said, "It's going to put a burden on them that is almost unbearable." Weeks added, "The disrespect to the community is really hard to stomach."

The TEA has its explanation for the late announcement: the H1N1 virus, aka swine flu. "That caused some of our testing to be delayed," said Ratcliffe, "But the district got preliminary results in late May, so they should have known by that point that Pearce wasn't going to make it." The district has been working with TEA on a repurposing contingency plan for more than a year, but Ratcliffe said that the most recent draft lacked sufficient detail. "In some ways, they're in a time bind because they didn't finish their planning," she said.

Any repurposing plan has to be approved by both Scott and the trustees, but the board doesn't meet again until Aug. 3, three weeks before the 2009-2010 aca-

demic vear begins. Trustees fear that, if the district manages a plan, even the most committed parts of the community can't wait indefinitely. Families want to know which school their child is attending; staff want job security and may well start looking for other positions (with no seeming sense of irony, the TEA June report said one of Pearce's biggest problems was staff leaving because the threat of closure made them fear for their jobs).

So whose fault is this mess? The TEA, for sending enigmatic signals, or AISD, for not being better pre-

pared and not giving Pearce enough of the right resources to get those science pass rates up?

"There's more than enough blame to go around," said Rep. **Donna Howard**, D-Austin, herself a Pearce alum. She argues that the system is still configured to make schools fail. For example, last year, 31% of Pearce's eighth graders passed science when the pass score was 45%, but this year it was 39% with a passing score of 50%. The goal posts had been moved – by the TEA.

TEA's solution remains simply to have "better schools." Even if the district does reopen Pearce this year, Ratcliffe said, "there are a lot of other options in Austin

where the students are succeeding more, and hopefully if they get those students into those schools, they'll have better success." But Williams counters that, under the district's open transfer rules, parents who wanted their children to go elsewhere could already transfer them. "This is a group of kids that have chosen to go to this school and that were working awfully hard to do that," he said.

Board Vice President **Vince Torres** argues that Scott's edict doesn't take into account the realities of working families that need and want a neighborhood school. As for TEA's suggestion of transporting middle-schoolers around the district, he said, "Some of those kids are a

year, maybe three months, out of elementary, and you're going to bus them across town?" The better solution, he argued, would be to do what TEA has done for Powell Point Elementary, the only other state school facing closure. Since it's the only school in Kendleton ISD, southwest of Houston. they've been given an extra vear to wind down the entire district. Torres said that if the TEA is putting the late announcement down to something as extraordinary as the H1N1 virus, Pearce families should get the same courtesy. "If there

was something that caused a delay on [TEA's] behalf, then they should have taken that into account," he said.

For **Allen Weeks**, the closing is history repeating itself. As president of the St. Johns Neighborhood Association, he saw his community go through the same turmoil when nearby **Webb Middle School** fought off closure in 2007. He's seeing the same issues with Pearce this time and fears none of them are about academic achievement or failing schools. He said, "I know there's a lot of politics about 'looking tough,' so I'm not sure where this has come from – but it's definitely not about serving the kids in the best way."

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# Fire Chief Fights Diversity Battles

It's hard for

females to

It seems that controversy follows **Austin Fire Department** Chief **Rhoda Mae Kerr**wherever she goes. While extinguishing
local blazes over everything from staffing
decisions to a redesign of the department
emblem, Kerr was called back to Little
Rock, Ark. – where she previously served
as fire chief – to testify in a July 13 lawsuit against the city and

herself. The issues at hand – cries of reverse discrimination from a white, male firefighter – illustrate the tensions unleashed when women elbow their way in to this male-dominated field.

The plaintiff is **Robert Walla**, a fire captain Kerr demoted to engineer following a 2006 incident. Walla allowed a friend to steer the rear portion of a ladder fire engine, which she did – right into a concrete light post,

causing \$500 worth of damage. Later that evening, Walla allowed his female guest to spend the night at the firehouse, against his supervisor's direction. (Walla doesn't recall receiving such instructions and has argued that as captain, it was his call.) The demotion also occurred in light of a 2005 incident in which Walla was, by the department's telling, "publicly disrespectful" to Kerr. Hoping to help Hurricane Katrina evacuees, Walla approached Janet Huckabee - politico and wife of then-Arkansas Gov. Mike Huckabee - and began querying her for information about assistance efforts. Attempting to steer him away from the first lady, Kerr put her hand on Walla's shoulder, and Walla yelled, "Get your hands off me - I don't want you to touch me!" According to a grievance form

from Walla, he was "subjectively considered to be rude, confrontational and disrespectful only when his personal space was violated and he was physically touched by a superior officer without his permission."

In 2007, Walla appealed the decision to the **Little Rock Civil Service Commission** but was rebuffed; soon after, he filed a

"civil rights" suit in the Pulaski County circuit court, complaining Kerr "has consistently applied one standard to herself and female firefighters while applying a different standard of conduct to males by punishing males more harshly." One such example of this discrimination: Kerr "disciplined a male firefighter for allegedly using the term 'bitch' while she herself uses the term 'dickhead' in referring to a male firefighter." The trial in Little Rock ended

the same day it started, with Kerr and the city winning.

While the incidents in question occurred before Kerr's move to Austin, her time here has also been turbulent. Her choice to elevate two minority firefighters to assistant-chief positions, in order to bolster historically poor diversity within the department, has been met with complaints – and now sits against the national backdrop of the Supreme Court's 5-4 decision in favor of white firefighters in New Haven, Conn., who complained that they were unfairly passed over for promotion.

As Little Rock reminds us, it's hard for firefighting females to press forward without feeling the burn. – Wells Dunbar

## THE LEBERMANN LEGACY

Austin lost one of its most prominent philanthropists and activists on July 9 when **Lowell Lebermann** died in Aspen, Col., at 70. He leaves a legacy that touches the city and the university he loved, as well as the Democratic Party in which he played a pivotal administrative, fundraising, and campaigning role. Texas Democratic Party Chair **Boyd Richie** called him "a true leader in his

community," and said, "Lowell was dedicated to improving his community one election at a time."

A memorial service will be held at 2:30pm today (Thursday, July 16) in the auditorium of the Lyndon Baines Johnson Library and Museum, 2313 Red River.

The president of the Centex Beverage Inc. beer distribution company, Lebermann served as a member of **Austin City Council** from 1971 to 1977. Afterward, he remained deeply involved in policy, from sitting on the Central Texas Regional Mobility Authority to

serving as vice chair of the steering committee of Citizens for a Healthy Travis County, which successfully campaigned in 2004 for the formation of the Travis County Healthcare District.

He also played a key role in **Democratic Party politics** at state and national levels, including a stint on the executive committee of the Democratic National Finance Council.

He helped kick-start the careers of many noted Democrats, including former Travis County D.A. **Ronnie Earle**, former state Sen. **Gonzalo Barrientos**, and Rep. **Mark Strama**, D-Austin, who said, "I will miss him as a source of wisdom and inspiration."

Beyond the political sphere, Lebermann was also an environmental and civic advocate, spearheading the anti-coal group

**Texas Business** for Clean Air and serving on the board of the National Wildflower Research Center (now the Lady Bird Johnson Wildflower Center). A UT Plan II graduate, Lebermann remained deeply involved in campus affairs, holding several positions with both the university and the Texas Exes, including six years on the UT System Board of Regents. While blind for most of his life, Lebermann was a keen supporter of the visual arts,

championing the foundation of the Long Center, the restoration of the Paramount Theatre, and the passage of the city's pivotal Landmarks Ordinance. Former Mayor **Bruce Todd** said, "Although he had lost his physical ability to see, he had better insight into people and politics than almost anyone I've ever known."

# **Montford Files Complaint With Police Monitor**


The public intoxication charge filed in June against attorney Mindy Montford has been dropped, according to her lawyer, Pat McNelis. Montford was slapped with the PI charge after a car she was riding in last month was pulled over near Sixth Street. Police Corporal Darryl Fulbright arrested Montford after she tried to give her friend, the driver of the car, legal advice - specifically, that he didn't have to take any field sobriety tests. Fulbright ordered Montford to get back into the car, which she did; however, Fulbright later returned to the car to arrest Montford and another passenger it seems Montford simply didn't pass the attitude test.

But now it's Fulbright's attitude that is at issue: On Monday, Montford, a former assistant district attorney who ran for

Travis Co. D.A. in last year's Democratic primary, filed an official complaint about Fulbright with the Office of the Police Monitor, in which, according to McNelis, Montford asserts that her arrest was "made out of retaliation," "that there was no evidence" that Montford was intoxicated, and that Fulbright made "no attempt to do any investigation," which would have shown that neither Montford nor her fellow passenger were inebriated. (It seems that Fulbright might have a fuse a tad short for work in the Sixth Street entertainment district: As he drove Montford to jail, Fulbright's in-car dash camera picked up audio of him opining that the street should be "shut down" and that all liquor should be outlawed.) The entire incident, McNelis concluded, was "ridiculous."






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## No Fair Share? Property Tax Report Provokes a County Review.

Travis County officials have vowed to unravel a "historic and systematic" trend of homeowners shouldering the greater share of the local property-tax load while commercial landowners are paying significantly less than the market value of their parcels, according to a study released this week.

The independent study, titled "The Unfair Burden," draws on published reports, public documents, and other information obtained through open records to illustrate stark differences between the assessed values of commercial and residential properties. Local activist Brian Rodgers compiled the report. to be unveiled at a noon rally today (Thursday, July 16) in front of the Travis Central Appraisal District, 8314 Cross Park.

Rodgers is a real estate investor and developer who is no stranger to lightning-rod issues. Last year he financed an unsuccessful ballot referendum that would have formal-

ly ended city subsidies for retail projects, specifically the Domain development in North Austin. On the issue of property taxes, he is finding a more receptive audience, at a time when the county and its 80 taxing entities are squeezing their budgets to make ends meet. (The county collects property taxes on behalf of all the local jurisdictions.) County Commissioner

#### Sarah Eckhardt was among the first to pick up the phone

and express her concerns to chief appraiser Patrick Brown. "These are some pretty big disparities," Eckhardt said of the study's results, which contain 30 examples of "the systemic gross undervaluation" of commercial properties and speculative land - land that is purchased on the theory that it will someday turn a profit.

Rodgers had hoped the county would either challenge TCAD or ask the Texas comptroller to audit the district's records, but County Judge Sam Biscoe - one of the most unflappable of local elected officials - said this week he'd prefer to begin addressing the problem by inviting the chief appraiser to the next commissioners' meeting, July 21. Biscoe's position had shifted slightly from last week, when he was leaning toward filing a formal challenge with TCAD, while Eckhardt, noting she would ultimately defer to Biscoe, was angling to take the matter straight to the comptroller's office.

"Filing a challenge would be a bit premature," Biscoe said, adding that after talking the matter over with the county attorney's office, he'd prefer to begin with a public discussion on the issue and give Brown an opportunity to respond to Rodgers' report.

Texas relies heavily on property taxes to pay for public schools, which are historically underfunded. Property taxes (along with more volatile sales taxes) also serve as the financial backbone of city and county services, paying for such bread-and-butter necessities as road maintenance, trash pickup, and public safety. Moreover, property taxes provide the funding for the appraisal district, and Biscoe said he's inclined to ask the city and Austin Independent School District - the two largest taxing entities in the county - to join the county in springing for some extra dollars to pay for additional TCAD staff.

"It seems to me we need to put together a strategy to close the gap," Biscoe said, acknowledging that Brown, who assumed the

> chief appraiser post in January 2008, isn't necessarily responsible for creating the gap. "If [Brown] inherited a problem, I think he has a duty to fix it," Biscoe said.

Thousands of unhappy homeowners would agree with Biscoe's assertion. A record 59,358 residential property-tax protests have been filed this year, which represents about 22% of all residential

properties, according to TCAD. At the same time, 8,638 commercial protests have been filed, representing roughly 57% of commercial properties in the county.

City and large urban counties across the state are continuously grappling with disparities in commercial and residential property values. Officials in Dallas and San Antonio have in past years lobbied to change state laws that would force the disclosure of all property sales, but efforts to make inroads at the Legislature have been regularly stymied by monied opposition from the real estate industry. At least three such bills were introduced in the last legislative session, including one filed by state Sen. Jeff Wentworth, R-San Antonio, whose district includes parts of Travis County. As in past years, the bills were opposed by commercial

Estate Council of Austin. "The real estate trade organizations who drive the mythology that a larger tax base benefits us all and who are cheering and driving Austin's population

growth went down to the Legislature this session and stopped [the disclosure legislation]," Rodgers said.

The lack of an adequate reporting system for property sales makes the jobs of appraisal districts all the more difficult, said TCAD's Brown, noting that Texas is one of only a few states without mandatory sales disclosure laws. "Obviously, the more data that we obtain, the better our appraisal roll will be," Brown wrote in an e-mail response to the Chronicle. But he says he's not convinced that a "gap" actually exists between commercial and residential values. The appraiser took issue with some aspects of Rodgers' report, which included a city of Austin chart showing that residential property taxes increased from 53% of total annual property taxes in 1999-2000 to 62% in 2008-2009. (See charts, this page.) "Much of the evidence used to support this 'gap' shows the percentage increases in various categories. Keep in mind that real estate is a local market, and is based on supply and demand," he said. "An over-supply of offices, for instance, will depress office values, while families may still be moving into the county, continuing to drive up residential values. There is no long-term correlation between percentage increases in commercial and residential properties. There

is also new value to consider. Much of the increase in our overall roll is based on new construction being added. Again," he added, "if a sector is getting overbuilt, we may be adding a lot of new value in a year when appreciation rates may be fairly low."

Rodgers, on the other hand, draws on his own experience in real estate to argue that commercial property owners enjoy a certain amount of tax breaks, even if they're not intentional. "It's a well-known secret that commercial properties generally don't pay their fair share," he said, adding that proposed city budget cuts that involve closing swimming pools and cutting services to senior citizens should serve as a wake-up call to those not paying their share (although the current city cutbacks are more directly a consequence of falling sales tax receipts). But Biscoe cautions that increases in commercial property taxes wouldn't necessarily translate to fatter and healthier budgets. "It would mean that homeowners would pay less in taxes," he said, "and commercial property owners would pay more."

Nevertheless, Rodgers argues, every property owner should pay their fair share. "Those of us in the commercial real estate industry make plenty of money and can pay our taxes, too," he said. - Amy Smith

#### Arrest Made for Evans Murder

After three months of investigation, Austin Police have arrested and charged a 28-year-old man with the murder of Nikolas Evans, 21, who died after being knocked to the pavement outside the Coyote Ugly bar on Sixth Street. Police have charged Eric Dwaun Skeeter with manslaughter in connection with Evans' death. Police say Evans hit his head on the pavement after Skeeter struck him during a late-night altercation on March 27. Evans was knocked out and never regained consciousness; he died April 5. Skeeter is in jail on a \$150,000 bond. Meanwhile, police on Monday released a photo of two women (pictured) they believe may have more information about the attack that killed Evans. APD spokesman Sgt.





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## **SBOE** OUT WITH THE OLD, IN WITH THE OLD

While the critics of the **State Board of Education** applauded the Senate's rejection in May of Bryan dentist **Don McLeroy** to another term as board chair, they also knew Gov. **Rick Perry** might then nominate a replacement who was just as bad ... or even worse. With Perry's nomination last week of Lampasas newspaper publisher **Gail Lowe** to lead the board, they possibly managed to avoid the "or

board, they possibly managed to avoid the "or worse," but they definitely got an ideological mirror of McLeroy.

"Gail has shown exemplary leadership and commitment to the education of young Texans through her work on the State Board of Education for the past seven years, as a classroom volunteer assisting elementary school students with math and reading, and as a member of the Lampasas School District," Gov. Perry said in a statement. "I am confident that through her leadership, we will continue to ensure that Texans receive the educational foundation necessary to be successful in college, the workplace, and beyond."

The 15 SBOE members are elected by district, but Perry appoints the chair, subject to approval by two-thirds of the Senate. In May, Senate Democrats blocked Perry's renomination of McLeroy, who has held the chair since 2007. Because Lowe has been appointed in the interim between legislative sessions, her chairmanship will not be subject to Senate review until 2011.

Presumably, Perry appointed Lowe because she would draw less notice than McLeroy, who, while unfailingly polite, was nonetheless quite forceful in pushing his ultraconservative agenda. It had been rumored that Perry might appoint District 10 board member **Cynthia Dunbar**, whose avowed hatred of public education might have made McLeroy seem like a wall-

flower. Instead, he chose a lower-key option. As Lowe herself told the *Chronicle*, "I think people who've watched me on the State Board of Education recognize that I'm more a background person. I'm well versed, I think, on our business, but I'm not an out-front, aggressive, outspokentype person, so it will be a little different being in that chairman role."

But the **Texas Freedom Network** – an activist nonprofit dedicated to advancing a "mainstream agenda of religious freedom and individual liberties to counter the religious right" – has little expectation that the board will be less controversial under Lowe: "It's disappointing that instead of choosing a mainstream conservative who could heal the divi-

sions on the board, the governor once again appointed someone who repeatedly has put political agendas ahead of the education of Texas schoolchildren," said TFN President **Kathy Miller**. "Ms. Lowe has marched in lockstep with a faction of board members who believe that their personal beliefs are more important than the experience and expertise of teachers and academics who have dedicated their careers to educating our children and helping them succeed. We can only hope that she will rise above her history on the board and as chair keep fellow members from continuing to hold the education of our children hostage to divisive 'culture war' battles."

The board has 10 Republicans and five Democrats; seven of those Republicans form the board's religious right bloc. It was inevitable that Perry's appointment would come from the GOP, but some board critics had hoped he might pick from moderates **Geraldine Miller**, **Bob Craig**, or **Patricia Hardy**.

"It's a big responsibility, and I'm a little bit overwhelmed," Lowe said. Asked about her predecessor, Lowe said, "I think it was not so much his leadership style that was criticized, but rather the controversial subject matter. I think Texas has shown over the years that any time evolution is discussed in public policy it brings a variety of opinions."

As for TFN's criticisms, she said, "I think Texas Freedom Network's stated goal is to get rid of conservative influence, and particularly religious conservative influence in the public arena, therefore they will always be at odds with people like me, who are people of faith, and people who hold conservative principles and make principled decisions. ... One could put anybody's name in their press release, and if it was someone who didn't toe the Texas Freedom Network line, then they would have been opposed to the appointment."

TFN has long maintained that it is not anti-religion and, in fact, has the support of many progressive religious leaders.

Lowe represents District 14 on the board. She was first elected to the SBOE in 2002 and is currently co-publisher of a semiweekly newspaper, the *Lampasas Dispatch Record*.

# No Posthumous Pardon From Perry

The debate over whether Gov. **Rick Perry** is free to grant a posthumous pardon – without any change of law, without a constitutional amendment – is still raging: On July 6, the **Legislative Council** – which provides legal research and opinions to lawmakers – weighed in, opining that state laws are actually silent on the topic. "May the governor grant a legally effective posthumous pardon under current Texas law?" wrote **Gabe Brake**, a Lege Council attorney. "Possibly." The law is "unclear on the question," and "no Texas court has squarely answered this question," he wrote.

At issue is a posthumous pardon for **Timothy Cole**, who died in prison while serving time for a 1985 rape in Lubbock that he did not commit. Cole was posthumously exonerated earlier this year, and since then

his family has been seeking a pardon from Perry – so far, with no success.

Lawmakers failed to pass a joint resolution this spring that would have expressly granted the governor such power (the measure became a casualty of House chubbing). Sen. **Rodney Ellis**, D-Houston, said late last month that he doesn't believe Perry needs a constitutional amendment to do the job but that if that was Perry's position, he should add the issue to the special session call. That didn't happen either.

According to Perry, his hands are tied by a 1965 opinion issued by then-Texas Attorney General **Waggoner Carr**, who concluded that a posthumous pardon is not possible since the inmate in question is dead, and thus, "the pardon not being delivered to the convict during his lifetime, it could not be accepted by him." That's Perry's position, too, it seems – and he's stick-

ing with it. The governor is sorry that lawmakers couldn't get a resolution passed to give him the power, Perry spokeswoman **Katherine Cesinger** said in a message to the *Chronicle* earlier this month, but his hands are tied.

But Ellis says that's just not true: The A.G. opinion in question is not binding, and there is nothing in the law that would expressly prohibit

Perry from doing the right thing. Indeed, the Lege Council opinion seems to support the position of Ellis and his allies on this issue, Reps. **Marc Veasey**, D-Fort Worth, and **Ruth Jones McClendon**, D-San Antonio. The notion that an exoneree must be alive to



receive a pardon dismisses the so-called "public welfare" view taken by the U.S. Supreme Court in 1927, which ruled that a pardon issued by the president was valid regardless of whether the person was alive to accept it. "The public welfare, not [the] consent" of the person being pardoned, "determines what shall be done," the court ruled. To date, 10 such pardons have

been granted in nine states, and two presidents, Bill Clinton and George W. Bush, have issued posthumous pardons.

Perry's office did not respond to additional inquiries, and his position is presumably unchanged.

#### **COOKIE-DOUGH COVER-UP**

E. coli 0157:H7 sounds like a character in an international spy thriller. And, in fact, 0157:H7 is an assassin, a deadly serial killer that takes out some 60 Americans every year.

What we have here is a vicious bacteria, and it has spread all across the country as our food supply has become industrialized, conglomerated, and globalized. It's a sneaky assassin, coming at us in the form of contaminated hamburgers, peanuts, spinach, orange juice ... and, now, cookie dough. Yes, death by cookie.

In June, a 29-state outbreak of E. coli was traced to a Virginia food plant owned by Nestlé, the Switzerland-based food giant. The particular perpetrator is Nestlé's very popular refrigerated Toll House cookie dough. It's like being poisoned by someone you love.

