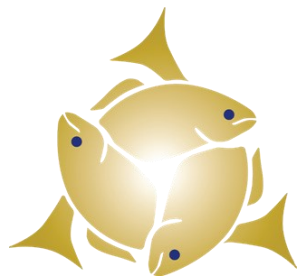

A TIME FOR CELEBRATION

You may by now have a touch of Jubilee fatigue after the four-day bank holiday and all the celebrations across the parish. But for me, there was a part of it that I experienced, and I think it should be captured and celebrated. As you may be aware the 10am Parish Eucharist has been trying to be intergenerational. It's difficult to quantify what is intergenerational, like many words it means different things to different people. But for me a great example of intergenerational was the Jubilee Street Party inside Holy Trinity. Although with the wet weather plan being put into action perhaps Jubilee Party would be a better description.

In the word intergenerational, the prefix "inter" is often forgotten in a definition, and people just focus on the generational - having different ages in the same place. But the "inter" needs to be the focus. A definition of inter as a prefix is "The prefix, inter, implies between, among or together." Intergenerational isn't just about different ages being present in the same place, but being among one another, being together, growing relationships. For me the setting up on the Saturday afternoon and the party itself was a

perfect