The Food and Drug Administration is investigating the mystery of how E. coli gets into chocolate chip cookie dough, and there's not yet an answer. But the incident has uncovered a silent accomplice in E. coli's poisonous rampage: our food safety laws.

Rules supposedly meant to protect consumers have been perverted to protect the big manufacturers. The FDA does send inspectors into these food plants, but – get this – the corporations can dictate what our inspectors can and cannot look at. It turns out that Nestlé has been less than cooperative, refusing to allow FDA inspectors to review consumer complaints and to inspect the company's program for preventing food contamination. It has also denied access to pest-control records and refused to let inspectors photograph any part of the plant.

E. coli has come into our food supply because corporate profiteers are taking dangerous shortcuts on sanitation. That's bad, but it is unconscionable that our elected officials have also allowed the profiteers to control our food safety inspection system.

#### **MADOFF IS NOT THE PROBLEM**

Well, they sure nailed Bernie Madoff, didn't they?

The 71-year-old Ponzi schemer was sentenced to 65 years in the federal pokey for fraud, 50 years for money laundering, 20 years for filing false reports, and five years each for false statements, perjury, and theft. He'll be 221 years old when he gets out.

Madoff was a crook on an almost unimaginable scale, having run the largest, longest, most widespread Ponzi scheme in history. He bilked some \$80 billion from tens of thousands of victims. His fraud wiped out the life savings of hundreds of small investors. Meanwhile, he was living the high life of Wall Street elites, including owning a \$7 million New York penthouse, yachts, and a French villa.

So Bernie's gone, and that's that. Only it isn't. Madoff was not just some rogue financial slick who worked the dark corners of the system. He was the ultimate system insider who brazenly committed his gigantic fraud in broad daylight. Wall Street's other barons lionized his acumen, and Washington officials not only saluted his integrity but actually sought out his advice on relaxing regulatory policies. He is the product of an era of financial excess and laissez-faire foolishness. He didn't scam the system – the system is a scam, and he merely rode it further than most.

Putting Bernie away for a century and a half (a sentence three times longer than even the probation department sought) takes care of him but not the system. The phony swirl of Wall Street's swaps and derivatives, the job-busting deals of hedge funds, the government's weak and meek regulatory structure, and the culture of excess that allowed Madoff to flourish – all of this continues.

It's not the occasional outlaw that's the problem, but the in-laws – those who rig the system for their gain, at our expense.




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# The Never-Ending (Crime) Story

Although their case has hit a dead end, prosecutors of the yogurt shop murders say they're determined to find the 'unknown suspect' - and to retry Michael Scott and Robert Springsteen

On Wednesday, June 24, Michael Scott and Robert Springsteen walked out of jail after spending nearly 10 years behind bars for the 1991 murders of four girls at a North Austin yogurt shop – a crime both insist they took no

The discovery last spring of male DNA in the body of one of the victims, Amy Ayers, marked a seismic shift in the case. The DNA does not belong to any of the original suspects - nor does it belong to any of the more than 100 men the Travis County District Attorney's Office has subsequently tested. In the wake of that futile search, late last month prosecutors told District Judge Mike Lynch that they were not ready to go to trial - in fact retrials, on convictions that were later reversed - and Lynch, in turn, freed Springsteen and Scott on personal bonds.

The experience has been "a little bit overwhelming," Springsteen told the Chronicle last week. In a post-release interview, Springsteen said he is happy to be out of jail but wants "a trial so we can have the 'not guilty,'" he said. "I want to be vindicated because there has been so much nonsense going on in Austin [with this case] for the last ... 10 years or so. I know there is always going to be that contingent of people who say, 'I don't care what DNA says; they're guilty,'" he said. "But ... in the last year ... everybody [else] has been like - OK, before [my guilt] was questionable. It's not questionable anymore."

Indeed, defense lawyers argue that the new DNA evidence proves not only that the cops arrested the wrong suspects but also that the "confessions" the men made to police were false. Now, more than 17 years after the murders - and with the current status and potential outcome of the case entirely unclear - it seems that the central question has once again become, who killed these four girls?

#### 'Wholesale Carnage'

Just before midnight on Friday, Dec. 6, 1991, a police officer on patrol near Northcross Mall noticed smoke coming from the rear of the I Can't Believe It's Yogurt! shop in a strip mall on Anderson Lane. After first going to the wrong address, the Austin Fire Department arrived six minutes later. Eventually, nearly 50 firefighters responded to the call, and it wasn't until they'd extinguished the flames that they made the gruesome discovery: Four teen girls lay dead inside the back room of the shop. Each had been stripped, bound, gagged, and shot in the head, with three of them stacked like wood, their bodies charred nearly to the bone. "Wholesale carnage," now-retired Austin Police Detective John Jones, the first to respond to the scene that night, later told reporters. "I looked in there and, 'Oh my God.'

From the beginning, the investigation into the murder of the four girls - Amy Ayers, 13; sisters Sarah and Jennifer Harbison, 15 and 17; and Eliza Thomas, 17 - was plagued by misfortune, mistakes, and missteps. Physical evidence was lost in the water used to put out the fire, for example, and police were unable to keep particular details about the crime scene withheld facts that would help them find the killer or killers – from leaking out of the department. They questioned more than 50 teens who hung around the mall and identified a contingent of goth kids from the West Campus area as "persons of interest." They amassed more than 2,000 tips and eventually cataloged more than 50 confessions from individuals who swore to police they were guilty of the slayings. A billboard asking "Who Killed These Girls?" went up on I-35, and a reward-for-information fund eventually reached \$125,000.

Eight years later, police and prosecutors finally announced that Robert Springsteen,



Michael Scott, and Maurice Pierce had been indicted and charged with the murders. (Charges against a fourth man, Forrest Welborn, were dropped after two grand juries failed to indict him.) Although Springsteen and Scott initially confessed involvement to the police, they soon recanted, saying the statements had been coerced and made under duress. Springsteen and Scott were both tried (in 2001 and 2002), and both were found

guilty. In 2003, prosecutors dismissed the charges against Pierce, saying they did not have enough evidence to prosecute.

Eventually, however, both convictions were overturned and returned to Travis County for retrial. Although prosecutors have insisted not only that they have the right perpetrators but that they will retry each case, it now seems absolutely unclear when - or if - that will happen.

## **The Never-Ending Timeline**

Dec. 6, 1991: Four teen girls are found murdered in the back room of an I Can't Believe It's Yogurt! shop on Anderson Lane. **Dec. 10. 1991:** More than 1.500 people attend the funeral for the four slain teens, Eliza Thomas, 17; sisters Sarah and Jennifer Harbison, 15 and 17; and Amy Ayers, 13.

Dec. 14, 1991: Maurice Pierce is arrested at Northcross Mall for having a .22-caliber gun and 16 bullets tucked into his pants. Former Austin Police Detective Hector Polanco questions him about the murders. Pierce allegedly tells Polanco that his friend Forrest Welborn used the gun to commit the grisly crime.

Mid-December 1991: Police question Welborn, who denies any involvement. Welborn tells police that on the weekend of the murders he took a joyride to San Antonio in a stolen SUV with friends Pierce, Michael Scott, and Robert Springsteen. The four had picked up a newspaper that contained a story about the murders.

March 23, 1992: Polanco (who retired in 2001) is removed from the yogurt shop investigation; he had developed a reputation for coercing confessions from suspects. **1993-1996:** Tips continue to come in, but no arrests are made. The case grows cold. **1996-1997:** The investigation into the 1991 murders is reorganized under APD Detective Paul Johnson. The Pierce tip file is among those that investigators decide to revisit.

#### Finding Somebody to Blame

Police might never have considered Springsteen and Scott as suspects if their friend Pierce, then 16, hadn't shown up at Northcross Mall eight days after the murder with a .22-caliber gun and 16 bullets tucked into his pants. Police knew a .22 and a .380 pistol had been used in the crime; they hauled Pierce in for an interview. He denied that he'd done anything, but after questioning by the Austin Police Department's most notorious interrogator, Detective Hector Polanco - responsible for coercing a false confession that sent Christopher Ochoa and Robert Danziger to prison for the 1988 murder of Nancy DePriest in a North Austin Pizza Hut, a crime that they did not commit (DNA ultimately cleared the two in 2000; Polanco retired in 2001) - Pierce said that his friend Welborn had used the gun to commit the grisly quadruple murder. Police pulled in Welborn, then 15, but he also denied any involvement in the crime. He had been hanging out with Springsteen and Scott (both then 17) the weekend of the murders, he told the cops, and the four had taken a stolen SUV for a ride down to San Antonio. The police then brought in Springsteen and Scott for a chat with homicide detectives.

Springsteen said police were mostly interested in learning about other kids he knew - including Pierce, Scott, and Welborn - and

the names of other teens who hung around the mall. Springsteen said that he wasn't at all concerned about that meeting with police. "I didn't really think it was a big deal because they weren't asking about me, he said. He wrote a statement, he recalls, "and I thought it was all copacetic." Indeed, investigators concluded that Pierce might be mentally challenged and relegated the Pierce tip to the back burner.

The case went cold until the late Nineties, when investigators reorganized their efforts. Heading up the investigation was APD Detective Paul Johnson, who reopened the Pierce file. Police had seized the .22 Pierce was carrying at the mall that day in 1991, and Johnson had it tested - it did not match the weapon used in the crime. Nonetheless, in September 1999 Johnson's team sought to talk once more with Pierce, Springsteen, and Scott. Pierce again denied any involvement in the crime. But after marathon interview sessions with police interrogators, both Springsteen and Scott confessed. By the end of the year, all three men were arrested and indicted.

When investigators arrived in Charleston, W.Va., where Springsteen was living, it was at least the third time police had approached him to talk about the murders. On Sept. 15, 1999, after five hours of interrogation, he confessed to killing Amy Ayers. "I had finally given up and been like, 'OK, I'll say whatever you want me to say, and the DNA will clear me," Springsteen said of that meeting, during which police insisted they knew he was guilty because he'd left his DNA at the scene. (They had no such evidence.) The pressure to confess was intense, says Springsteen, so he quickly sought to clear himself. "I went and took a lie detector test, and I passed it. So I thought: 'OK, they have that, and they have the DNA. ... It'll prove I didn't have anything to do with it.'

At the same time Springsteen was being questioned, police were also in the middle of days of interrogation of Scott in Austin, ultimately a total of nearly 20 hours. Eventually, Scott also confessed.

Notably, there is no physical evidence linking either man to the scene. Although water and fire destroyed much of the crime scene, six fingerprints were found on the cash register drawer - two were linked to an employee, but four have never been matched to anyone - not the girls, the boys, or any known employee. Moreover, several hairs, from more than one individual, were recovered from the bodies, but none has ever been matched to anyone. (Whether they have been tested against the DNA of the unknown male donor found last year, or are even sufficient for that purpose, is not clear.)

Those confessions formed the foundation of the state's case against the two men.



Early 1999: Johnson has Pierce's .22 tested against crime scene evidence; results reveal the gun is not a match to the weapon used in the crime.

Sept. 9-14, 1999: Scott is interrogated by Austin Police over several days for a total of about 20 hours. By the end, Scott confesses to participating in the yogurt shop murders along with Springsteen, Pierce, and Welborn.

Sept. 15, 1999: Springsteen is interrogated for five hours in Charleston, W.Va., by Austin Police. By the end of the interview, Springsteen also confesses to committing the murders and to raping Ayers. Oct. 5, 1999: Judge Mike Lynch signs arrest warrants for Springsteen, Scott, Pierce, and Welborn.

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


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
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Each man offered some details about the crime that police said only the perpetrators would know - for example, that two guns were used. But the details are few in number, and whether they were truly withheld details is a matter of debate. For example, among the 50 confessions police ultimately received were others in which the subject mentioned using two weapons - hardly convincing evidence that the detail had been effectively withheld. Ultimately, prosecutors compensated for the dearth of detail by convincing Judge Mike Lynch, over the vociferous objections of the defense, that they should be allowed to enter into evidence both confessions at each trial. Yet by entering portions of a nontestifying defendant's confession at another man's trial, prosecutors ran afoul of the Sixth Amendment, which grants a defendant the right to confront and cross-examine witnesses against him.

Springsteen said last week that the decision to allow portions of Scott's confession into evidence at his trial - portions in which Scott detailed his own culpability - seemed to change the jury's attitude. "We knew things had gone really, really bad when the judge allowed that detective to get on the stand and read [Michael Scott's] statement," he said. "We felt some sort of fundamental shift in the atmosphere of the jury, the courtroom, and everything else after they allowed that to come in." Indeed, at the conclusion of Springsteen's trial, one juror told the Austin American-Statesman that the jury found Scott's confession the "key" piece of evidence against Springsteen; "That really struck a chord," he said.

In 2001, Springsteen was found guilty and sentenced to death, and the following year Scott was found guilty and sentenced to life in prison, but the courts of appeals ruled that the use of the confessions did indeed violate constitutional protections, and any retrial could not employ that strategy. Publicly, at least, this problem doesn't seem to concern recently elected Travis County District Attorney Rosemary Lehmberg. Although the convictions were overturned, she told reporters last month, "Their statements to law enforcement were found to be voluntarily given."

#### **Unreliable Confessions**

The appellate decision makes these cases much trickier to prosecute, while strengthening the defense's ability to argue that the confessions were coerced. "Things have changed considerably," says Carlos Garcia, one of Scott's attorneys. In the almost 10 years since police conducted those interrogations, the science of false confessions has advanced considerably. In 2001, Springsteen's attorney, Joe James Sawyer, brought in Richard Ofshe, an expert in false confessions from the University of California at Berkeley, to testify about Springsteen's five-hour interrogation and why it was not a reliable indicator of guilt. Ofshe's testimony was curtailed, however, at the request of the state. Outside the courtroom, Ofshe did not mince words. "Tactics were used that put him in a place of being considered the principal target," of the investigation, Ofshe said, "or, it was communicated to him that [if he cooperated with police] that he'd be

considered a victim. So, Springsteen was put in a position where he had to choose."

Similarly, for the retrial of Scott's case, attorneys have retained expert Richard Leo, a lawyer, sociologist, and professor at the University of San Francisco. Leo did not testify at Scott's first trial, but during a presentation in Ianuary to members of the state's Criminal Justice Integrity Unit - which includes state lawmakers, judges, and other stakeholders -Leo explained not only that false confessions happen, typically as a result of aggressive police tactics, but also that he is certain Scott's statement is false. Scott was interviewed for nearly 20 hours total and, Leo said, fell victim to a so-called "persuaded false confession," whereby a person is led to believe he committed a crime even if he doesn't remember it. In fact, Scott knew so little about the crime, police argued perhaps he had amnesia and that's why he couldn't remember the details of what supposedly happened inside the yogurt shop in December 1991. "I know this sounds crazy," Leo told the Criminal Justice Integrity Unit in January, "but there are many documented DNA cases where this has happened."

To date, according to the New York-based Innocence Project, based on the 240 DNA exonerations nationwide, approximately 25% of wrongful convictions are due to false confession. "What really strikes me is that [statistic], and I really do pray to God that the general public is seeing now the myriad cases where DNA exonerates people that have 'confessed' and begins to come to understand that confessions are not the lodestar. ... You damn well better look past the confession and ask what truly tells you that the confession is accurate," says Sawyer. "What set of facts truly supports the so-called 'admissions' - instead of stopping short with the confession and needing nothing else."

As it happens, notes Springsteen's attorney Alexandra Gauthier, on June 11, almost two weeks before Springsteen and Scott were released from jail, a trial judge in North Carolina overturned a death sentence in part because the defense attorney had failed to call as a witness an expert in false confession. In that case, a man had confessed to murder, but there was no corroborating evidence. "The likelihood of a different result if trial counsel had investigated the circumstances of the confession and obtained the assistance of an expert in police interrogations is sufficient to undermine confidence in the outcome of [the] trial," the judge wrote. The North Carolina case is significant, argues Gauthier, because it denotes the "beginning of the end of that notion" that evidence

of false confessions isn't scientific enough to be allowed before a jury. Confessions "are no longer the gold standard against defendants. ... False confessions do occur due to [coercive] interrogation techniques."

#### The Accumulating DNA

Not only has social science undermined the prosecution's case, but so has hard science - DNA science - rendering even more unlikely the state's unwavering assurance that Springsteen and Scott are guilty of the notorious 1991 crime. The discovery of unknown male DNA inside Ayers, the youngest victim, was a surprise to everyone. "If you'd asked me in April of 2008 if I'd have thought that in March we'd have [discovered] a new donor," Lehmberg said recently, "I'd have said, 'I think not." The discovery came after prosecutors submitted DNA from a vaginal swab last spring for contemporary testing with the most current and precise methods. What they found was a complete male profile that does not belong to any of the original four suspects. At first, prosecutors said that they likely already knew the source of the DNA implying that Ayers had perhaps been sexually active or that somehow, someone at the crime scene or in the county's medical examiner's office had contaminated the swab. That theory was systematically dismissed: After testing more than 100 men, including acquaintances of the suspects and emergency workers at the crime scene and at the medical examiner's office, the D.A.'s Office has failed to identify the donor, leaving him still entirely unknown.

The negative results prompted defense attorneys to seek additional testing on additional pieces of physical evidence, including vaginal swabs from the Harbison sisters and samples from a ligature used to bind Thomas. That evidence revealed even more complicating results - including that the same male donor found inside Ayers was also found inside Jennifer Harbison. While the state's DNA expert, academician Mitchell Holland, from Penn State University, disagreed with some of the results obtained by the defense's experts, he did agree that the unknown male DNA in Avers was also found inside Jennifer Harbison.

Importantly, also found inside Jennifer Harbison were traces of her sister's boyfriend, Sam Buchanan, with whom Sarah Harbison had recently had consensual sex. Buchanan was never, and is not, a suspect in the crime, but the fact that his DNA was found in Jennifer is also significant, argues attorney Sawyer: It demonstrates that the unknown male is likely



found on a vaginal swab taken from Ayers. The unknown male does not match any of the original four suspects.

**June 2009:** Defense attorneys reveal that additional testing showed that the same unknown male profile found in Ayers' body was also found in the body of one of the Harbison sisters. Prosecutors say their DNA expert agrees with the result. Prosecutors still have



also to be found inside Sarah. Moreover, he said, it suggests that at least three of the victims (beginning with Ayers) were sexually assaulted by an unknown male. "It even tells you the sequence of assaults," he said. More importantly, argue Sawyer and Garcia (Scott's attorney), the results, which do not match Springsteen or Scott, demonstrate conclusively that their clients are innocent. "The DNA," says Garcia, "tells you the confessions are false."

That evidence provides a key to Springsteen's case, says Sawyer, because after pressure from the police, Springsteen confessed that in the course of the crime he had raped Ayers. But there is no trace of him there, and that proves at least that portion of the confession isn't true. It is the thread that unravels the entire case, he said. The police "brutally lean[ed] on Robert to get him to admit he had raped" Ayers, "and he denies, denies, denies — and finally concedes, 'All right, man, I raped her,'" says Sawyer. "[I]n a very ironic twist, it is that blind insistence on gilding the lily that will exonerate him."

#### The 'Fifth Man'

Lehmberg agrees that the new DNA evidence is significant – but not that it exonerates. "I don't know who this individual is" to whom the DNA belongs, but "I do not necessarily equate that with exonerating the other two," she said. Nonetheless, the DNA evidence is strong – at least strong enough for Lehmberg to say that she will not go to trial without finding the identity of the donor. (Lehmberg said in a press conference that the

DNA might belong to a "fifth man." Notably, the theory of a fifth, unnamed man involved in the crime has never before been raised.)

Lehmberg says that the state continues to search for the unknown male – and to test additional items of evidence. "You have to believe that whatever we can safely test, without [completely depleting] the samples, we are testing," she said. "We're testing everything, looking for new evidence, looking to replicate evidence." Lehmberg says she still believes Springsteen and Scott are guilty but essentially admits that going to court now would not be the way to ensure they're convicted. "I know with what I have now it is not worth" going to trial, she said.

Given that the D.A.'s Office has apparently laid all its cards on the table, it seems that the state is unlikely to retry either case unless that unknown male is found (or, perhaps, some other corroborating evidence strong enough to overcome the presence of an unknown male turns up - however unlikely that seems). If that is the case, perhaps part of looking for the truth is considering the possibility that police and prosecutors are wrong about the yogurt shop case. "I've asked myself that a million times over the years," Lehmberg said. "I'm not cavalier, and it's not as though I don't care. And I've been through exonerations it only takes one to bring your feet flat on the earth."

Michael Scott is scheduled to return to court Aug. 12, when prosecutors are expected to update Judge Lynch on their progress toward finding the unknown man.

June 24, 2009: D.A. Rosemary
Lehmberg announces that her office is not ready to prosecute Scott, whose retrial was set to begin July 6. Lehmberg says her office cannot prosecute without first find-

ing the owner of the unknown male DNA. In response, Judge Lynch releases Scott and Springsteen from jail on personal bonds. **Aug. 12, 2009:** Prosecutors are due back in court to update Lynch on progress finding the DNA donor. Lynch has said that if prosecutors don't come prepared with a plan to retry Scott, he will be compelled to provide one for them.

# A Paperback at Woodstock

Rereading a beat-up paperback, the cover long since torn and taped, a date on the first page, written in my hand, evoked a different summer: 7/12/69. Two weeks after Stonewall. Eight days before men walked on the moon. About a month before Woodstock.

It's a slow read, Brooks Adams' *The Law of Civilization and Decay* (1896, American edition), written for people better educated than any today. So I must, at 63, as I did at 23, slog through Adams' myriad references to events and names of which I'm ignorant and go for his gist, astonishingly contemporary, as in his summary of American society more than a century ago:

"Although the conventions of popular government are still preserved, capital is at least as absolute as under the Caesars, and, among capitalists, the money-lenders form an aristocracy. Debtors are in reality powerless, because of the extension of that very system of credit which they invented to satisfy their needs. Although the volume of credit is gigantic, the basis on which it rests is so narrow that it may be manipulated by a handful of men."

In prose aglitter with now unfamiliar usages, Brooks Adams great-grandson of John Adams - presented a vision of history letters from ancient times to his own. His conclusions: Eventually, the power of the West will decrease as the power of Asia (especially China) increases; power always concentrates where capital is most plentiful and production most efficient; when any centralized polity reaches its apex, it begins to disintegrate; all societies oscillate helplessly between periods of centralization and decentralization. Wrote Adams, "Another conclusion forced upon my mind, by the

thought in moulding the fate of men."

to carry reading matter everywhere, so it was probably in my gear when Duke and I lit out for Woodstock, though I did no reading there.

By the wee hours of Saturday, Aug. 16, radio reports made it clear that Woodstock was, well, Woodstock. Duke said, "They'll talk about this for the rest of our lives. Let's go." A drive of 100 miles. We left New York City at maybe 2am. His small Saab easily weaved around the temporarily abandoned Detroit behemoths that littered Route 17B. We parked a short walk from the concert. That wide shot in the movie of half a million people on a slope that rose gradually to a height maybe twice that of the stage – Duke and I reached the top of that slope just as the sun rose behind us and glittered upon Grace Slick's white outfit. "Wake up, America!"

Flash forward 40 years. Amazon zaps me a missive: Woodstock: 3 Days of Peace and Music: 40th Anniversary Ultimate Collector's Edition. I've often said if Michael Wadleigh hadn't made that film, folks now wouldn't

believe us when we spoke of Woodstock.

I ordered the box. It arrived ridiculously wrapped in imitation buckskin frill (to appeal to whom?).

Was it only 40 years ago? Brooks Adams might say the spectacle of Woodstock spans history. Its idealism was Victorian. Its pageantry was medieval. Its licentiousness was Roman. Its privation and faith

of purpose were straight out of the Children's Crusade. Its living conditions were Neanderthal – but no, for only the civilized could peacefully accept sitting and sleeping in mud and the overflow of Porta Potties, as only the civilized can be herded into boxcars by soldiers whom they outnumber, and as only the civilized can be trained to be such soldiers. And only the civilized can produce such a variety and depth of music as was on that stage. Woodstock's pretense was that it



represented rebellion against civilization; actually, it was a phenomenon of high civilization. All it lacked was civilization's unique capacity for savagery.

But that, too, was not entirely true. As an artist, I've always contended that, at our core, all artists are monsters. We'll do virtually anything to do what we do. In the best sense, then, savagery was on the stage, for it takes a dash of savagery to be truly free, and few are as truly free as artists in the throes and fits of their arts.

But artists do not create in isolation, however isolated we may feel. Artists, especially young artists, create in dialogue between their private spirit and the spirit of their time. A generation's aspirations, not its achievements, are expressed in its arts. A moment of high historical aspiration created the phenomenon and music of Woodstock. If the aspirations sung and spoken on Woodstock's stage seem naive now, it was a noble naivete. Most people there celebrated what they thought would be a resplendent flowering of culture and peace. Peace was a dream – a world at peace is not a human possibility, but the (comparative) liberation of women and gays, and a level of racial and ethnic tolerance unknown in history, is not a bad record for one generation, however much that generation dived wholeheartedly into the materialism that, for a short time, it protested.

Personally, I didn't have much fun at Woodstock. But lots of others did. They did all that I did not – took recreational drugs, walked naked, screwed, enjoyed being part



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of the mass, and, in the most profound sense, let themselves go. As a working-class Sicilian New York guy, averse to drugs, shy as well as reserved, helplessly intellectual - and valuing, too, the tough as well as the gentle - I stood apart, listened and watched, trying to figure what, if anything, Woodstock proved. I believed (and believe) that, as Brooks' brother Henry Adams wrote, history is "in essence chaotic and amoral" and would remain so, no matter what. Yet, witnessing Woodstock, I saw something to surprise even Brooks' and Henry's vast knowledge of history, for Woodstock was something undoubtedly new upon this earth.

When I wrote of Woodstock's 20th anniversary, I figured what it proved as much as I've been able: "The present dominant version of 'how to be a world' - is only one version of human possibility, and, if the elements are right, it can be swept away in a weekend. Human nature is just like other sorts of nature, capable of staggering varieties of organization and expression. A quarter million years of humanity has evidenced myriad ways to live, and, as that weekend showed, there are more to come, each with its own graces and nightmares. The yearning ideals of a few in one century can become the motivating ideal of millions in another. (That's not fanciful; it happens regularly.) A new gadget like a compass or computer chip can turn the course of generations. A new music can be the seed, the laboratory, of half a dozen world-challenging movements. While things that seem imperishable perish all the time. And new ways, at least new for us, can manifest even here, at any moment, from the most unexpected source ... beyond anyone's capacity to predict or control."

I sat by the pond fully clothed while Duke – as working-class and intellectual as I, but freer in spirit – got naked, swam, and splashed with those other lovely, naked souls. The county had been declared a disaster area. Army helicopters flew in medical personnel and supplies. A chopper swooped low over the pond, its doors wide open and its soldiers, young as we, grinned and waved at the naked people, and the girls' breasts flopped prettily as they jumped and grinned and waved back. It was as sweetly innocent a moment as has ever been

And then we all went home, where most of us would become more like our parents than we'd have believed that weekend, while the war those soldiers fought bloodied on for six more years. I turn the pages of *The Law of Civilization and Decay* and realize I must have had it at Woodstock, because where else would I have written this on its last blank page? "I find myself in an absurd, chaotic, vicious time; I can't help but look upon it as innocent of itself, like a beast."

# FOURTH ANNUAL ULTIMATE BOOK & DANCE AFFAIR

Some choreographers walk into a book sale ...

Martha Jones, 72, has been taking dance classes two or three times per week since her college days. But as a nonprofessional, she can count on one hand the number of times she's had the chance to perform. In a Sunday evening rehearsal, she and six other women from Kathy Dunn Hamrick's beginning modern class worked with choreographer Lisa Nicks to prepare for such a rare opportunity. The occasion is the Hamrick Dance Company's Book & Dance Affair fundraiser, for which Nicks is creating a dance, set to an Oscar Peterson jazz recording, for the adult students. In the as-yet-untitled work, there are a few true beginners (the youngest, an 18-year-old, asked to be in the piece after her first-ever dance class), but most of the movers have some history with dancing, however recreational. (Two of the participants are dancemakers themselves: Mysti Jace Pride, who has logged in just five years of dance classes, presented a piece at this year's Big Range Austin dance festival; Karin Carlson creates outdoor movement pieces and has of late been entertaining commuters in morning traffic with intersection performances about the work-play dichotomy.) Whatever their experience and maturity, in the studio the women were dancers, and the rehearsal was swift and intensive. Nicks, in quirky, purple, tapered sweatpants, taught movement phrases that were simple yet spatially interesting and explored relationships among the dancers, who were eager for every minute of it. Nicks' piece is just one of a dozen works by as many area choreographers that are on the schedule for the two-hour affair, which is more casual than it sounds: It's housed in a studio, there's no minimum donation, and audience members can come and go as they please. The program also includes "Remember to Forget," a trio by Michelle Nance that dates from Big Range Austin 2008 and shows

women seemingly on safari encountering something elusive and primal. Mandie Pitre is bringing a work that incorporates movements from break dance, a recent focus of hers. And allow me to digress on the contribution of Jessica Lindberg Coxe, a dancer-historian who reconstructs works by Loie Fuller (1862–1928). If you've taken dance history 101, you know that Fuller was an innovator of theatrical lighting, but the casual nature of the affair rules out fancy bulb work. Turns out, as Coxe has discovered, there's more to Fuller's work than illumination, including a loyal musicality that may come across as overly literal today but was an art nouveau extension of the organic female ideal. Lindberg Coxe will

perform her reconstruction of Fuller's 1896 "Lily of the Nile," only she'll wear a costume with a lesser wingspan than the 16 feet "Lily" usually requires. (Fuller moved rods, as extensions of her arms, inside her costumes, rippling yards of white silk to reflect colored lighting.)

Add to those performances a solo by the contagiously energetic Leah Smiley Tubbs, a reprise of Matt Williams' loads-of-fun Michael Jackson tribute from January's Dance Carousel, and an Isadora Duncan–inspired piece by historian Meg Brooker. And maybe some human sculptures. And, oh, the book thing: There will be a sale (new and used) outside the studio. – Jonelle Seitz

# If it's Tuesday, this must be Bomarzo Dustin Wills

So this is Dustin Wills' schedule: Thursday, June 26, he opened Tutto Theatre Company's production of Black Snow at Salvage Vanguard Theater here in Austin. The following Tuesday, June 30, he boarded a plane for a 16-hour flight to Italy. Two days after that, he was in Bomarzo, an hour north of Rome, to begin working with an ensemble of eight actresses (five from Austin, two from London, one from Rome) on a new theatrical work they will collectively create from the ground up over 19 days. Then, Tuesday, July 21, he opens this new work for six performances at the English Theatre of Rome.

So he's pretty much just kicking back this summer.

If you've seen one of the shows Wills has directed – besides *Black Snow*, a pair of Shakespearean riffs, *Ophelia* and *Cymbeline*, and the world premiere of Eve Tulbert's *Ashes*, *Ashes* – you have a pretty good sense of the man himself: high energy and overflowing with creativity. So if anyone is suited to stage two shows on two continents in two months, it's Wills.

He writes from Italia that he and his ensemble are working "feverishly," writing and rehearsing eight hours a day at a villa owned by Gaby Ford, the English Theatre of Rome's artistic direc-

tor. Drawing inspiration from Maria Irene Fornes' Fefu and Her Friends, the new work, titled Five, or Cinque, will focus on five women (played by Austinites Keri Boyd, Chase Crossno, Sofia Ruiz, and Emily Tindall and Londoner Amy Briggs) who tell their stories individually in 10-minute pieces set in rooms behind the stage of the Teatro L'Arciliuto. The audience moves through the rooms in five separate groups and then, after an intermezzo, reunite in the theatre to see how the women connect physically with multiple storylines happening simultaneously.

This will be Wills' third new work for the English Theatre of Rome, with which he also staged the European premiere of *Ophelia* in 2006 and *The Moths* (*Le Falene*), inspired by Virginia Woolf's *Orlando*, in 2007. Now that he's the artistic director for Tutto, Wills wants to develop a relationship between the Austin and Roman companies, with a coproduction in Rome every summer and maybe a cultural exchange that will bring Italian artists here.

In other words, Wills' schedule isn't likely to be getting any less busy any time soon. For information, visit www.tuttotheatre.org.

#### **TESTSITE**

#### For a while, at least, no one home

Like the city itself, the arts scene in Austin has not been hammered by the current economic downturn quite as badly as those in other parts of the country. That's not to suggest there's been no pain here - there certainly has - just that it's been measured in terms of individuals rather than institutions. budget cuts and layoffs instead of major companies or museums permanently closing their doors. The latest example: The experimental exhibition space testsite is closing its doors - not forever but at least for the remainder of the year. The current show, "testsite 09.3 ~ Common Sense: Sheila Pepe & Elizabeth Dunbar" will remain open through July, but after that the two-story home in the Adams-Hemphill Park neighborhood goes back to being just a home for the foreseeable future.

With it goes a unique venue in the city's visual arts scene, an exhibition space that doubled as a studio, with contributors creating art in that venue for that venue, but more significantly, one that paired artists with curators or art writers and allowed them to develop a project in close collaboration rather than one after the other. That sort of boundary-crossing enterprise, which has yielded a number of dynamic works in the past six years and which we could

use more of, will be hard to lose. Now, on the website for Fluent~Collaborative, the nonprofit venture that sponsors testsite and the online contemporary art journal ... might be good, ...mbg Editor Claire Ruud is upbeat, referring to the closure as a sabbatical from which testsite will return. Even so, there is a casualty in all this: Kate Watson, who has served as testsite coordinator and ...mbg associate editor for the past year.

"I really appreciated Kate as a colleague," says Ruud. "Her energy and vision brought freshness and vitality to both testsite and ...might be good. Though she'll be missed at Fluent~Collaborative, I'm looking forward to see what she does next as an independent curator, writer, and artist. She's overflowing with exciting ideas, and I'm sure we'll continue to see her curatorial projects, art criticism, and videos all over town."

Actually, her criticism may be found in these very pages, beginning with the July 24 issue. We welcome Watson's insights and hope that Fluent~Collaborative's loss may be the *Chronicle*'s gain.

# The First Time

#### Austin artists reveal the intimate details of how they got their muse on

Everyone remembers their first time, right? How old you were, where you were, who you were with, and, most importantly, how after that encounter, everything changed. You were different. The world was different. Your place *in* the world was different.

With me, it happened at the age of 21, during my senior year at the University of Texas. I was taking a class in American studies, and my teacher, David Gaines, introduced me to her: Pauline Kael. It was through her book *Reeling*, a collection of film reviews she wrote for *The New Yorker* from 1972 to 1975, that I grasped a new idea of what criticism could be. Her reviews were brainy but fun, sometimes brutal and sometimes rhapsodic (and which pictures she loathed and which she loved was often surprising), with descriptions so vivid that it was as though her words flicked on a projector in your head. But most significantly, these reviews were personal and passionate. Films

got under Kael's skin, and she repaid the favor by getting under theirs, scratching away at their shiny celluloid surface until she struck meaning. She could mine insights from even the frothiest, most formulaic Tinseltown product and connect what was happening inside the darkened cinema to the bright and bustling world outside, to the week's events and the moods of her fellow citizens. I wasn't yet a working critic, hadn't considered that as a possible calling, but when I was offered the opportunity a few years later, I took it, with Kael having shown me the way. Now, 25 years later, criticism has become my life's work.

The *Chronicle* invited a dozen local artists to tell us about their first time, that initial encounter with the muse, mentor, or project that set them on the path of their life's work. Their stories may be found here.

#### Acia Gray

Rhythm tap master, Tapestry Dance Company executive/ artistic director

I truly never decided to be a tap dancer. It just seemed to be the most obvious decision when given the options at the time. I was actually set,



in my mind, to become a "star" on Broadway – after graduating from the American Academy of Dramatic Arts-New York. Rhythm had been a part of my life for a very, very long time, but it seemed to be part of my past – not my future.

My earliest memory of rhythm and what was to set the stage for my future was getting a set of drums. I had been onstage for a couple of years with my stepfather's rhythm and blues band in Houston, playing tambourine and singing at the ripe old age of 8. One of those weekend gigs that kept me out of school on Mondays, however, changed my life. At 2am on a Sunday evening, I was presented with the 1956 red sparkle Ludwig combo set that I had just seen onstage. I couldn't see them fully but knew that my life was about to change when I rode home leaning against my soon-to-be best friend packed in the back of our 1960 Ford Econoline van.

Looking back, I seemed to have an innate sense of how to play even before I sat down. Wedged between two box spring mattresses in the corner of my bedroom – the "drum cage" – with headphones bleeding the soul of Ike and Tina Turner's "Proud Mary," I was driven by a strange calling – an itch.

It was only 40 years later that I discovered someone I never had the privilege to know had a lot to do with that.

Harmon Knight – the biological father I never knew. A drummer.


In the genes, I suppose.

#### A. John Boulanger

Playwright, winner of the Kennedy Center American College Theater Festival 2009 National Student Playwriting Award for House of Several Stories

I was in my high school music hall, banging my way through sheet music way above my skill level on a marimba keyboard, when an eccentric lady appeared out of nowhere. She had wiry, salt-and-pepper hair that had a life of its own. She placed a small green book on my music stand, said, "See what you can



From watching her work, collaborating with her, and being heard as a viable creative mind at such a young age, theatre became the intoxication that most adolescents crave in order to survive those volatile years in a tiny town of 5,000. Janie Hunt exposed me to the importance of the aural experience of live theatre and also the limitless ways of telling a story through mood, movement, and pictures – not simply the spoken word. It wasn't enough to think outside the proverbial box; I learned to dispense with the idea of parameters altogether, allowing a play to breathe and grow organically without limitations. That seemed less dangerous than never allowing a play to branch out, reach its full potential, and enjoy a life of its own.

Since then, it's never been enough for me to simply tell a story; it is more important to create an experience, both before and after a production sees the light of stage. Two decades later, as my own hair becomes more and more salt-and-pepper, I still imagine myself as that adolescent boy in a music hall when starting the first few pages of a new script. And every opening night, I am that 14-year-old kid, hiding in the darkened wings of what I hope to be a much larger cafetorium, as my new play takes on a life of its own.



#### Jade Walker

Sculptor, Creative Research Laboratory director

I was 14, making it 1991. In my safe, golf-course Florida neighborhood, I lived in the house that many of my friends gravitated toward, thanks to a pool and a cool single mom (with her equally matched single female friends). One evening on an impulse, my mother and her best



Starting at age 3, my parents took me to lots of plays, concerts, and musicals, which hooked me on theatre for life, and I discovered a love of fashion while making dress after dress for my army of Barbie dolls. But I would say my "eureka" moment about costume design came while watching The Carol Burnett Show in the early 1970s, when I was about 8. Of course, I adored the glamorous dresses that Carol wore as she greeted the audience, and I was even more in awe of the fabulous characters that the comically brilliant costumes helped her and the cast create week after week. Still, like many people, I never thought that much about how they got there. Then one night, as Carol was talking to the audience, someone asked about all those amazing costumes, and Carol graciously introduced Bob Mackie. That was the moment when I realized: "One person is making up designs for all those beautiful dresses and all those crazy, funny characters - not to mention all the color-coordinated musical production numbers! How cool is that?" Immediately, I wrote a fan letter to Mr. Mackie, and he responded with a note of thanks and encouragement. Since pursuing my own design education and career, I've come to appreciate and aspire to a wider range that includes more subdued, classic, and poetic work, but I must say ... to this day, the curtain-rod dress from the 1976 "Went With the Wind" sketch (recently added to the Smithsonian's collection) is probably my favorite costume design of all time.

friend decided it was time to turn us all on to *The Rocky Horror Picture Show*. My male and female teenage comrades and I were soon dolled-up, and I was immediately stuffed and shimmied into a tight, short dress and ushered into the bathroom for large quantities of eye make-up and hair spray to be applied. This experience of going to a midnight show in a mismatched costume, singing about "Brad," and throwing bread crumbs next to my mother was one that gave me insight to a number of things – the first being a subculture that straddled the line of gender. This is something that still inspires my works today. The second was the chance to see that my mother endorsed



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


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

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The first "yowza!" moment came after moving to Chicago. My little college degree in theatre felt heavy as hell, knowing its history and scale and what it "should be." A deep appreciation of the craft often made me second-guess my instincts and think that I would never have the talent, resources, or commitment that it takes to ever contribute anything worthwhile to what I felt was my calling. I wanted to write, direct, and act my guts out but felt incredibly intimidated by what other people were doing.

At any rate, I became enamored of a theatre group called the Neo-Futurists, which is famous for its 30 Plays in 60 Minutes format. Its shows were always quick and smart and funny and very much accessible.

Once, the group put on a series of small plays inspired by each U.S. president, and Genevra Gallo performed the solo piece for William Henry Harrison, focusing on his reputation as a war hero against the American Indians. The stage was filled with red balloons, and she ran around lunging at them with a gigantic knife, channeling irrational xenophobia, ignorance, and hatred for the Other in an extremely concise way. She had the grace of a dancer, the articulation of a talented actor, the timing of a comedian, and the passion of a poet.

What struck me was how she could draw so much from so many disciplines for an immediate, visceral, and visual experience for a very small piece that is, for me, theatrical in every sense of the word. It helped me to overcome inhibitions about my own writing and reminded me that theatre is fundamentally live and ephemeral, and that is what gives it its power.

For me, making art, looking at art, and talking about art all come from this moment of freedom – in the midst of an adolescence where I would continue to be allowed – and encouraged, really – to be a free-thinker.

#### Bryan Gutmann

Comic, 2007 Funniest Person in Austin

There are many reasons that a person decides to become a stand-up comedian. A love of making people laugh, the thrill of creating something from nothing, better access to cheap alcoholic beverages. There's also the appeal of not having a real job. This all builds up until you decide to go to a local open mic and make 10 to 11 people not laugh. But you go back, because that list of pros is still longer than the one con.

A lot of these reasons to become a comic seem to be planted in a person's brain long

before they even start jotting down their first joke. I often think about these inspirations, as do most comics. (The question usually sounds like, "What was I thinking?")

One of the very first times I became fascinated with stand-up comedy was when I was about 14 years old. I was new to Texas and had a broken foot (another story, and much more embarrassing). I still remember lying on a hammock in my parents' backyard, the sun out, my right foot weighed down by my fashionable hospital boot, and laughing until my face hurt as much as my foot. Seinfeld's gift for making such a big deal over such small things is something that still sticks with me. There are many comics who enjoy simply pointing out something from our everyday lives, but Seinfeld's gift was and is his ability to paint a vivid picture, to truly dissect something until that tiny thing is in a million tinier pieces.

#### Jared Theis Sculptor

The influence of my late mentor and friend Steve Reynolds played a powerful role in my decision to become an artist. In 1999, I was an undergraduate at the University of Texas at San Antonio and was pursuing a major in the visual arts. I had been in the program more than a year and hadn't found a medium that particularly inspired me. Extremely frustrated, I actually flirted with the possibility of studying music instead until I took a ceramics course with Steve. I did so reluctantly because I had always associated ceramics with vessel making and pottery, but it was a requirement to proceed in the program. The next two years proved to be the most pivotal in my creative and intellectual development. Steve opened up a universe of ideas to me and taught me to focus and channel my energy into making thoughtful art. I never met a man with such a prodigious intellect accompanied with a desire to share his knowledge with others. Perhaps most compelling was his generosity. I had taken his sculptural ceramics course during the 1999 spring semester and was planning on taking the summer off. Steve asked my plans and insisted that I study ceramics through the summer, and in perhaps the most generous gesture I've ever received, he paid my summer tuition. This meant the world to me, especially coming from him, and changed the course of my life. I made my first serious body of work that summer and discovered a true passion for exploring my ideas in clay. He put me on a path that is rich and stimulating, and I will always be grateful.

#### Anuradha Naimpally

Bharata Natyam master, Austin Dance India creative director

Between our moves from Canada to India and back, I had studied ballet, tap, jazz, and Kathak, a form of dance from Northern India. It was at 13, when I began Bharata Natyam, a Southern Indian style, with Menaka Thakkar in Thunder Bay, Canada, that I was inspired to choose a career in dance over one in medicine - the doctor/dancer dilemma! About 10 of us in this small northwestern Ontario community studied for a year in weekend intensives for which our teacher would fly in from Toronto to our remote town. When I began to stamp my feet and move my limbs within this technique, I remember feeling so comfortable. I picked up the movements easily. I had a feeling of déjà vu. Had I done these movements before?

At the end of our sessions, our teacher did a public performance. Seeing her move onstage in costume and listening to the accompanying music awakened an intense feeling within me. I felt like I had come home. The dance seemed so comforting and familiar that I wanted to keep dancing the steps and listening to the music. I felt a passion for Bharata Natyam that I had never felt for any other dance style. It just felt right. This is what I was meant to do.

I was fortunate enough to travel back to India and study with dance masters that continue to inspire me. When I perform and teach, I try to tune in to that feeling and let it express itself through the art to the audience as well as to my students. There is no other feeling like it!

#### Tami Nelson

Improviser, The New Movement co-founder

In 2004, I was a beginner improv student full of dumb courage and eagerness to test myself trial-by-fire style, onstage in front of actual people. For whatever nutso reason, my teacher shared this vibe and put me in a student cast. Fellow classmate and performer Chris Trew and I had clicked immediately. Among a thousand other dares and limitpushing challenges we invented together was something we called "I've got a song in my heart" - simply, a dare to do a musical duet onstage during a show. At the time, there was nothing more nightmarish to me. But I totally faked it because I am coolie cool. Before one of our first shows at the fancy cabaret theatre in downtown New Orleans (a total upgrade from the "barprov" we'd been doing in the suburbs), we were warming up backstage, and Chris said, "Do you have a song in your heart tonight, Tami?" After swallowing a surge of nausea, I of course said ves, because that's what we were trained to do. During the show that night, I'm sure apropos of nothing, I found myself alone onstage with Chris, and I belted a sorrowful ballad about chicken salad or forklifts or whatever, and something magical happened. Rather than screw up his face and play my outburst off as some dumb, unfunny idea, he made very serious eye contact with me and responded with a louder, sillier, more off-key song that we somehow wove into some sort of "scene." We had jumped off a cliff and knew how to fly! I'm sure it evoked more sympathy than laughter from the crowd, but for me it meant that I had crossed over. That's the moment I fell in love with improv. Chris and I have been creating and performing together now for more than five years.

#### Anna Krachey

Photographer, Austin Video Bee member

When I first moved to Austin in 2005 for graduate school, I had two friends come visit who rode their bicycles into Austin wearing Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtle costumes. Strapped to their bike trailer, they had a Hello Kitty piñata that they had bought in a Wal-Mart with their last couple of bucks. Because they were out of money, they ended up staying at my house for way too long while they waited for a check from a Nana or something, constantly piling cigarette butts in one of the costume shells like an ashtray. One night we decided to have a piñata party ourselves, and I took pictures of the kitty head being beaten and lit them with a flash. The refuse hanging there ended up being way

more interesting than any of the action. None of the pictures came out well, but that event made me more interested in the discarded and cast-off and ultimately taught me a new way to look at objects that I was drawn to. Six months later, I was stringing a dented disco ball up in a tree with a dog leash ....

#### Eric Zimmerman

Visual artist

It was 2006, and I was in Miami, Fla. I walked in front of the video monitor at a moment when a drably colored teakettle sat surrounded in the glow of blue and orange flames. On the right of the frame, an engorged black balloon hung suspended over a shallow tray filled with a viscous gray liquid. The flames grew higher and hotter. Looking closer, I noticed that the spout was fitted not with a whistle but a blade, and that blade was pointed ominously at the dark balloon. The tension was palpable. I immediately sat down on the nearest bench.

Peter Fischli and David Weiss' 1987 film "The Way Things Go" (more charming in its original German: "Der Lauf der Dinge") created one of those exceptionally rare moments when art mesmerizes me and instills a sense

of complete wonder. I couldn't shake it off, and it both confirmed and changed the way I saw all the other objects in the world. The apparent simplicity of this 30-minute series of chain reactions, wherein everyday objects slide, crash, and propel themselves around a dark warehouse with the help of fire, air, water, and some mysterious chemicals, masks an amazing level of complexity. "The Way Things Go" is layered, humorous, poetic, intellectual, and even emotional in its profoundly insightful examination of simple cause and effect. It is a bit of everything I look for in good art.

I don't make many films in my own practice, but "The Way Things Go" reminds me why I make art and the importance of being open to things that you think might not be of any consequence. As the kettle grew hotter and the tension between the blade and the balloon increased, I realized the momentousness of slowing down, looking, and waiting for whatever was going to happen next. It shows me that art, when it's really good, does have some kind of influence and value in the world and that the challenge of making something with that kind of captivating power is a good one.

#### Rupert Reyes

Actor, writer, director, Teatro Vivo artistic director

In 1971 I began my theatre studies at the University of Texas in Austin. I was in heaven as a theatre major. UT was like my own personal Disneyland. The Texas Union soon became my hangout, and while it was on the opposite side of campus, I enjoyed the stroll.

One day during the walk, I hap-

pened upon a theatre group performing at the Free Speech Area in the Union courtyard. A group of actors, all Latinos/Chicanos (Luis Valdez with El Teatro Campesino, I learned later), was doing this really funny play called Los Vendidos.

They spoke Spanish and English interchangeably, used familiar expressions, made fun of themselves in a way that we Latinos do privately, and made social commentary about racism, prejudice, and some of our own shortcomings. This style of theatre, while not new at all, was new to me. I felt I had just made a great discovery, like I was an astronomer who had discovered a comet or something.

A few months later Dr. Jorge Huerta, now retired from University of California-San Diego, came to UT to interview for a position with the theatre department. At the Union, the Chicano Cultural Committee had set up a reception for the first Chicano in the United States to earn a doctorate in theatre history.

He spoke of this whole theatre movement that included Luis Valdez and other groups across the U.S. and Mexico. He had scripts and notes and showed a short film of the play Brujerías by Rodrigo Duarte Clark, who has become my best friend. We spoke late into the evening, and by the time he left, we had formed our own group, Teatro Carnales en Espiritu (the Theatre of Brothers in Blood and Spirit). It was as if my soul became complete that night.

I became the main writer for the group. I was inspired to take theatre to the people and to provide our side of the story to everyone. Theatre became something to me that I realized it hadn't been. Now it was "relevant." It could encompass who I was and the reality that I had experienced. I was already very much in love with theatre, but now I learned a new way of making love to it.

TODD VEE He used to scare me with his wizened eyes and bandanna on his head. All he needed was a parrot on his shoulder and a hook instead of a hand, and he would have practically looked like a storybook pirate. But when I moved here 10 years ago, he knew everybody that I knew, so I gingerly tried to cozy up to him. "I'm Todd Wolfson," the photographer said as I finally introduced myself to him at a gallery opening one night. His big bear of a paw wrapped around mine, and I was speechless. Coming to my senses moments later, I explained who I was and he dismissed me by saying: "Yeah, yeah. You're Margaret's brother, and you write about fashion. Well there's no fashion industry in Austin, so you might consider covering something else." "Well," I thought to myself, "how would someone like that know about fashion?" "Don't you know?" my friend Gail asked me. "Todd's been covering the Austin scene since the beginning of time." Soon it seemed like I had seen him a thousand times. in a few months, and even sooner, he told me how much he loved Margaret and considered her to be family – and that because of that he considered me family too. I was deeply touched but afraid at the same time. Todd did know everyone, and because of that, he was intimidating to me. He knew the singers, musicians, models, actors, restaurateurs, and other figures that made the scene happen. I wanted to know them all too, and in fact, many of them became

close friends of mine over time. Todd was **SoCo** before it became SoCool. At the beginning of the SoCo revolution, around 1999, everything seemed so new and stylish (alongside the existing landmarks such as the Continental Club, Just Guns, Rivers & Reefs, and El Sol y La **Luna**), and Todd was at every party, opening, happening, and launch. Not being a fashionista of any kind, one might say he stuck out like a sore thumb at those events; on the contrary, he was an elder statesman at these things someone who has seen it all and done it all. Yet, at the same time, when confronted with a new image or concept, Todd's excitement is palpable. His deep love for music is evident in his portraits, particularly those of his dear friends Alejandro Escovedo, Sara Hickman, Laura Scarbrough, and so many others. His vision of fashion and beauty does not neatly fit in with anyone else's idea of fashion and beauty. The nuances of imperfection, the unexpected flicker of true emotion, and a glimpse into the soul are the trademarks of a Todd Wolfson photo. He never takes thousands of pictures hoping to find one he likes; he arranges the subject the way he wants them to be and composes the scenario exactly as he sees it in his mind. When the moment is right, he snaps the picture. Courtney Love once told my sister that "Bad lighting has killed careers." Truer words were never spoken, and Todd is a master when it comes to lighting. He has the magic eye - the




same eye as Irving Penn, Francesco Scavullo, and Annie Liebowitz - that tells the brain, "Now!" And sure enough, the photo is a masterpiece. For that, Todd is Austin's firstcall portrait photographer and a personal hero of mine. On Sunday, July 12, Todd's delightful paramour Mickey Mann wrote on Facebook that Todd had an accident on his bicycle: Shortly before 6am, Todd was riding his bike, hit a depression in the pavement and was hurled to the street, landing on his right elbow and his head. He managed to drag himself out of the street and lie there until EMS arrived within a few minutes. He was covered with bruises and abrasions and required 12 stitches to close the wound on his head. The orthopedic surgeon in attendance at the emergency room said that it was close to being the worst elbow injury he'd ever seen. The joint itself was split open, and

the arm was fractured in two places. Repairing the elbow involved 16 pins and two plates (the operating room nurse told Mickey that she'd never seen so many pins put into one elbow). The prognosis is not good. "Though he will never be able to

fully extend his arm forward again, or touch his hand to his right shoulder, he will be able to use the arm again after several months of healing and rehab," Mickey wrote in an e-mail to friends. For a photographer, this could break his career. But for Todd, who has survived a thousand things, there is no doubt that he will find it within himself to make his body work the way he needs it to and that he can overcome this tragic setback and reign supreme once again. So, Toddy Boy, buck up. You have thousands of friends who are hoping, wishing, and praying for a speedy recovery, me included. You have always been there for all of us, and we will always be there for you.

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### **ASTERIOS POLYP**

### by David Mazzucchelli Pantheon, 344 pp., \$29.95

Asterios Polyp is a blowhard, a "paper architect" who is renowned for his conceptual genius but has never had a project come to fruition. "I don't like drawing from life," he says with characteristic rigidness.

"Things are always in the wrong place." In this graphic novel's opening pages, Mother Nature tests that theory with a well-placed lightning strike that razes his Manhattan apartment and ignites something of a spiritual reckoning for Asterios.

Mazzucchelli originally started in comics, illustrating for Marvel and DC. He collaborated on Frank Miller's Batman: Year One and adapted Paul Auster's City of Glass to graphic

novel form in 1994. But Asterios Polyp is a one-man show, 10 years in the making - a dazzling hardback that's heady with ideas and heartrending in its exploration of busted-up love.

In alternating chapters, the narrative skips between Asterios' post-fire present and his still very-near past. When Asterios flees the city for anonymity and quiet in the country, he becomes a self-taught mechanic with a makeshift family of mystics and rednecks. But Asterios is still a haunted man:


haunted by his lack of humility: his stillborn twin brother, Ignazio (who narrates); and his onetime wife, artist Hana. Mazzucchelli is initially vague about the nature of their break, be it by death or divorce, but he stylishly telegraphs that trouble is coming: As their marriage deteriorates, Hana is rendered in red, a mass of seething, thatched

lines, while Asterios is cold,

"Every memory is a re-creation, not a playback," Ignazio cautions; indeed, Asterios Polyp is most moving as a meditation on the nature of memory. In one near-wordless chapter, Asterios examines a blister on his foot, which sets off a sense-memory catalog of his marriage, snapshots of the intimacies and embarrassments that bond two people together. These memories of Hana may not be fact

re-creation of what Hana was like swabbing her ear or changing the cat litter - but that doesn't make them any less true a document of one man's reality and one man's devotion.

Asterios Polyp is crammed with big ideas and classical allusions (in fever dreams, Asterios is imagined as both Odysseus and Orpheus), but the book never feels overstuffed. Mazzucchelli's masterwork is by no means an easy read – there is so much to process here, the mind verily reels – but it is a transcendent one. - Kimberley Jones







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### THE ALTERNATIVE HERO by Tim Thornton Knopf, 416 pp., \$24.95

In some circles, it's bad enough that Manchester baggies and former Factory Records stalwarts Happy Mondays are somehow not only back in gear but actually touring outside of the UK. That shambolic, pre-Britpop, blissed-out Shaun Ryder and

his skeletal cohort in liver abuse, the ever-out-of-control Bez, should be returning from the screamadelic land of Madchester, Stone Roses, and cheap E is cause for concern. Haven't we got over all that ages ago, musicwise? No. We're never over our alternative heroes, those post-puberty guardians of our teenage kicks and musical malfeasances, be they the Pistols or the Smiths or the whole of Seattle. Like the Stranglers' "The Raven," they are with

us, evermore. This is a realization not of the defeated (as if anyone could ever conquer our hearts and minds more than those who soundtracked them) but of the victorious: We never had no one, ever, who understood us as much as the three-chords-and-the-truth heroes who accompanied the worst years of our lives, long-gone and dead though they surely must be. Except - in Tim Thornton's

walloping (he's a drummer), occasionally windy (he's a music writer) debut novel, which hinges on the realization by unemployed, thirtysomething protagonist Clive Beresford that his own personal teen-angst melody maker and former frontman of late-Eighties, indiepop darling buds the Thieving Magpies is currently living on his block, virtually across the street, in London. What's an

> aging music fan to do but go all stalk-y? Comparisons to Nick Hornby's OCD music fan's manual High Fidelity, which merits a snarky namecheck, are obvious but relatively unfounded. Clive's first-person melodramatics strike a deep and resonant chord, not because they revolve around any particular band, but because they're about those of us who live and die for music, Britpop trainspotters, post-punks, and Merseybeat die-naughts included, whatever the line-

up might be. Those particular teenage heartscars still pain us decades later, seething to a beat that goes on and on and on, even when our own lives seem to have come to a full stop. Thornton's peculiar genius is in marking those teenage tablatures and playing them all the way through, a music fan's grace note, a love song to what was and may yet still be. - Marc Sayloy















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### **MAX'S WINE DIVE**

When I heard the hip, popular Max's Wine Dive from Houston was planning a Downtown Austin outpost, I immediately checked it out online. Max's upscale comfort-food menu was very attractive and priced right, so I made mental notes about several dishes I intended to try when I got the chance. Max's opened a block west of the Convention Center in a converted warehouse in the late spring. The interior has a comfortable urban/industrial feel, an open kitchen, one wall dedicated to retail wine sales, and a rock & roll juke box cranked up loud. And by loud, I mean that during the opening week blogger's happy hour we attended, it was impossible to engage in conversation without shouting. When I questioned the hostess about the full-bore musical assault, she shrugged her shoulders, leaned in close, and yelled in my ear, "Loud music is part of Max's vibe." You've been warned.

Max's offers dinner and two happy hours six nights a week and a very affordable brunch all

day on Sundays. In addition to very good food, beer, and wine by the bottle and the glass, it also operate a busy retail wine operation. Max's well-trained and enthusiastic young staff is eager to please and creates a fun, upbeat atmosphere. We're told plans call for developing private dining rooms and lounge areas on the building's lower floors in the coming months. We sampled selected appetizers at the first blogger's happy hour and the bold flavors of the fried chicken, buffalo sliders, fried-oyster nachos, shrimp 'n' grits, and baby back ribs more than held their own against the big noise.

We dropped into Max's for Sunday brunch and found the room a couple of decibels quieter. My five guests and I discovered many tempting menu items and were very satisfied with our choices. The big brunch deal is \$25 for all-youcan-eat fried chicken with waffles and mimosas, but our server was gracious enough to bring my sister one serving of chicken alongside a big, fluffy waffle with no mimosa for the regular dinner menu price of \$15. This is serious fried chicken, with a crisp, crunchy coating and a spicy kick from the jalapeno-buttermilk marinade. The sweet/savory contrast of the waffle against the chicken works perfectly. The friedegg sandwich (\$13) with house potato chips and the **Kobe beef burger** (\$18) with fresh-cut



fries are both worthy choices. Both sandwiches have Texas ingredient components (Veldhuizen cheese and Yama Farms beef) and are served on wonderful bread from the new Walton's Fancy and Staple bakery. The garlic-black truffle aioli on the sandwich and the Belletoile triple-cream brie on the burger are particularly flavorful touches. Being a cabrito lover, I opted for Big M's El Muerte (\$9): two fried corn tortillas stuffed with spicy, succulent braised goat meat and crumbly cotija cheese, topped with two eggs fried exactly as ordered. It was simple and earthy - just delicious. All three of the egg dishes at our table demonstrated a skilled hand with a skillet.

We celebrated my sister's birthday with three desserts to share around the table. The Half & Half (\$6) offers triangles of Max's decadent dark-chocolate-and-ancho-chile Big Ass Brownie and its elegant, custardy white chocolate bread pudding under a scoop of Teo's chocolate-hazelnut gelato. The birthday girl approved. Our unanimous favorite, however, was the Apple Brown Betty (\$6), a hot skillet of tart, crisp Granny Smith apples and golden raisins in a cinnamon caramel under a crumbly streusel topping. This dessert had spoons flying, even though its scoop of chocolate-hazelnut gelato wasn't the perfect complement the salted caramel gelato listed on the menu would have been.

I find many aspects of Max's very appealing, even though I'm no longer the target audience for a loud, hip watering hole: well-prepared food with big flavors, respectable portions, reasonable prices, and friendly service. There are still plenty of items on the dinner menu I'd like to check out, and I'm now a big fan of the brunch and that fried chicken. I can always hope the new lounge areas downstairs will be relieved of the deafening vibe. It's either that or takeout. - Virginia B. Wood

Chef Michael Rypka's innovative outdoor burger joint was part of the South Austin Trailer Park & Eatery on South First, and the demise was cleverly blamed on "drive-bys" committed by national burger chain mascots. However, I think it's just as likely the business died of heat stroke. The persistent, oppressive heat and drought conditions are taking a toll on everyone from burger joints to farmers. Apropos of that, the folks at the **Downtown** Farmers' Market (Fourth & Guadalupe) have adjusted their hours and will be open from 8am to noon on Saturdays for the rest of the summer. Get down there and shop before the thermometer cracks 100! Hours at the Wednesday Triangle market remain the same, 4-8pm... In another effort to take our minds off the heat, the good folks at Jo's Downtown (242 W. Second, 469-9003, www.joscoffee.com) have added a free music series on the patio Tuesday and Thursday evenings, complete with food and drink specials such as buy one, get one free on their great burgers and \$2 Lone Star tall boys. Check out the musical lineup online, and stroll on down... Chef/owner Mark Spedale debuts his new Sunday brunch menu this weekend at **Primizie** Osteria (1000 E. 11th #150, 236-0088, www.primizieaustin.com). The Italian à la carte menu (\$5-13) will be available from 10am to 3pm on Sundays, and reservations are accepted... The owners of Stubb's Bar-B-Q (801 Red River, 480-8341, www.stubbsaustin. com) are eager for the restaurant and its food to be as highly regarded as the famous music venue. To that end, they've recently done some refurbishing of the dining rooms and upgraded both the quality and diversity of the menu. The new Southwestern-inspired menu items they've added to complement the traditional barbecue offerings look promising, and they are on our list of things to check out... Austin's newest sushi bar, Koi Sushi & Japanese Grill (815 W. 47th #102, 452-6666. www.sushikoi.com), is open for both lunch and dinner in the Triangle... **Draught** House Pub (4112 Medical Parkway, 452-6258, www.draughthouse.com) proprietor Josh Wilson is at it again, tapping cask ales on Firkin Fridays. Drop by around 3pm this Friday to sample the Bear Republic Hop Rod Rye... If you are like me and were confused about what happened to the excellent PBS program Gourmet's Diary of a Foodie when KI RU2 became KI RU0, never fear. The program has moved to 5pm on Sundays and is repeated on Wednesdays at 1:30pm. New segments are over for the time being, and KLRU has restarted the series from the beginning... Olivia (2043 S. Lamar, 804-2700, www.olivia-austin. com) chef/owner **James Holmes** and his wife, Christina, welcomed a second daughter to their household early this month. Olivia's baby sister, Lucy Basilia Holmes (8 pounds, 20 inches), arrived on July 3.

### **MAX'S WINE PROGRAM**

Max's Wine Dive's spicy comfort foods are just half the story at this Downtown eatery. Like several other places, it offers wine prices somewhat higher than stores but significantly lower than most full-service restaurants, and all wines are available at even further discounts when you buy them for off-premise consumption. Max's also offers a number of attractive wine deals to get folks in the door. Probably the best is the case price of \$200 for Max's luxury red or white wine picks. The wines change frequently, but recently it was either a Monterey Vineyards Chardonnay or a Rutherford Hill Cabernet Sauvignon. Then, to sweeten the deal a little further, it's also offering a \$50 gift card (usable only for food and wine consumed on-premises) to anyone who buys a case of wine. That \$50 really pays off when you buy an Argentine Martin Fierro wine (Torrontes would be my choice) for \$100.

For folks dining in, the wine list holds several great choices for quenching some of the spicy burn. The **La Poema Cava** (\$8.75 glass, \$4.25 at happy hour, \$29 bottle) has tongue-tickling bubbles and refreshing acidity that will work well in tandem with the southern-fried chicken. Any restaurant that serves Sancerre by the glass is all right by me, and Max's has the lightly grapefruity Langlois Chateau Sancerre for \$11.75 a glass or \$45 a bottle. I'll be there at happy hour when the glass price drops to \$5.50. And there are currently three wines sold by the bottle not to be missed, both for flavor and because they are priced very close to retail: Chapoutier Belleruche Blanc (\$29), Tablas Creek Cotes de Tablas Red (\$39), and Ruinart Blanc de Blanc Champagne (\$74).

If there are any high rollers left out there shopping for premium wines, Max's offers an interesting option in which you pay for a case of more expensive wine and Max's gives you a second case of an almost equally rare and valuable wine for free. The wine program at Max's is worth watching. It offers creative and thrifty options and is trying several new ideas, all of which spell savings for the careful consumer. Wes Marshall

### FABI + ROSI 509 Hearn, 236-0642 Monday-Thursday, 6-10pm; Friday-Saturday, 6-11pm



Fabi + Rosi is a restaurant that glitters. From the truly inspired interior decor to a menu that shines with beacons of European gastronomy, the restaurant oozes style and taste. The modest Craftsman bungalow belies a dining room sparkling with pretty teardrop chandeliers, delicate hanging tea lights, and antique mirrors that playfully throw light throughout the room. The furnishings, done entirely in black and white, are a tasteful bricolage of antique and modern.

Here diners are treated to European classics such as escargots in garlic butter, *moules marinière*, steak frites, and paella, all at shamefully reasonable prices. Juxtaposed against the elegant decor, the menu's affordability bespeaks an Old World egalitarianism, as if whispering, in a throaty European accent, "Elegant dining is not a luxury; it is a birthright."

My first meal there lived up to that promise, with a dinner for two that was close to perfect for less than \$100, including wine. After a complimentary *amuse-bouche* of zesty gazpacho, the meal cantered comfortably over to appetizers of house-cured salmon (\$8) and a vegetable-and-goat-cheese terrine (\$8). The cured salmon was as silky as butter, scented with anise, juniper, and perhaps just a hint of coriander. It was delicious paired with a light fennel salad. But this paled

beside the terrine, with its slices of zucchini and roasted tomato artfully enfolding a soft goat cheese, all accented by honey and hazelnut basil pesto. Like a scene from *Ratatouille*, or more aptly, Proust's *Remembrance of Things Past*, the dish poignantly evoked clear lavender fields in bloom.

Our entrées of duck confit (\$16) and grilled leg of lamb (\$21) were equally dazzling. The duck: crisp, salty skin enshrouding tender leg and thigh meat. A twangy balsamic sauce bathing little earthy mushrooms offered well-calibrated balance. The lamb: grilled medium rare, paddling atop a demi-glace, every drop of which was vigorously sopped up by an airy potato soufflé. After a dinner so thoroughly enjoyed, I was in the mood to excuse the lemon custard tart (\$6) I ordered for dessert, the flavor of which was good, but its consistency was just a little grainier than it should have been. We sank into the chocolate mousse (\$6), on the other hand, as if it were a favorite pillow.

I anticipated my return trip to Fabi + Rosi with longing. I was dismayed, then, that the next visit only faintly echoed the first. The chicken liver pâté (\$8) I ordered for an appetizer was admittedly proficient, and I inhaled

every drop of it, but what was that little pile of gelatinous curds next to it that reeked of stale wine? The menu called it Gewuertztraminer gelée; I call it unappetizing. The mussels (\$9) were artfully steamed until just open, swimming in an irresistible potion of butter, wine, and garlic, but I couldn't help noticing that the bivalves themselves had a faint whiff of Monday's catch to them (it was Thursday).

However, these minor flaws in two otherwise well-executed dishes would have been cheerfully overlooked had not the kitchen committed some serious blunders during the ensuing courses. While the seafood paella (\$16) was flavorful, if a little too heavily seasoned with paprika, the pork schnitzel and spätzle (\$15) was terrible. The meat was bland, the accompanying mushroom sauce goopy, and the spätzle served alongside it was inexcusably limp, watery, and wholly without flavor.

Worse still were desserts. A grilled peach paired with black-pepper-vanilla ice cream (\$7) was underripe and sour (the ice cream was quite delicious, though); the homemade apple strudel (\$7) was burned black on the bottom, and the apple filling needed more sugar, leaving the dessert practically inedible.

So it was with bitter disappointment that I discovered that things that glitter are not always golden. But I may still return to Fabi + Rosi because I just can't resist the pretty sparkle, and I'm a sucker for a good duck confit.

### WALTON'S FANCY AND STAPLE 609 W. Sixth, 542-3380 www.waltonsfancyandstaple.com Daily, 6am-8pm

It's difficult – no, it's impossible – to write about Walton's without praising the loving restoration of the historic West Sixth Street building it now occupies. Clearly, no expense was spared and no corners cut; from the creamy restored white woodwork of the doors and windows to the solid brass bathroom fixtures, every detail is satisfyingly complete. The overall atmosphere is lovely and prosperous in a way rarely encountered in today's cost-cutting business environment.

Walton's is a dual concern: It's a bakery, coffee shop, and sandwich counter, as well as a florist and gift shop. The floral aspect offers some great bargains (a dozen gigantic roses for

\$15, 10 stems of Gerber daisies for \$8), but it primarily functions as a serene setting for the cafe.

Thanks to excellent financial backing (as part of Sandra Bullock's business empire), Walton's is able to offer its wares at competitive prices in spite of the money lavished on the fixtures. For example, the La Marzoco espresso machine is top-notch, and the espresso itself is strong, low-acid, and heavenly; nevertheless, all of the espresso drinks are priced from \$2.25 to \$3.85.

The sandwich counter offers six hot, nine cold, and six panini sandwiches, priced from \$5.50 to \$12.50, with most less than \$7. Pretty standard, until you consider that Walton's is using only the choicest premium ingredients: Niman Ranch, Applegate Farms, and Applewood deli meats; Maytag blue, imported Stilton,

Saint-André Brie, and Vermont cheddar cheese. The dressings and spreads are made in-house, as are the meatballs, eggplant Parmesan, roasted vegetables, and, of course, all the breads.

The building houses a good-sized working bakery in the back, where all the bakery items and sandwich breads are made. Walton's bakes multigrain, French white, baguettes, ciabatta, brioche, sourdough, foccacia, challah, and rye, supplying not only itself but a few other restaurants around town (see "Max's Wine Dive," p.39). Bread can be bought by the loaf (\$4-6) or half-loaf. The pastries, muffins, scones, cupcakes, cheesecakes, and cakes are reasonably priced as well. The lemon tart (\$3) is a standout, with a crisp, short pastry and a tart, deeply lemony filling, as are the Golden Egg (\$1), a delicately spice-flavored



sponge cake, and the fresh-daily croissants (\$2.25). Walton's is well-staffed with an enthusiastic crew that will steer you toward the freshest baked goods and make sandwich recommendations if you ask.





















# DOIN' IT THEIR WAY

The inspired absurdity of 'The Mighty Boosh'

Trying to describe what happens over the course of an episode of The Mighty Boosh is futile, but let's just say Vince Noir (Noel Fielding) and Howard Moon (Julian Barratt) are basically the British version of Laverne & Shirley - best friends who work together, live together, and also happen to make journeys into alternate realities through portals in the run-down zoo they're employed at in season one, the flat they share in season two, and the shop they run in season three of the BBC series.

The cast of supporting oddballs is pretty astounding, too: Old Gregg, an amorous, transsexual deep-sea creature; Naboo, a perpetually stoned shaman; Mr. Susan, a fabric-y monster who resides in a mirrored netherworld. The list goes on. Interspersed throughout their adventures are some mindexploding, warped musical numbers.

What started as a live improv show in the late 1990s became a pilot for the BBC in 2004, when Steve Coogan championed the duo and his production company, Baby Cow, produced the first season. Adult Swim has recently been showing episodes on Sunday nights, and the show has officially taken on cult status. All three seasons of The Mighty Boosh see American release on DVD this week, with tons of extras tacked on, and there's talk of a Mighty Boosh film in the future. The Chronicle recently caught up with Fielding and Barratt, just off a six-week tour of the live show.

Austin Chronicle: Is there going to be a season four?

**Noel Fielding:** I think so, yes. After the TV show, there were two tours back-to-back. really, so we've just been taking a bit of time to reiuvenate.

Julian Barratt: Noel's training to be a doctor as well.

AC: Oh. vou've been in medical school, too?



**NF:** Yeah, just trying to keep my options open. And Julian's been playing a lot of golf lately. Got your handicap down to two, didn't you? AC: The "Fame" episode from season one [in which Vince joins an electro band and Howard is possessed by an evil jazz spirit] does that feel like self-fulfilling prophecy? NF: It's been exactly like that. I got sucked into a Hoover just this morning.

**JB:** The way we write, the world we write about quite often blends into the world we live in.

NF: Yeah, we like to put those real-life aspects in, balance the fantastical, like, the ludicrous nature of being in a band, by bringing monsters in and out. And the monsters have usually got some fashion or musical thing going on. Basically, we take our friends in bands and turn them into mermaids and sasquatches.

AC: Looking back on the first season, does it seem rudimentary compared to season three? **JB:** It's sort of like making your first album

- all the work you've put in over the years goes into it, and then the next two you have to come up with that year. After the first series, we'd pretty much used up everything we'd done live. After that, it was crunch time. Can we do this again? And it turns out we couldn't.

NF: The pace was faster in the third season, we got right into the stories a bit

quicker, but some of our best ideas were probably in the first season.

JB: We didn't know the rules of TV in season one, so we had some unusual ways of doing it. I would look at the wrong camera a lot, speak too quietly.

NF: In season one, we were sort of worried they would take our baby and dress it up in stupid clothes. It's like that Jack White song – I can't remember which one – but he talks about being in this massive studio and trying to go back to that feeling of writing in his bedroom.

AC: Your dialogues throughout all three seasons feel very natural, which I'm sure comes from being able to read each other pretty well. How much of what you do on the TV show is improv?

NF: We try to do looser takes, but there's very little time with TV, and you can't improvise as much as you'd like to. It'd be great to have that luxury and muck about, but you usually have four scenes to film, and if you start improvising, the producer starts freaking out. "They said 'oven glove'! That's not in the script!" Rich [Fulcher, who plays the scene-stealing Bob Fossil, among other characters] is actually quite good at that, because he never says the same thing twice. He's not responsible for driving the plot along like us. We just give him an outfit and let him scream.

# **Size Matters**

### Making sense of Austin's microcinema scene

It all started with a microcinema, really. A vital element of Austin's cinematic community was born and blossomed around Richard Linklater's nascent Austin Film Society screenings upstairs at Eighties-era Captain Quackenbush's on the Drag. Technically, it started even before that, with the arrival of CinemaTexas, the University of Texas Radio-Television-Film Department offshoot that initially brought many of the founders of *The Austin Chronicle* together in the mid- to late Seventies. It's fair to say that Austin now boasts nearly as many exciting cinema-centric events per year as most other cities have stultifyingly dull and overhyped concerts in the park. In point of fact, we have so many micro film events that we're going to need a list to keep track of them all.

Clearly, a roundup of sorts is in order. But first, what exactly is a microcinema? For our purposes and as a general guideline, a microcinema is anything smaller in scope and number of exhibition venues than the two local minifests that probably would've

made the cut *last* year but have since grown in size and scale: the Austin Asian American Film Festival (www.aaaff.org) and the Austin Jewish Film Festival (www.austinjff.org). Which is to say that monthly series screenings, such as Nueva Onda's top-notch movie nights, fall under the microcinema purview, as does the Austin Cinematheque, but the South by Southwest Film Festival and the Austin Film Festival do not, nor does the ambitious year-round programming of the Austin Film Society. Clear? Cool beans. Turn on the iPhones and call up the calendars because, as the Austin Underground Film Festival's Andy Gately says, "Film festivals have gotten so big that they cross-program, and you have to choose which movie you're going to miss. In Austin, you have to choose which *festival* you're going to miss."

# The Season for Sci-Fi

I'm not sure why, but sci-fi, supernatural, and fantasy series seem to go with summer like paletas and a swelteringly hot day. I'm not talking series with the apocalyptic seriousness of Fringe or Terminator: The Sarah Connor Chronicles – which I love – but lighter. slightly quirkier fare such as Eureka and Warehouse 13 (both on the newly rechristened SvFv channel) and NBC's Merlin, with the marvelous Anthony Head (aka Giles from Buffy the Vampire Slayer fame). Apparently, BBC America thinks summer and sci-fi are a perfect match, as well: To inaugurate BBC America HD, the network has scheduled a special week featuring several new and returning sci-fi series.

Kicking off BBC America's sci-fi week is the return of *Torchwood: Children of Earth*. The series will air five consecutive nights starting Monday, July 20, reuniting Captain Jack (**John Barrowman**), Gwen Cooper (**Eve Myles**), and lanto Jones (**Gareth David-Lloyd**) as they protect the human race from evil forces while coming to terms with the death of two of their teammates. Airtime is 8pm on BBC America.

The U.S. premiere of the first of the last four *Doctor Who* specials begins Sunday, July 26, at 7pm. **David Tennant** stars as the 10th Time Lord in *Doctor Who*: *Planet of the Dead*. In this special, Doctor Who joins forces with a mysterious woman when a London bus is detoured into an alien world that has terrifying secrets which threaten mankind.

The third season of one of my favorite BBC America sci-fi offerings comes to a close Saturday, July 25, at 7pm. *Primeval* stars **Douglas Henshall** as Nick Cutter, a scientist who leads a secret team whose main job is to contain "anomalies," creatures from the past (T. rex, Mammoth, Giganotosaurus) that make their way into the present through mysterious weak spots that allow the creatures to travel through time and wreak havoc. In the season finale, the once-evil Helen (**Juliet Aubrey**) travels back in time to thwart efforts to prevent the evolution of humans. Brought to you by the creators of *Walking With Dinosaurs*, *Primeval* is great fun, with great special effects

and always high action. According to the BBC America site, a full-length feature film is in the works for release in 2010 (yes!).

And finally, for those of you who want to get in on the sci-fi fun from the getgo, check out the U.S. premiere of

Being Human, Saturday, July 25, at 8pm. This look at three twentysomething roommates has a wildly intriguing twist: The roommates are a werewolf, a vampire, and a ghost. George (Russell Tovey) is the awkward, shy guy who lives in anxious anticipation of turning

into a bloodthirsty predator every full moon. His more confident and laid-back roommate, Mitchell (Aidan Turner), is a 118-year-old vampire, battling his addiction to human blood and trying to avoid involvement in the vampire underworld. (The local constable, and evil vampire, is planning a "mass conversion" of the human-run world into a vampire-ruled world.) George and Mitchell move into their modest apartment, seeking to blend in while marking time in their unremarkable hospital aide jobs. But soon after moving in, they discover they are not alone. Annie (Lenora Crichlow) "lives" in their apartment, too. Killed in the apartment, she spends her time longing for her life with her former fiancé, the apartment landlord who comes by from time to time.

Blending soap opera, comedy, and horror, overlaid with werewolf-vampire-ghost lore, is no easy task. Purists will balk at how the series bends rules (Mitchell the vampire travels in daylight; Annie the ghost leaves the house). But you miss the point if you get stuck on those infractions. The real treat of the series comes in contemplating the question, what *does* it mean to be human? The central idea – that each of these characters is trying to be the best person he or she can be, given his or her limitations, faults, and secret desires – is not only smartly done; it's amusing and sometimes surprisingly touching.

### **Merchants of Soul**

Spoon's sold-out stand at Stubb's last weekend didn't exactly cool the furnace blast baking Central Texas. Just the opposite, in fact: Eight people were treated for heat exhaustion on Thursday's opening night alone, according to the South West Emergency Action Team. The handpicked openers did little to quell the discomfort but proved an engaging study in contradictions, beginning that night with the dark humor of Portland, Ore.'s Quasi, grounded by Sleater-Kinney drummer Janet Weiss. Local honky-tonker Dale Watson declared his intentions early Friday night with Merle Haggard's "Mama Tried," while Alan Sparhawk delved deep into Low's depressive tension. Alone onstage Saturday, Bradford Cox of Deerhunter issued confrontational confessionals under the alias Atlas Sound, climaxing with a haphazard reimagining of Neil Young's "Cortez the Killer." Likewise, Austin's the Strange Boys landed on the wrong side of a hard day's night, squeaking out a heatstroke scattershot of rhythm and blues.

For those sweating it out, Spoon rewarded in kind, performing on par with Wilco in terms of the intimacy and depth of the set lists - dating all the way back to 1997's Soft Effects EP with blistering renditions of "Mountain to Sound" on Thursday and Friday's "I Could See the Dude" – a feat that only improved with each passing moon. Since 2005's Gimme Fiction, Britt Daniel has bolstered his frontman appeal, evidenced by his repeated, strangled guitar deconstruction for "The Beast and Dragon, Adored" and sensual strut of "I Turn My Camera On." Grupo Fantasma's JewMex Horns jolted "Rhythm and Soul," "You Got Yr. Cherry Bomb," and "The Underdog" from 2007's crossover Ga Ga Ga Ga, which, with the encore rendition of "Eddie's Ragga" on Saturday, was accounted for in its entirety. Most surprising was how well the evanescent allure of "The Ghost of You Lingers" adapted to the live setting on all three shows and the raucousness of the Rolling **Stones**' "Rocks Off" that closed the final two encores. And thankfully, there's no end in sight as the band previewed an album's side worth of new material - terse, jagged, and deceptively simple pop songs that had fans moving on first listen. Good luck topping this feat for the CD release.



# **Mean Old World**


By all accounts, **Little Joe Washington** (pictured) should be a household name. The last of Houston's **Third Ward** bluesmen, the 70-year-old guitarist came up alongside the likes of **Albert Collins**, **Lightnin' Hopkins**, and **T-Bone Walker** but has spent most of the last two decades living on the streets, battling various addictions. Washington recently performed at the annual **Ponderosa Stomp** in New Orleans and occasionally holds down a Tuesday night residency at **Boondocks** in Houston, but the only way to contact him is through his longtime girlfriend, Mary. "It takes 24/7 supervision to hang with him," says **Eddie Stout** of Austin's **Dialtone Records** (see "Sheiks of Industry," Nov. 14, 2003),

which released Washington's proper studio debut, 2003's *Houston Guitar Blues*. Backed by local session cats, including current **Fabulous Thunderbirds Johnny** and **Jay Moeller**, saxophonist **Kaz Kazanoff**, and **Al Gomez Jr.** of the **West Side Horns**, Washington's latest, *Texas Fire Line*, is a freakishly raw collection of gutterblues, smoldering R&B, and instinctive street slurs, capable of sending **Black Joe Lewis** back to shucking oysters at **Quality Seafood**. "He's a walking songbook," Stout concludes. "If this cat cleaned himself up, wore a suit, he'd be every bit as popular as **Buddy Guy**. This guy can seriously play – when he wants to."


### **Paint Silver Gold**

Despite achieving serious accolades across the pond from *The Guardian* and *Mojo* magazine, **White Denim** has stayed relatively low key here on the home front. The local trio made only minor upgrades for the recording of its sophomore outing, *Fits*, a kaleidoscopic concoction of heavy-soul, released last month in the UK on **Full Time Hobby**. "We moved from a 27-foot 1940s Spartan into a 44- to 45-foot

1950s Spartan trailer that's more like a living space," drummer **Josh Block** told OTR in March. "It has a kitchen space that we can use and a bathroom. That's what success will do to you." All that should change now, as the band recently inked a deal with **Downtown Music**, home to **Gnarls Barkley**, **Cold War Kids**, **Mos Def**, and **Santigold**. The deal has been in the works since late 2007, when White

Downtown's ad-generated, online offshoot – and Fits will finally be issued stateside Oct. 20, coinciding with a full North American tour.
 "There are a couple more straight-up soul tunes, but for the most part we tried capturing what we've been doing onstage over the past year," prefaced singer/guitarist James
 Petralli. "The energy flow is a lot better."

### I. Restraint

The humidity inside Sound on Sound is breathing down our necks this Friday night, invading personal space and stepping on toes. It's understandable. Summer in Austin brings out the more primal instincts in us all. Half the dead punks on the wall here would agree.

Manikin's set starts with a beat – the opening notes to "Beat It," to be exact. It's the day after Michael Jackson's death, and everyone packed in the small North Loop record shop for Manikin's LP release nods and lifts beers in approval. Then drummer Alyse Mervosh subtly changes tempo, and the local quartet shifts from goofing off to straightening up. Suddenly, the oppressive sweat and curious smells inside the store become less of an annoyance than a salve.

Like forefathers Wire and PiL, Manikin is one of those bands that's really good at sounding like itself, something that's evolved through the 5-year-old quartet sculpting and resculpting its sound. There's no experimentation beyond its three-minute marches, no wanky solos or rock & roll posturing. Manikin songs are concise in the punk rock tradition and restrained in their execution.

The original lineup of guitarist/vocalist Alfonso Rabago, bassist Doug Cohenour, and drummer Lisa DiRocco formed in 2000. Eventually that splintered and Rabago, who was born in the Philippines but raised in Houston, folded in Madison, Wis., transplant Mervosh and bassist B.J. Schindler, who cut his teeth on punk in the small town of Copperas Cove, Texas. Former Houstonite Bill Jeffery pops in on trumpet occasionally. Between the four, they've been playing in local punk bands such as the Winks and Eastside Suicides for more than a decade, and the majority has more than one band (Mervosh is in the Hex Dispensers, Schindler in Tokyo Nites, Jeffery in Ichi Ni San Shi). The fact that Manikin doesn't play that often makes its live shows all the more impressive. Standing in Rabago's kitchen a week after the record release, the group plays down its disciplined work ethic.

"If we just play shows, we won't write new songs," explains Rabago.

"We're also old and have semireal jobs," adds Schindler. "So we have to wake up early. I can't speak for everyone here, but I'm not as fresh as I used to be."

"I will say this," pipes in Jeffery. "You're right about this band's work ethic. I'm outside the box a lot, but these guys practice their asses off."

Schindler: "At least once a month, religiously."

If getting things accomplished by increment is Manikin's m.o., its excellent third LP is the reward. After a four-year gap, *Stop the Sirens* (see "Texas Platters," June 26) marks the apogee of the group's sonic growth with a bit more polish but the same barbed intensity. Currently it's a vinyl-only release, with a CD version forthcoming this fall, though it's refreshing the band seems content with just petroleum product, a format lost on many younger music fans.

"My favorite story," Schindler relates. "The Riverboat Gamblers went on tour and sold some kid a 7-inch [single]. He came back and said, 'This won't fit in my CD player.'"

### II. Rhythm

Schindler and Mervosh are the foundation of Manikin's sound, the rhythmic backbone supporting every downstroke. Mervosh is the metronomic center, Schindler the left brain, his basslines distorted and snaky. Rabago's the right brain, the perfectionist. His guitar playing is more random, staccato, and his vocals sound like he's yelling from the bottom of a well. Before the four played in Manikin together, they were friends first, which helps when it comes to the democratic process of piecing together songs.

"We try to keep it steady so Alfie can do his thing," says Mervosh.

Rabago: "That's how we write our songs, through the rhythm. All the songs evolve from the bassline. It's almost like disco. The guitar's always the last piece."

In 2007, Richard Lynn, Super Secret Records CEO, told me: "You know how sometimes you see a show and it makes you happy to be exactly where you are? You don't want to be anywhere else or doing anything else; you're convinced there's no better place in the world than where you are at that very moment?

### Militaristic, ominous, dystopian, bleak – all descriptors of Manikin's sound, and there's certainly a Joy Division-esque obsession with control.

"That's how I feel whenever I see a Manikin show."

Lynn's felt that way for most of the past decade; he essentially started his label to put out Manikin's 2002 self-titled debut, after seeing the original trio play. Second album *Still*, released three years later, was still a bit scrappy, the band finding its footing among fuzzy SoCal punk riffs. 2007 7-inch *M Theory* showed shades of what was to come: thicker slabs of bass and Rabago's guitar pounding in migraine-sized bursts rather than steady jabs.

Militaristic, ominous, dystopian, bleak – all descriptors of Manikin's sound, and there's certainly a Joy Division-esque obsession with control (it's covered "Shadowplay"), but Rabago refers to the songs he writes as his view of the "human struggle." That theme's crystallized on *Stop the Sirens*, songs like "Leaders" and "Mirrors" the perfect pairing of black and neon, lost and found.

As much as a song like "Death March" encapsulates all those labels, it also describes Manikin's discipline at Sound on Sound: "We all fall down, fall down in a row. Cornered at the hideout. Playing at the final show."

### III. Repeat

The NYC No Wave scene of the late 1970s/early 1980s yielded many acts that considered themselves self-sufficient outsiders tackling themes of isolation and paranoia. That scene has evolved (or devolved, depending who you ask), spreading out over 30 years, and Manikin is a kindred spirit of that gutter-fabulous time. There's purity in its do-it-yourself ethos, from album art (designed by Rabago) to the bottled intensity of the group's live shows, distilled after years in its Red River scene of misfits.

Rabago admits the group wrote a majority of the songs on *Sirens* within the last few months, motivated by a deadline. Yet he's not quick to throw out an idea if he doesn't like it at first. That's the nature of Manikin's songs: They change.

"If you're a painter, you have to paint something," Rabago

says. "I like the idea that anyone can do it. That's why I don't do too many solos. I make it simple – play with one finger."

"That's what I love about this town," Jeffery adds. "I love local bands. I like hearing bands that haven't even recorded yet. That's inspiring to me. It took away a lot of the cynicism. Your friends come out to see you. Take that Sound on Sound show — all these people generally like each other."

"And they're also all in bands," Rabago laughs.

"Well, that's how we all met, just going to the same shows," Mervosh says.

"At Beerland," Rabago chimes in.

"Plus, we all love A Chorus Line!" Jeffery adds.

There's a hard, tough core to Manikin's music, but as individuals, their comfortable, interpersonal groove is well evident when they start talking about music and art and the scene they love so much.

"I like when a band feels like a gang," Schindler smiles.




### THE SUPREMES: A SAGA OF MOTOWN DREAMS, SUCCESS, **AND BETRAYAL** by Mark Ribowsky Da Capo Press, 480 pp., \$26

Shakespearian tragedy that conversely produced everlasting joy (and mindblowing basslines), Motown's musical legacy bears careful archaeology amongst casual enthusiasts lest their collateral heartbreak add to the mountain produced by Detroit's hardscrabble hothouse of dreamers, hustlers, and divas. ### **LOWSIDE OF** THE ROAD: A LIFE OF **TOM WAITS** by Barney Hoskyns Broadway Books, 640 pp., \$29.95

Tom Waits' life has played out like a movie, which is perhaps why British music writer Barney Hoskyns put every supporting char-



acter he could in his epic 600-plus-page bio of the singular music carney. Lowside of the Road is exhaustingly thorough, pieced together through previous interviews with Waits, for-




mer players and girlfriends, producers, promoters, employers, label heads, and hangers-on such as Chuck E. Weiss. Hoskyns' tale isn't just frothing fluff. It's quite revelatory, a must bio on one of music's more inscrutable characters, even if much of it is just the author's speculation after decades of following Waits' career. There's a good 300 pages on the singer's Beat-obsessed formative years in San Diego and L.A. in the 1960s and 1970s prior to the genesis of his many bar and diner tales. Hoskyns hinges the second half of

Lowside on his subject's life with wife and collaborator Kathleen Brennan, seen by some as a Yoko figure who cut Waits off from his past and by others as his saving grace, the reset button Waits needed at a time when drugs and alcohol were chipping away at his mojo. Since Waits wouldn't speak to Hoskyns for the book, and interviews with many friends and associates were declined via the Waits-Brennan stonewall, his use of quotes from archival interviews gets a bit tiring, though there's never a feeling of bitterness. Hoskyns is still a fan, his story ending with him standing outside in the rain after an Edinburgh show on last year's Glitter & Doom Tour, waiting for the man, the myth. Rather appropriately, Hoskyns just missed him. - Audra Schroeder






### HOW THE BEATLES DESTROYED ROCK 'N' ROLL: AN **ALTERNATIVE HISTORY OF AMERICAN POPULAR MUSIC**

by Elijah Wald Oxford University Press, 336 pp., \$24.95

How the Beatles Destroyed Rock 'n' Roll is arguably the most important book on popular music this decade. It's not simply a controversial title, nor a new notion – the suggestion that Sgt. Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band changed the course of rock & roll for the worse. What author Elijah Wald does differently is set up a counter-history of popular music from the point of view of everyman. It was the "journeyman dance bands, part-timers, amateurs, and dancers who kept the whole mass afloat." Further, "the segregation of American popular music that began with the British Invasion has hurt white music more than it hurt black." Wald's provocative approach works on the idea that history's written by the victors, and music history is written largely by white, middle-class critics who praise the underground while decrying the mainstream. This construct allows the author to avoid the popular and legitimate in favor of the forgotten or denigrated talents such as Paul




Whiteman and Connie Francis. It also buys him freedom to avoid conventional wisdom about rock history. "The Beatles destroyed rock 'n' roll, turning it from a vibrant black (or integrated) dance music into a vehicle for white pap and pretension." Wald is canny in his structure, avoiding a book-length defense of the inflammatory title by not addressing the Beatles until a few pages from the end, like the analogy of the Earth's history set as a 24-hour period and man's appearance only in the last few seconds. By avoiding well-trod clichés, Wald throws a fresh, appealing light on rock history, bravely recasting producer Mitch Miller as a knowledgeable hardass rather than Columbia Records' boogeyman of rock & roll, for example. It was not the British Invasion of '64 that made the electric guitar ubiquitous; it was the surf/instrumental trend of the previous two years. Wald warns when he's avoiding well-documented territory and earns kudos for citing Texan Adolph Hofner, Wald, whose previous books include Narcocorrido: A Journey Into the Music of Drugs, Guns, and Guerrillas (see "Phases & Stages," Jan. 11, 2002) and Escaping the Delta: Robert Johnson and the Invention of the Blues (see "Sheet Music," May 28, 2004), sometimes slips into a professorial tone, but not in the overly scholarly, university press way. And the conclusion is grim. Can it really be that the Fab Four, however innocently, led audiences away from the dance floor and "separat[ed] rock from its rhythmic and cultural roots"? If that's true, Pat Boone was totally the shit. - Margaret Moser

evolution from a Texas imitation of Van Halen to certified Platinum Cowboys From Hell, while Crain's lack of insight, heavy-handed repetition (such as how Abbott was killed the same day as John Lennon), and laughable Guitar Hero verbiage makes the whole thing simply unbearable. 

best selections for this anthology, and all criticisms should be directed his way: The introductions for each entry do little to set the scene or convey the significance of the album, and the interviews lack consistency in length and depth. While some of the choices are questionable (Botch's We Are the Romans, Monster Magnet's Dopes to Infinity), Precious Metal's otherwise impressive scope covers every facet of the genre, from Black Sabbath's second coming (Heaven and Hell) and Napalm Death's grindcore opus Scum to Eyehategod's dopesick sludge-metal Take as

Needed for Pain and Opeth's Orchid. The roundtable, oralhistory approach leads to interesting contradictions and revelations. Most intriguing are Sleep's purple-hazed recollections of its pilgrimage to Jerusalem and the still-boiling bitterness of Kyuss drummer Brant Bjork over Welcome to Sky Valley (he left the band immediately after its recording), a stark contrast to author J. Bennett's man-crush on current Oueen of the Stone Age Josh Homme. There are still

### **GIG POSTERS, VOL. 1: ROCK SHOW ART OF THE 21ST CENTURY**

GigPosters.com first posted in January 2001, and 100,000 images later its debut print catalog embosses the boast, "101 ready-to-frame posters." Make that a half-dozen, but get out an X-Acto knife for a few of the hundreds of rock show stamps filling the pages of Gig Posters. One hundred and one poster acts wrack up 11-by-14inch spreads while listing city of origin (hotbed Minnesota), education, method ("If scratch and sniff were a way to make a poster ..."), and influences: Rick Griffin, Bill Hicks, Polish propaganda, Mad magazine, Bill Watterson, Frank Kozik, Picasso, Saul Bass, Ed "Big Daddy" Roth, Jack Kirby, Vivarin, etc., etc. And this tidbit from




Austin's Billy Perkins: "And I'd say growing up in a post-Vietnam era in a trailer park in central Texas was an influence. I had a stepfather who'd done three tours in Nam and wasn't exactly loveable. That's the kind of situation that creates a need for some serious escapism." A lot of which gathers here in Andrio Abero's Sharon Stone-like Death Cab for Cutie, Brad Klausen's Queens of the Stone Age wolf, Dan Grzeca's swirling Explosions in the Sky, Dan McCarthy's skeletal love, Daniel Danger's New England noir, just plain Emek, the Eastern bloc existentialism of Jay Ryan, and Mat Daly's impressionism. And of course the ladies - Diana Sudyka's natural wonders, Eleanor Grosch's natural minimalism. Leia Bell's Sunday funnies, and Tara McPherson's space babes - plus favorite name brands: High on Fire, Wilco, Melvins, Spoon. Austin's aptly represented in Bobby Dixon, Decoder Ring Design Concern, Jamie Ward, Mark Pedini's 1950s animation subversion. Mig Kokinda, Rob Jones' White Stripes/Raconteurs ownership, and Todd Slater. Buda's Jared Connor and his inked metallurgy and Houston-bred Jermaine Rogers with his neoclassical futurism count too. Pictures of the artists are missed, and the stars' best works seldom equals their tearaways. One hopes for more internationals like Italy's Malleus Rock Art Lab for Vol. 2. Nevertheless, Alan Forbes' Sonic Youth/Fantastic Four eyeball, Cricket Press' dead-bee-off-ivy for Sufjan Stevens, and San Francisco's the Small Stakes' devilish Daniel Johnston tempt frames. Michael's awaits.

### A POWER STRONGER THAN **ITSELF: THE AACM AND AMERICAN EXPERIMENTAL MUSIC**

by George E. Lewis **University of** Chicago Press, 690 pp., \$35

A working-class, grassroots, musical/ cultural organization that got its start at percussionist/ co-founder Steve McCall's kitchen table on Chicago's south side in 1965. the Association for



the Advancement of Creative Musicians has had an international impact on the creation of experimental music. Indeed, Austin's late Tina Marsh modeled her long-running Creative Opportunity Orchestra after the cooperative ideals of AACM, and the decades-long stream of European avant players that have come through town, most often under the aegis of Epistrophy Arts, owes a huge debt to the pioneering endeavors of the collective. Forged from the ethos of self-determination in creating and controlling their original music, AACM is still very much alive today. Trombonist George Lewis was still a teenager when he joined the gathering in 1971, and his insider status gives him unique perspective into the entire history of the group as told through the personalities, issues, and context of the times.

The early days of the AACM can't be divorced from the social milieu that embraced the civil rights movement and Black Power struggles so prevalent during the 1960s and 1970s. Rife with information, this colossal tome includes well over 100 pages of footnotes and appendices, although it often reads like an academic endeavor. Nevertheless, those searching for the most complete account of this fascinating organization will find it essential reading. - Jay Trachtenberg

### **APOCALYPSE JUKEBOX:** THE END OF THE WORLD IN **AMERICAN POPULAR MUSIC**

by David Janssen & **Edward Whitelock** Soft Skull Press. 256 pp., \$17.95 (paper)

No other industrialized country has so thoroughly embraced the bitter end of itself as much as America. Not only are we, the people. routinely swept up into increasingly




histrionic paroxysms of fear and a general sense that the end times are just around the corner, but we've also managed to sublimate our night terrors via our nation's popular music, historical and contemporary. Think of

it as the skull beneath the song. Janssen and Whitelock come from academic backgrounds, and Jukebox is both a smart, intellectually chewy examination of how we got into this musical pas de deux danse macabre in the first place - why the phenomenon feels so intrinsically American – and what it says about us. Enter Leonard Cohen, the late Arthur Lee, Laurie Anderson, and Green Day to help make sense of it all. Devo's whip-smart Mark Mothersbaugh might be the best reason to pay money for this book. Anderson's Concert Amidst the Ashes, performed just days after 9/11 and mere blocks from the ghastly fresh anti-space that had just days before been the twin towers, is a gripping look into a famously inscrutable performer's mindset during the apocalypse next door. Her simple act of eloquent artistic courage tells us more about our relationship to our own musical mortality, and our often equally uneasy relationship to those who compose it, than almost everything else in this exhaustive, analytical, and long overdue examination of what keeps us all awake - Marc Sayloy at 3am.

### THE ROAD TO **WOODSTOCK**

by Michael Lang, with Holly George-Warren Ecco, 320 pp., \$29.99

One of the culturechanging events of the 20th century, Woodstock continues to prompt books exploring the phenomenon, so Michael Lang, who originated



the idea of "three days of peace and music," weighs in with his ultimate insider's account of what happened. Lang opens with biographical details that explain his position in what was known as the counterculture, growing up in New York, running a head shop in Florida, and producing 1968's Miami Pop Festival. The rest, a look at how Woodstock almost didn't happen, a day-by-day account of the music and mud, and its sad aftermath, makes for a gripping read. Co-writer Holly George-Warren employs interviews and previously published reminiscences, not only those involved with the festival's production but also musicians such as Carlos Santana, Jerry Garcia, Pete Townshend, and Jimi Hendrix, plus scenesters in attendance such as Abbie Hoffman, Wavy Gravy, and Greil Marcus, in weaving together Lang's narrative. The result is a colorful diary that drops you in the middle of a muddy field with nearly half a million acid-tinged hippies and leaves you yearning for simpler, more hopeful times.

### **ONE MAN'S MUSIC: THE LIFE AND TIMES OF TEXAS** SONGWRITER VINCE BELL

**by Vince Bell** University of North Texas Press, 261 pp., \$14.95 (paper)

Vince Bell's autobiography doesn't begin with the brutal car wreck on the early morning Austin streets of 1982, a disaster that nearly took his life and left him clawing for more than a decade through the lonely and

incommunicable purgatory of severe brain injury. Instead, One Man's Music opens simply on the resilient memory of his 1968 Martin D-28 dreadnought acoustic guitar, a raw, unwieldy beast that defined the trajectory of the songwriter's life even as it was steered dev-



astatingly and uncontrollably off course. Bell's prose flows with the same direct and poetic Texas style as his songs, unflinching and wrought with subtle detail. Even as his narrative becomes necessarily distracted with the at times awkwardly interiected recollections of his friends and family filling in the gaps of memory that the wreck provoked, Bell brings the reader into the struggle and isolation of his plodding recovery. Triumphs are registered in the smallest of improvements, all leading back to his remarkable restringing of the rugged Martin and the slow chiseling of confused phrases back into incomparable songs. One Man's Music is less the story of a music lifer than of a life resurrected by music. Freeman

### THE SONG IS **YOU: A NOVEL** by Arthur Phillips Random House, 272 pp., \$25

It's been a while since an opening sentence hooked me like this one did: "Julian Donahue's father was on a Billie Holiday record." The nine



pages that follow compose a riveting prologue that can stand on its own as a wonderful short story. It also sets the stage nicely for Phillip's compelling fourth novel. While Donahue the elder names his son for jazz saxophonist Julian "Cannonball" Adderley, this is hardly a jazz tale. Instead, at its heart, this is a story about how music affects us emotionally and psychologically: how we obsess over it, surrender to it; how the artists who create it cast a spell over us. It's a lesson about why music matters in our lives. In this case, the music's rock & roll and the artist in question is the up-andcoming Irish singer Cait O'Dwyer, who Julian happens to stumble upon by chance in a dive bar near his Brooklyn flat. His interest quickly becomes consuming, and in short order, Julian is stalking the singer, not without her encouragement. As Cait writes and performs songs that stoke the anticipation of their meeting, her career is rising meteorically. There are complications, of course: Julian's dissolved marriage, Cait's not so subtle admirers, and let's not forget the omnipresent specter of Julian's father's analog obsessions and how they ultimately shape his son in today's Digital Age. Phillips offers genuinely astute insights into the aesthetics of making music and why it plays such a powerful role in chronicling our lives, regardless if the inspiration comes from Cait O'Dwyer or Lady Day. - Jay Trachtenberg

Anna Ryan, 42, of Blue Springs, Mo., was baffled for years why her normal 140 pounds sometimes ballooned to as much as 260 despite her consistently rigorous diet and exercise regimen. Finally, two years ago (according to a June 2009 dispatch in London's *Daily Mail*), nocturnal tests performed by Overland Park, Kan., physician Scott Eveloff revealed a disorder: Ryan was a sleepwalker whose routine included as many as eight kitchen visits a night in which she gorged herself but of which she had no memory the next morning.

### **LEAD STORY**

Americans Fantasize; Germans Act: Two formerly well-off retired couples in Speyer, Germany, whose nest egg was largely wiped out by investments in subprime Florida mortgages, vented their anger by kidnapping their investment adviser, James Amburn, in June. They took him to one of the couples' vacation homes near the Austrian border, bound him like a mummy, and beat and tortured him over several days, fracturing two ribs, in repeated attempts to punish him and extort his own property as partial compensation for their losses. Police rescued him after he managed to send a coded message by fax.

### **FETISHES ON PARADE**

As the U.S. House of Representatives was voting on legislation in April to expand the protections of the hate-crimes law to "gender identity" and sexual orientation, Rep. Alcee Hastings of Florida publicly ridiculed a colleague (unnamed) who apparently confused homosexuals with fetishists. The colleague had proposed an amendment specifying that protection of the law would not extend to exhibitionists, pedophiles, or voyeurs, as well as "apotemnophiliacs, asphyxophiliacs, autogynephiliacs, coprophiliacs, klismaphiliacs," or people who practice something called "toucherism." (The amendment failed: thus, there is, for example, no enhanced penalty for assaulting a toucherist.)

### **LEADING ECONOMIC INDICATORS**

- People With Too Much Money: 1) A resident at 48 Commonwealth Ave. in Boston's Back Bay neighborhood paid \$300,000 in June for one outdoor, uncovered parking space, according to the listing agent. 2) Texas accountant Randy Reeves, 50, paid \$1,500 cash in April for the dentist's mold of the upper and lower teeth of Tiny Tim, which the late singer had given to the seller.
- In May, the University of Washington ran a two-month campaign of compassion to help out people hurt by the downturn in the economy. Fans of UW's football team who lost their jobs or are otherwise financially unable to renew their Huskies' season tickets can tap into a special philanthropic fund. A donor's \$500 tax-deductible gift to "Dawgs Supporting Dawgs" would permit a hard-hit fan to maintain his place on the priority season-ticket list (though this year's seats would be in an inferior location).

### **UNDIGNIFIED DEATHS**

1) A 34-year-old man survived a single-car rollover accident in Nelson, Calif., in May, extricating himself and walking away, but was struck and killed minutes later by an Amtrak train as he crossed railroad tracks.
2) In April in Houma, La., a 23-year-old motorist sideswiped a driver waiting to make a turn, drove away without stopping, and was killed minutes later when he crashed into another car.

### **SCIENCE ON THE CUTTING EDGE**

- They Get Paid for This?: 1) Researchers from Cleveland State University, for a recent journal article, assessed the physical traits of 195 female characters from the first 20 James Bond films, revealing that more were brunette than blond and that at least 90% were young, slim, and of above-average looks. 2) In June, a branch of the National Institutes of Health awarded a \$423,000 grant to the Kinsey Institute to find out why men seem to prefer not to use condoms during sex. (ABC News, reporting the announcement, contacted a sex-advice blogger, who revealed, free of charge, that it's because the condom reduces sexual sensation.)
- "Heyyyy, Like 'Arf-Arf,' Man": Nestor Waddell had to rush his 11-year-old Labrador mix, Jack, to the vet in May when he started acting strange during a walk, which had taken him into some bushes. The vet concluded that Jack had discovered and devoured some dry, harvested marijuana. According to Waddell: "[Jack's] eyes were kind of glossed over. ... When he was trying to walk, he was looking at his paw and then looking at the ground and then trying to get his paw to reach the ground but was unsuccessful."

### **FINE POINTS OF THE LAW**


Oops!: 1) Calvin Wells beat a certain, mandatory 10-year prison term for felony possession of cocaine because the verdict form signed by the jury contained a typographical error. Wells had 100 grams, but the verdict form certified "ten one hundred (100) grams," which an Ohio appeals court ruled in June could have meant "10/100th grams," which would be a misdemeanor whose maximum time Wells had already served. 2) Retired Florida Judge Rogers Padgett said in March that he is trying to undo an error he made in sentencing Kenneth Young to life without chance of parole for a series of armed robberies committed at age 14. Padgett said he thought the Florida no-parole law for kids applied only to murder and sexual assaults and never meant for Young, now 23, to be forever ineligible.


### **SMOOTH REACTIONS**



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

The Dallas World Aquarium and Zoological Garden is a great place to be at feeding time. Whether you're watching the sharks gulp down big pieces of meat or sampling a gourmet

sandwich in the cafe, the indoor animal park takes you on a wildlife safari around the globe that feeds your mind, spirit, and body.

It's no wonder that food, for the residents and for visitors, is more than just an afterthought at the aquarium. The brainchild of Daryl Richardson, the three-story theme park mixes his catering business with his love for wildlife. After hours, the ballrooms are often filled with catered parties.



As one of only a few privately owned zoos participating in the worldwide Species Survival Plan, the zookeepers are doing important work in protecting endangered species. A half-dozen of the residents are registered members of the captive breeding flock monitored by the Association of Zoos & Aquariums.

Also housed at the zoo are the cute little African, or black-footed, penguins. Native to the South African coast, the 2-foot-tall waterbirds had no trouble adjusting to the heat of Dallas summers. They stay in the shade and swim around their natural-looking pool.

Entering the aquarium is like walking into a rain forest with waterfalls and thick vegetation. The winding trail around the three levels can often be confusing, but give it time and you'll figure it out. There is so much to see, with nearly 100 different kinds of critters.

And not everything in the aquarium lives underwater. The animal garden has a large collection of colorful birds, as well as reptiles and mammals. In one corner you can watch a two-toed sloth cling to a tree branch; walk a few feet and see a crocodile hide below a fallen tree. In the aquarium section there are walls of glass tanks filled with colorful fish.

One of the most unusual sights at the aquarium is the Antillean manatees lazily swimming around their tanks. Distantly related to elephants, these sea cows are both friendly looking and menacing because of their size, especially at feeding time.

Nothing is more exciting than walking through the 40-foot-long transparent tunnel below the shark and ray tank. The big fish circle overhead as though they are picking out their next meal from the unsuspecting guests. So far, no visitors have gone missing.

The Dallas World Aquarium is located at 1801 N. Griffin St. in the West End Historic District of downtown Dallas. The garden is open daily from 10am to 5pm. Feedings happen every 30 minutes and include a short introduction of the animals by a staff member. Admission is \$18.95 for adults and \$10.95 for children. I'm in the Hellcats locker room before a **TXRD** Lonestar Rollergirls Roller Derby bout, and Jamie Lee is in the bathroom stall, telling

me that Roller Derby has saved her life.

"I was a drunk for 12 years. It started in my early teens, and basically, the party just didn't end, even after I started skating."

Known as Miss Amerikill, Jamie Lee joined the Hellcats just as soon as she could. "I remember seeing Roller Derby when I was 17, and I was like, 'I am going to do this!" she tells me later, after the Hellcats beat the Holy Rollers last Sunday at the Austin Convention Center. "My dad was a musician, and I was always around these rock star dudes. I wanted that. I wanted to be a rock star, except I'm not musical. But here were these girls that had these crazy sexy outfits and these wild badass Please write personas, and it just took Mr. Hackett at my breath away. Some plavingthrough@ of them are dentists or austinchronicle.com teachers or whatever, but in the rink they're someone completely different, and that's what I wanted."

Until February, the nonstop partying was part of that project. The team would usually hit a bar after a bout, and, invariably, Jamie Lee took things to a whole other level. "I was always either wasted or hung over. Everything took a back seat to drinking" - until, that is, she decided she'd had enough.

So had her teammates.

"I show up for practice after throwing up all over the place the night before, and I'm sweating Jim

Beam, and nobody is talking to me. It's like: 'Ouch! This is not going to be fun.' But then we all go outside, and they've decided they're going to have an intervention. Everybody told me how much I had done for them but how lately, I was just sucking it all away. You don't realize how self-centered you become. You don't think about the people you're hurting. So we just talked about that, and there was a little crying. Okay, a lot of crying. And I told them I wanted to do this, to get sober, and I needed their help. That was five months ago."

So, yeah, it wasn't really the skating that changed Jamie Lee's life. It wasn't taking out her aggressions in the rink, as

> much as she enjoys doing so. It wasn't even having a tough-as-nails alter ego to slip into. What made all the difference was having a group of women who cared about her and realizing how much she cared

about them. It's the belonging that gave her strength.

"Roller Derby gave me that. I feel like I can do anything now. I have that unstoppable feeling. I'm more comfortable with myself. Because of all of the support and love the Hellcats have given me, I've realized I don't have to be tough all the time, full of rage and fear. I can just be myself, and, yes, part of that is being Miss Amerikill, the badass, but another part is just being Jamie Lee, just content with myself."

The Austin Aztex and the University of Texas present the first-ever Copa Aztex, featuring two of Mexico's biggest professional men's soccer clubs, Cruz Azul and Tigres, at UT's Mike A. Myers Stadium, 7pm, Saturday, July 18. It's the final preseason tune-up for the clubs, which open the 2009 Apertura season next week. Tickets are \$30 and \$50. Doors open at 4pm, with a pregame concert by **Espinoza Paz**. This could be a huge deal for soccer in Austin, not just because of the game itself but because it's the first time UT has teamed with an outside entity to use its gorgeous Myers Stadium. (Another first for both the Aztex and Myers: "adult beverages" at the pregame beer garden!) This event is the beginning of a three-year agreement between UT and the Aztex.

The Aztex lost a 2-1 heartbreaker to the league-leading Portland Timbers last Saturday, as an injury-time tying goal by **Gifton Noel-Williams** was negated by a defensive breakdown and a Timbers winner on the last touch of the game. "The Gift," who's been nursing a hamstring injury all season, had come on as a second-half sub - just his second appearance since May 8 and his first effective play since April. The Timbers ran their unbeaten streak to 14 games; the Aztex are at Minnesota this Saturday.

The Aztex U23s host the El Paso Patriots in their last game of the regular season, this Friday, July 17, 7:30pm, needing a win to have a chance at first place in the PDL Mid South or at least a tie to have a shot at the playoffs as the second- or third-place team. Note the new venue: Round Rock ISD Athletic Complex, 10211 W. Parmer.

The **U.S. men** will be heavily favored in the **Gold Cup** quarterfinals against Panama, Saturday, July 18, 7pm, live from Philadelphia on Fox Soccer Channel. The other quarterfinals are Canada vs. Honduras, Guadeloupe vs. Costa Rica, and Mexico vs. Haiti; the semifinals are Thursday, July 23, with the final on

The U.S. women take on Canada on Sunday in Rochester (2pm, ESPN) and Wednesday in Charleston (7pm, FSC). The Rochester game is a homecoming for Abby Wambach, who'll be trying to get her 100th national team goal in front of her hometown fans.

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


# An Inspector Calls

In J.B.
Priestley's An
Inspector Calls,
it's not whodunit as much as
everyone-dunit.



strange in this premise. Why would an inspector get involved when no real crime has been committed? But as Priestley and his play will carefully demonstrate, we do not live alone. People affect other people's lives, often causing destruction through selfish and thoughtless deeds. The play runs like a socially conscious murder-mystery, an indictment of the upper class. Refusing charity, refusing pity, refusing a raise, refusing love – all these accumulated unkindnesses killed Eva Smith, and now an inspector has come to exact verbal retribution on the perpetrators.

Written in 1945 and set in 1912, An Inspector Calls feels antiquated, and Different Stages' production reflects this quality. The experience is pleasant, but the drama isn't quite there. Suicide doesn't pack the dramatic punch it did six decades ago, not to our CSI-inundated ears. So while the characters repeatedly say how distraught they are over this terrible event, the audience just waits for the plot to move along. Early on, we learn that the inspector is going to methodically question each character. With each successive interrogation, we soon easily guess which fish in this theatrical barrel are responsible for which aspects of the poor girl's demise. The audience is far too far ahead of Priestley and his machinations. What keeps things interesting are the different generations' responses to the lines of inquiry. Arthur and Sybil Birling, the heads of this wealthy household, are incensed by the implication they had any responsibility for Eva Smith. But the younger generation, Sheila and Eric Birling and Sheila's fiancé, Gerald Croft, seem to grasp what the inspector believes: that sometimes social responsibility should matter more than good business.

Different Stages' production, directed by Norman Blumensaadt, does not miss the mark. The play is communicated; the story is clear; the message is sent home. But the production is neither particularly powerful nor gripping. A few moments of jarring light shifts and aggressive musical underscoring may be intended to amp up the drama, but, due to their clunkiness, they elicit laughter instead. Overall, the performances are fairly weak. The night I attended, more than one actor was forgetting lines to the point of distraction. The strongest performances are by Garry Peters, whose inspector possesses relentless logic and passionate empathy, and Nicole Swahn, whose Sheila Birling appears believably shocked and ashamed by her privilege. Andy Smith also does nice work as Eric Birling, the troubled son.

Paul Davis' set provides an elegant dining room in which the secrets of the wealthy are revealed. And as the play progresses, the dining room shifts orientation, providing a new angle on the set for each act and a nice echo of the idea that the inspector is trying to get the Birlings to see a new perspective. Priestley was fascinated with time, particularly with J.W. Dunne's notion that the past, present, and future are all happening simultaneously. An Inspector Calls plays with this concept in a way that would make M. Night Shyamalan proud, but it makes for a long and repetitive journey to get to the payoff of the final twist. In the end, a lasting impression is left by the mysterious inspector whose final line sums up his moral ferocity: "We don't live alone. We are members of one body. We are responsible for each other. And I tell you that the time will soon come when, if men will not learn that lesson, then they will be taught it in fire and blood and anguish. Good night." - Hannah Kenah

# Henry V

The Off Center, through July 25 Running time: 1 hr, 20 min

Good plays can come in expensive, elaborate packages with flashy lights and tour buses. They can also come equipped with far less and still leave the audience feeling privileged to have attended.



Robert Faires' one-man performance in a pared-down  $Henry\ V$  is an exquisitely simple and thoughtful evening of theatre, one that will send audiences away feeling smarter than when they came in.

Already, the skeptics will have two complaints. One is that Faires is the editor of this Arts section, so of course I'm going to say his work is brilliant. There's no way to respond to that except to ask if anyone who has already seen  $Henry\ V$  shares the same doubts.

(Besides, Faires is the kind of guy who I could probably say in print has stinky boogers coming out of his face, and provided it had some basis in fact, he'd cheerfully allow it.)

The other qualm is from those who understandably say: "Henry V? A one-man show? Are you sure you want to do that?" It's true – the play is challenging to stage even when you have lots of actors. There are battle scenes, council chamber meetings, and a story that spans the English Channel. Shakespeare was aware of how ambitious the story was, and at the beginning of his script, he even begs the audience's indulgence as he and his actors build monumental scenery with the bareness of what they had at their disposal.

What Faires and his creative team have done is distill the script down to the essentials, and in keeping it simple, they have succeeded in staging an enormous play with clarity. For example, in portraying several characters of widely varying ages, classes, and origins, it might have seemed tempting to keep a rack full of costume changes on hand as Faires switches from one persona to the next. Instead, the slightest cock of his glasses or adding a slouch is all that's needed to show a new character. The audience on opening night chuckled at each transformation, laughing from that fun hit you get when someone engages your imagination.

Faires and director Catherine Weidner also find creative use for their very few props. It spoils the fun to say too much in advance, but it gives a spark of enjoyment to see a flashlight or a sweater vest turn into something completely different before your eyes. Lighting designer Jason Amato also deserves mention for, again, keeping it simple. The lighting changes say just enough to encourage the audience to imagine for themselves the details of a new morning or the aftermath of a battle.

What emerges from the sparseness of this production is the story of a man learning how to be king. Shakespeare lovers will recall that the Henry of this play spent all of *Henry IV*, Parts *I* and *II* cavorting with scoundrels and drunks. What Shakespeare and Faires give us in this play is a man growing up and deciding for himself the meaning of mercy as he leads an army into war. His ordinary humanity is reassuring as we watch him confront the ugliness and challenges of leadership with what little he has at hand.

# 'Alphabet'

Domy Books



Stark marks erect the architecture of written thought and speech: Alphabet. There is, of course, the pedestrian example of what

embodies the sentence you're reading now. Pedestrian yet perfectly functional, especially given its current restrictions of size (small) and substrate (cheap newsprint, unless you're scanning this online), and, if sufficiently enlarged and provided the proper setting, able to be appreciated for the abecedarian beauty it is. Top o' the morning to you, Franklin Gothic, you're looking lovely this day!

There are also, not as a matter of course but as a matter of special consideration and industry, examples of alphabet-rendering (typography, the elitists call it) that are to this utilitarian text what the Grand Canyon is to the ditch that used to be in Aldus Manutius' backyard. Now, yes, that ditch was hand-wrought and served a specific human purpose, and the Grand Canyon just grew and serves an environmental function, but we're talking looks here, so switch those attributes in your mind while you wander into the back gallery of Domy Books.

Fifty-one artists and designers from around the world have interpreted the solid 26 letters of English in ways that will delight and astound you, perplex and confound you, and examples of their artistry are printed oversize in deepest black on fine white paper for this touring show from Post Typography and Artscape. Now they're framed upon all four walls of Domy's secondary space and overflowing into that venue's main room. What

you'll see ranges from the photoimages of found or manufactured objects (Andrew Byrom's series of welded steel-frame tables and chairs that, captured from the appropriate angle, become letters) to handcrafted alphabets evoking spray paint, board games, ballet dancers, culinary equipment, and many permutations of the iconic letterforms themselves. The styles in this relentlessly monochrome swath of creation stretch from extremes of indecipherable minimalism to seemingly OCDinspired maximal - some of these alphabets must have taken days and days to render with pen and ink - and provide viewers with a spectrum of lettristic creation, an array of possibilities that may be helplessly recalled whenever you next encounter the printed word.

If this brief review spurs you to go see the exhibition, then you're not immune to the potential brilliance of graphic design in general. (Is anyone, really?) So note, please, that you'll have to walk through the retail interior of Domy Books in order to enter the gallery – and you might be tempted to purchase more of the store's colorful wares than your budget allows. If necessary, follow the kind suggestion of Domy proprietor Russell Etchen (who arranged this show with local design powerhouses Little Mule Studio and Decoder Ring Design Concern): "You can always leave your wallet in the car." - Wayne Alan Brenner



# Harry Potter and the Half-Blood Prince Michael Gambon, Alan Rickman, Maggie St. Warwick Davis, Tom Felton. (PG, 153 min.)

Before, the films were just garnish, really, to a marvelous text that continued to mature simpaticolike with its hero Harry Potter (Radcliffe), the orphan wizard predestined to battle dark Lord

Voldemort (Ralph Fiennes). But now, with author J.K. Rowling having shut the proverbial book (all seven of 'em) on the Potterverse, the films are all we have to go on, which is why we want so very much for the filmmakers to get it right, Rowling's potent mix of the cozy and the calamitous. Yates returns as director after his superlative Harry Potter and the Order of the Phoenix (besting, in my book, even Alfonso Cuarón's artful, toil-and-trouble Harry Potter and the Prisoner of Azkaban). From its terrifying first tangle with soul-sucking Dementors to the tragic last-act death of Harry's godfather, The Order of the Phoenix was tonally true to the deepening sinisterness of Rowling's books: This is, after all, a world at war. The opening frames of The Half-Blood Prince further the series' urgency and panic: Voldemort's agents, the Death Eaters, have launched a full-scale assault on both wizards and Muggles (regular folk, that is), sacking shops and laying waste to the Millennium Bridge in an opening volley that plays like a vise grip on the lungs. But why then, when the students return for a new term at their beloved Hogwarts School of Witchcraft and Wizardry, does it all feel like business as usual? Gone is any escalation, the ever-thickening, ever-sickening sense of dread; The Half-Blood Prince would rather flush pink with its lovesick teens than forward-thrust toward the mammoth battle of good vs. evil. Don't get me wrong: It's a giggling good time, watching adolescent boys try to work out their feelings, and the film's trio of leads - Radcliffe as tormented Harry; Grint as his lunkheaded best friend, Ron Weasely; and Watson as their tart Gal Friday, Hermione Granger - has grown from stuttering child actors mere babes! - into confident, even subtle performers with an easy rapport. But with all the hemming and hawing over love stuff, the action and the

epicness have gone missing. The films have always had a revolving door for cast and crew, which has led to some delightful discoveries: This year's vintage is Broadbent as an overpuffed potions instructor, his bushy, cocked eyebrows doing most of the work. But that revolving door also means the loss of earlier talents; The Order of the Phoenix had two that now, in retrospect, proved integral to that film's success, cinematographer Slawomir Idziak (who previously shot for Kieslowski, 'nuff said) and scripter Michael Goldenberg. Despite the occasionally arresting visual, new director of photography Bruno Delbonnel's work tips toward murky and undistinguished (which may have something to do with a reported rejiggering of a radical color palette the studio had gripes with). And after a one-film breather, screenwriter Steve Kloves has tapped out something both sprawling and yet weirdly slight. Fidelity to the source - all 757 pages of it - was of course an impossibility, and we get that certain subplots would have to go (fare thee well, Fleur and Bill, Tonks and Lupin). But Kloves inexplicably guts the book's last 100 pages - you know, the part you wept your way through - torching major plot points and character motivations. a thrilling battle, a state funeral, and a heart-invour-throat declaration of self-sacrifice. It's always a pleasure to be in the company of Potter, and when looking back at the just-competent first outings, well, baby, you've come a long way. But still: Where's the magic, huh? - Kimberley Jones

# new *reviews*

I LOVE YOU, BETH COOPER D: Chris Columbus; with Hayden Panettiere, Paul Rust, Jack Carpenter, Lauren Storm, Lauren London, Shawn Roberts. (PG-13, 102 min.)

There are so many things wrong with

I Love You, Beth Cooper - and so many missed opportunities for genuine teencomedy greatness - that it's difficult to know where to begin. But, hey, let's start with the miscasting of Rust, who, as high school übernerd and valedictorian Dennis Cooverman, sets the plot in motion when he ill advisedly rhapsodizes about his leggy blonde inamorata (Panettiere) during his sweaty, nervous commencement address. Rust has the physical and social markers of a high school pariah down pat: possessed of a schnozzle that would put both Jimmy Durante and Cyrano de Bergerac to shame, a haircut that might as well have the words "kick me" shaved into it, a fingers-on-chalkboard nasal whine. and a best friend (ably played with marginally less schtick by Carpenter) who sports the calculatedly retro fashion sense of Doonesbury circa 1974. Rust's next gig is as one of Quentin Tarantino's Inglourious Basterds, and if that isn't a 180-degree résumé boomerang, I don't know what is. Here, however, his performance is something of a juggling act - the uneven script was adapted by comedian and sometime New Yorker writer Larry Doyle from his novel - and one that unfortunately has too many clichés in the air and far too alighting where they count. We're meant to feel sympathy with this geeky protagonist who is brave enough to admit his secret high school dream aloud, but Dennis is written as such a selfdefeating, meek little dweeb that it's often easier to root for his archenemy, the testosterone-and-steroid-fueled jarhead Kevin (Roberts). Roberts is a veteran of Degrassi: The Next Generation as well as the past two George A. Romero zombie films, so you'd think that by now he'd have a handle on how to play a brain-dead homunculus with some sort of jocky panache. But that's not the case. As with many a teen comedy to come down the pike in the quarter-century since John Hughes' genre-defining Weird Science, Roberts is playing Bill Paxton playing that film's evil older brother, Chet; the resemblance between the young Paxton and this new incarnation really is striking, but not in a good way. It just feels lazy. It's worth pointing out at this point that I Love You, Beth Cooper's director, Columbus, is a Hughes protégé from way back, albeit one who came to directing after Hughes' phenomenal teen-comedy run had all but petered out. (That said, Columbus, the screenwriter, was responsible for some seriously awesome and/or rad Eighties fare, including Gremlins and its sequel; the edgy, hypercool Aidan Quinn debut, Reckless; and the now-indisputably

classic The Goonies. Nice run, but it didn't last.) Ultimately, and like many depressed teenagers, Beth Cooper lives, loves, and dies by its own hand. It takes its sweet time getting there, too, with an interminable first act that sets the stage for a huge payoff that never comes. Columbus has peppered the proceedings with various homages to ur-teen comedies such as Mv Bodyguard and Say Anything, and he even works in a cameo from Freaks and Geeks' Samm Levine, but it's all for naught. Despite the film's obvious best intentions - and its myriad unintentional teen-comedy clichés - Beth Cooper ends up as little more than a recursive footnote to the infinitely better up-all-night teen comedies of, you guessed it, John Hughes. - Marc Savlov ★ → Barton Creek Square, Hill Country Galleria, CM Round Rock, Southpark Meadows, Highland, Gateway, Tinseltown North, Tinseltown South, Westgate

### THE MERRY GENTLEMAN

D: Michael Keaton; with Keaton, Kelly Macdonald, Tom Bastounes, Bobby Cannavale, Darlene Hunt, Guy Van Swearingen. (R, 110 min.)

This dark, quiet, but mildly stirring movie about a laconic hit man suffering from walking pneumonia of the lungs and soul (Keaton) and an angelic receptionist (Macdonald) in flight from her physically abusive husband (Cannavale) is destined to be best remembered as Keaton's debut as a director and for Macdonald's lovely portrayal of another damaged survivor (No Country for Old Men, Trainspotting). Keaton was already cast as the ironically referenced "merry gentleman" of the title when screenwriter and intended director Ron Lazzeretti fell ill shortly before shooting began and the actor took over the helm. Unfortunately, the ironic tone of the Christmastime title doesn't extend past the obvious contradiction, and few traces of humor or lightness of touch are to be found anywhere else in the movie. Filled more with character studies than narrative intrigues, The Merry Gentleman also provides only sketchy personality details and background information. We never learn what makes Keaton's proficient hit man Frank Logan suicidal at the outset: Completing a hit from a rooftop across the way from his target, he leans toward the ledge as Macdonald's Kate Frazier leaves work while talking about angels and happening to look up, sees Frank, screams, and causes him to flee. The next day when the cops learn about the dead man in the building across the street, they return to interview Kate, suspecting the man she saw on the roof had something to do with the shooting. One of the detectives (Bastounes) is taken with Kate (as is most everyone who comes into the orbit of this mysterious woman with the charming Scottish lilt in her voice). Frank (whose name is an iron-



ic contradiction to his nature) also feels a bond toward this woman, and these two sad souls indirectly become each other's guardian angel. Adding to the story's gloom are the dark urban streets of Chicago, where the story is set. With the help of cinematographer Chris Seager, Keaton places the characters firmly within this landscape so that their very stolidity makes their more enigmatic qualities seem somewhat grounded. Still, the story moves slowly and deliberately, and these emotively placed human chess pieces are often our only narrative guide. Maybe it's for the best since the story tropes about angels and assassins are fairly shopworn, but the reticence of The Merry Gentleman adds little new to the tradition. - Marjorie Baumgarten

The Da Vinci Code's symbologist, Robert Langdon (Hanks), returns in Angels & Demons another Roman Catholic Church conspiracy piece from bestseller Dan Brown, as do many of the same calling cards of the first: oogly boogly men in vestments, foreign-speaking lady sidekicks, and elaborate puzzles teased in dead languages. The bulk of Angels & Demons takes place in chase mode. A couple of sequences stand out as suspenseful and smartly rendered, but something's surely amiss, especially in a production of this scale, with this kind of talent at the helm. when these are exceptional instances and not the norm. Screenwriters David Koepp and Akiva Goldsman don't require, or even particularly encourage, the audience to use its own gray cells in unraveling the plot (which mostly consists of Hanks pointing at an ancient text or crumbling cathedral and muttering something explanatory), so the only thrill here comes from the adrenaline kick of the chase. Mendes' strange journey through the American psyche (American Beauty, Road to Perdition, Jarhead, Revolutionary Road) takes the Britishborn filmmaker down another blind alley in his latest film. Away We Go. It is essentially a road trip movie, highlighting the travels of expectant parents Burt (Krasinski) and Verona (Rudolph) as they search for a place to settle down and raise their child. Their relationship's naturalism clashes with the anxieties of the nutty, deluded, and broken characters they visit along the way, and inevitably, Burt and Verona wind up seeming superior and special, which puts an unpleasant spin on Away We Go. See it for the performances - they are delights from the leads to the characters in the episodic vignettes. But the film's vision of Gen-Y nesting is liable to leave you up a tree. Only people with no real problems can devote so much time to finding the perfect place to feather their nest and raise their chicks. (06/19/2009) Mariorie Baumgarten



## THE BROTHERS BLOOM D: Rian

Johnson; with Rachel Weisz, Adrien Brody, Mark Ruffalo, Rinko Kikuchi, Robbie Coltrane, Maximilian Schell. (PG-13,

Johnson's films (Brick) require an imaginative leap, a willingness to overlook the wirework, so to speak, and just believe. The Brothers Bloom – a con-man caper with the spiritual prints of Paper Moon, Butch Cassidy, and Boris and Natasha - isn't as strenuously cerebral as *Brick*, nor does it, in the end, altogether hang together. The film's dominant themes are fraternal love and loathing, the con as a means of storytelling, and the power that comes with controlling the con, with controlling the *story*. If you've ever known that peculiar pain of certainty that you were born in the wrong era, then the mood he's conveyed here via costume and art design, a jazzy retro score, and capital-letter sentiments such as loyalty, fraternity, and an old-fashioned swoon - is a balm. Cohen's third feature - following 2002's mostly overlooked Ali G Indahouse and 2006's hugely successful Borat - is a lot like its rampantly gay, Viennese protagonist: The film may have only the best of intentions, but it tries too hard and ends up being shallow, superficial, and only sporadically funny. It's certainly a far cry from the comic/cultural lunacy of Borat, which in hindsight proves to be a surprisingly good-natured mockumentary/provocation when compared to the downright mean-spiritedness of this new(-ish) incarnation. Brüno feels less like a skewering of American homophobia than it does an excuse to string together a series of jury-rigged sketches and encounters with the likes of Ron Paul (who exits in a queer-phobic huff after Brüno comes on to him in a hotel room) that probably wouldn't have passed muster on Da Ali G Show. They don't make women, sexy but regal, like Michelle Pfeiffer (The Age of Innocence, Frears' Dangerous Liaisons) much anymore, and Cheri is quite a monument to her. Here, as Madame Léa de Lonval, a courtesan aging out of an industry and an epoch. Pfeiffer is enmeshed in another dangerous liaison, this one with the child of a once fellow, now former, courtesan named Madame Peloux (Bates). Peloux's son, Chéri (Friend), is spoiled, unformed, and 30-plus years Léa's junior. Léa takes him on initially as a twilight-years lark, but it isn't until their forced separation that the true depths of Chéri and Léa's feelings for each other emerge - complex feelings colored by real-world concerns of practicality, propriety, and the tragic mismatch of their birthdates. This is sensual, cerebral, and surprisingly weighty stuff; only in its last moments does Cheri faintly bobble, with an overpacked final confrontation, no room for reflection, and a rushed coda. Still, their betterknown uncles - including Keenen Ivory, Shawn, and Marlon - pop up in writing, acting, and producing capacities, and Dance Flick doesn't stray from the playbook of previous Wayans brothers' genre parodies. This one reproduces almost in toto the plot from 2001's Save the Last Dance. Dance Flick is what it is, and for what it is, it's a decent enough spot of silliness. Fanboys have waited patiently for Raimi to return to the "splatstick" horror genre he more or less invented with the Evil Dead trilogy. Drag Me to Hell never quite hits the psychotronic heights of Evil Dead II - Raimi's working with a PG-13 rating this time - but, in the interim, the director's ability to create nerve-racking suspense and jarring shocks has been honed to a razor's edge. This film moves with the herkyjerky gait of a spook-house trolley car, rocketing along for whole sequences and then punctuating them with shock cuts and tinnitus-inducing Foley cues that'll have audiences wishing they had borrowed a pair of grandma's Depends. Raimi co-wrote the script with his brother Ivan in the downtime between Spider-Man films, and the story is as basic a terror tale as they come. ### **EARTH** D: Alastair Fothergill, Mark Linfield; narrated by James Earl Jones. (G. 90 min.)

Earth is at the very least peripherally concerned with the planet and its dwindling prospects, but the real renewable resource here is the groundbreaking Planet Earth miniseries. After a few other permutations, the program has now been whittled down to 90 minutes for an American theatrical run. The film tracks the migration patterns of a trio of mothers elephant, polar bear, and humpback whale - and their newborns, as well as provides a snapshot of animal and plant life in various ecosystems around the world, oftentimes via time-lapse photography as gorgeous and surreal as anything you'd find in a Michel Gondry film. Although the film has several humorous set-pieces, it doesn't shy away from the fundamental cruelty of life in the wild (despite judicious editing of the carnage). Love, he argues, is nothing more than "magical comfort food for the weak and uneducated. a sentiment he lifted from his mentor. Wayne ushers Connor through an evening of reflection and reckoning, with the aim of nudging Connor back into the arms of his first love, Jenny (Garner, with negligible screen time). Wayne is a quaint relic not nearly as amusing as the filmmakers seem to think he is - but harmless enough. Not so with McConaughey's wolfish Connor. ### THE GIRL FROM MONACO

Equal parts French sex farce, Mai-Decembre romance, middle-aged white male fantasy, and wannabe Hitchcockian intrigue, The Girl From Monaco can be a chore to sit through, but not for the obvious reasons. It just takes its own gorgeous time in unfolding, and while the views of sun-spattered Monaco are breathtaking, they're not enough to make the film anything more than the cinematic hors d'oeuvre that it is. Parisian defense attorney Bertrand Beauvois (Luchini) arrives in Monaco and quickly finds himself the object of desire of sexy twentysomething and local weather personality Audrey (Bourgoin). The steam percolating between the two is meant to be heady and erotic - revelatory, even - but it subsides quickly, leaving you wanting something more than the tenets of the long-ago clichéd bedroom comedy. Fontaine gives it to you, too, but it's too little too late and, like its protagonist, you end up with plenty to think about, puzzle over, and forget. (07/10/2009)

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

The Hangover instantly has the feel of one for the ages. It is deliciously darker than Phillips' previous comedies, Old School and Road Trip, but it isn't as thick with malice as those credits suggest. "Bromance" is too dopey of a word for what goes on here; The Hangover honors the significance of male friendship without insisting on its primacy. The occasion here is the Vegas-set bachelor party for Doug (Bartha), organized by his three groomsmen: Phil (Cooper), straitlaced Stu (Helms), and Doug's nonsequitur-spouting future brother-in-law, Alan (the sublime Galifianakis, so outré he's toeing performance art here). They wake the next morning, surrounded by the spoils of the party (a scorched hotel suite, a missing tooth, a tiger in the bathroom), but with zero recollection of how it all happened. An edgier film could have been carved out of that premise, but you'd be hardpressed to find one as consistently, relentlessly funny. - Kimberley Jones (06/05/2009)

# HANNAH MONTANA: THE MOVIE

More surprising is the fact that some attention (if not an exhaustive amount) has been put into the thing: Hannah Montana: The Movie is not the nakedly consumerist vehicle cynics like me have come to expect. In fact, it's a broad-stroked, agreeable-enough lark about Miley putting Hannah aside to reconnect with her Tennessee roots - and make eves at that farm-fresh horse wrangler from her childhood. THE HURT LOCKER D: Kathryn Bigelow: with Jeremy Renner, Anthony Mackie, Brian Geraghty, Guy Pearce, Ralph Fiennes, David Morse, Evangeline Lilly, Christopher Sayegh. (R, 131 min.)

The hybridization of arthouse and action doesn't happen all that often, but it should, if mashing the two genres makes for film as riveting and rattling as The Hurt Locker. Bigelow's film tells the story of an elite bomb-dismantling squad winding down a tour of duty in Iraq. "Story" is perhaps misleading, as The Hurt Locker, very little interested in character backstory or conventional plot, charts a series of missions, some more successful than others, with only the occasional interlude of drunken roughhousing. There's no moralizing here, no monologuing about why we fight: The Hurt Locker mostly restricts its focus to dramatizing the dirty work of bombdismantling in a war zone, and that it does brilliantly. The tension is enough to make you slightly sick, and the overall mood of the thing is deeply dispiriting, but then, nobody ever said that war isn't hell. (07/10/2009) - Kimberley Jones

### ICE AGE: DAWN OF THE

3-D has finally found a home to call its own. Animated fare such as this third outing in the prehistoric, non-nuclear-family franchise use the stereoscopic fad to good effect, offering vertiginously dizzying flights with pterodactyls and toothy battles with the saurians of the title. Returning from the series' last installment are young woolly mammoths-in-love Manny (Romano) and Ellie (Latifah) and their extended, multispecies herd: insecure sloth Sid (Leguizamo), saber-toothed tiger Diego (Leary), and possums Eddie (Peck) and Crash (Scott). Joining them is newcomer Buck, a Melville-spouting mad weasel with an Ahab complex and the voice of Pegg. Ice Age: Dawn of the Dinosaurs doesn't have a lot more to say than it did last time about accepting a nontraditional family, but what it does have going for it are its well-delineated characters and a relatively sharp sense of the absurdities of the close-knit clan. I blame both popculture creep (what was once strange and vaguely subversive is now old hat) and Ferrell, who stars here as the dullish, food-obsessed, Matt Lauerhating inventor Dr. Rick Marshall. Anvone who watched his 2004 melodrama The Notebook knows Cassavetes is not a man to leave a spot of sap untapped, and in My Sister's Keeper, he pulls out a very big drill indeed. After years of enduring painful and invasive procedures to prolong the life of her cancer-stricken sister (Vassilieva), Anna Fitzgerald (Breslin) is suing her parents (Diaz and Patric) for her medical emancipation. The film works best as a portrait of a family at war, with cancer and each other; there's very little meat on the bone of the legal subplot, and it seems to only intermittently hold the attention of Cassavetes and his co-writer Jeremy Leven. My Sister's Keeper is unfocused, pat, and predictable, in plot and dialogue, but the actors are so likable that when two characters push a box of Kleenex back and forth, one can't help but sniffle in tandem. Unsubtleties be damned, our defenses fall. Meanwhile, Cassavetes' reign as the go-to waterworks man remains uncontested. (06/26/2009) - Kimberley Jones



Director Levy and returning screenwriters Robert Ben Garant and Thomas Lennon have moved this seguel's location from New York's American Museum of Natural History to D.C.'s Smithsonian, but virtually every other aspect of this follow-up was touched on (manhandled, actually) in the original film. Stiller is again cast as Larry Daley, a night watchman over ambulatory museum pieces. Azaria's sinister Egyptian overlord, Kahmunrah, schemes to rule the world. Allving himself with Ivan the Terrible (Guest), Napoleon Bonaparte (Chabat), and a black-and-white Al Capone (Bernthal), Kahmunrah finds Daley and pals, chief among them a sassy Amelia Earhart (Adams), considerably more of a challenge to conquer than pyramid-building. The film has what feels like hundreds of hours of mindless noise and comic CGI chaos but only a handful of moments worth of real laughter. Much of that comes from Azaria, who proves yet again that he's a master of fully immersive comic genius. (05/29/2009)

Only very rarely do romantic comedies reinvent the wheel, which is why whole decades passed between Annie Hall, When Harry Met Sally, and Eternal Sunshine of the Spotless Mind. At best, when we queue up for the latest studio romantic comedy, we can hope for a curveball or two (hence the comic-relief bit player, sassy grandparent, and embarrassingly public avowal of love, all featured in The Proposal). When you strip all that away, what you're left with is two deeply charismatic lead performers. Bullock plays the Canadian-born Margaret Tate, an all-work and no-play literary editor who, when threatened with deportation, bullies her long-suffering assistant Andrew (Reynolds) into a marriage of convenience. Fletcher demonstrates with The Proposal that she can put together a funny, able romantic comedy that is a cut above, but no more. When "Pretty Boy" Floyd (Tatum) is gunned down in Public Enemies' opening, it foreshadows a dozen more deaths to come, many at the same hand as Floyd's - Melvin Purvis (Bale). Soon Purvis tightens his focus to public enemy No. 1, John Dillinger (Depp). The title's pluralization aside,

this is Dillinger's show and Depp's, and the actor is rock-solid in capturing the famed bank robber's charisma and confidence. Mann (Heat) tweaks the color in Public Enemies to stunning effect (as with a diseased-looking, late-afternoon yellow at a Miami horse track), and not just to stylistically wank off: The off-shade of sunlight pinpoints the emotional key of the scene, in which Dillinger tries to assure his girlfriend he's going to live forever. It's a crucial moment, but Depp doesn't quite sell it. Which is a shame, because he has a marvelous foil in Cotillard. You can't tear your eyes off her, any more than you can Mann's flawed yet engrossing picture.

In quick succession, the iconic characters enter in ways delightfully unexpected yet cleverly apropos. It's not necessary to be a longtime fan of the Star Trek universe to appreciate the sheer emotional punch and swagger of this rough and randy Enterprise crew. They're unlikely companions – antagonists, even – not yet boldly going wherever it is they're going, but discovering that trial by fire and photon torpedoes is the best, if not the easiest, way to forge both friendships and franchises. Terminator Salvation is terrifically dull, full of ear-searing sound design and much yakkity-yakking about the fate of humanity but entirely lacking any sort of soul or sense of fun. The film is just like its machines, which, by the end of McG's McBlockbuster deserve to win their war against humanity, if only to curtail, once and for all, uninspired and inhumanly mechanistic filmmaking such as this. The film is a clanging, full-metal racket from start to finish, with only the rare narrative pause devoted to exclusively human interactions. But, honestly, that's not what we and gazillions of non-English-speaking viewers around the globe want from this franchise. It's the action. On that score, this film is a poster child for the idea that more does not always equal more. With a typically grandiose running time, Revenge of the Fallen overstays its welcome by at least a half-hour, and two new Autobots - the illiterate, ghetto-speaking Skids and Mudflap (voiced by Kenny) - are the most retrograde blockbuster embarrassment since Jar Jar Binks. Director Hood (Tsotsi) opens strong, with a wickedly crafted opening-credits sequence that shows young mutant Logan and his more feral half-brother, Victor, aka Sabretooth (Schreiber), emerging from Canada's Northwest Territories. circa 1845, to fight side by side in the Civil War, both World Wars, and Vietnam. It goes downhill from there as the semisibs are recruited by blackops evildoer Gen. Stryker (Huston) to be part of an elite mutant fighting force; chaos and some very poorly rendered CG effects, excluding a masterful helicopter evisceration, ensue. Longtime readers of the Marvel series will likely laugh at Reynolds' portrayal of Deadpool, dig Will.i.am's Wraith, and already know enough about Logan/ Wolverine's back-and-front story to wonder how on earth an X-Men film could be so ... bland. # the COMMON LAW

#### **HOME OFFICE IN AN AIRSTREAM?**

My husband and I live in a small house (less than 1.000 square feet) in Austin. We try to maximize our space, but we just don't have room for a home office, which we need, so we came up with an idea. We want to buy a used trailer or motor home (maybe an Airstream or something similar), park it at the house. and use it as an office. Can we do that? Would the city shut us down if one of our neighbors complained?

I love being reminded by "Common Law" questions that keeping Austin weird is never too far from any of our minds. There are two big issues that will determine whether you can do this without violating city of Austin ordinances. First, you need to figure out what type of trailer, RV, or motor home (the "vehicle") you plan to buy. Second, you need to think about whether the vehicle will be parked in your driveway, somewhere else on your property, or in the street.

The city of Austin ordinances apply differently depending on the answers to these questions. For example, if you buy a nonmotorized trailer that must be towed by another vehicle, you are prohibited from parking it on a public street (Section 12-5-11 of city ordinances). Alternatively, if you buy a self-propelled motor home or other motor vehicle containing sleeping facilities or a bathroom, you can park it on a public street, but for no longer than 72 continuous hours (Section 12-5-11).

This means that your vehicle is likely to spend most of its time in your driveway (or somewhere else on your property), but the city regulates this as well. For example, the city places limitations on the ratio between the number of vehicles stored at a residential property and the number of licensed drivers that reside at that property. The city also limits the use of the front or side yards for parking (Section 12-5-29) and requires that recreational vehicles, like motor homes or RVs, be stored behind a 6-foot wood or masonry fence.

You should become more familiar with the city's parking rules (Section 12-5) before you invest the time and money needed to get your Airstream home office up and running, You can also contact the city with specific questions.

#### A DISCUSSION OF **HYBRID TECHNOLOGY**

Dear Tom and Ray:

Who is the real leader in hybrid technology? The last time I went into a Toyota dealership, the salesman told me that Toyota had just sold its first-generation hybrid technology to Ford because Toyota has developed its second generation. The implication is that Ford will never be able to catch Toyota. From your examination of hybrids, does this appear to be the case? Is Ford technologically remedial? — Bruce

RAY: Well, I think it's only fair to give Toyota credit for being the hybrid leader right now. It was the first car company to develop and sell a large number of hybrids to otherwise gas-guzzling Americans.

TOM: The third-generation Prius is out now, and again, it's even better than the last version. Not only does it get 50 miles per gallon in the city, but it's also a roomy, seemingly reliable car with very few downsides.

RAY: That said, there's nothing remedial about what Ford is doing. What we've heard (and remember, we're only slightly more trustworthy than your car dealer, Bruce) is that Ford developed its own hybrid technology, but that it was similar enough to Toyota that Ford opted to make a licensing deal with Toyota, rather than risk being sued for patent violations.

TOM: Or, Ford stole Toyota's technology and got caught!

RAY: Anyway, now Ford has its second generation of hybrids out, and the Ford Fusion Hybrid midsize sedan gets an impressive 41 miles per gallon in the city. By comparison, the latest comparably sized Toyota Camry Hybrid gets only 33.

TOM: We're not saying this to denigrate Toyota. It'll certainly view the Fusion's city mileage as a challenge. But Ford is hardly a laggard these days. And I wouldn't hesitate to buy a hybrid from either company.

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

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


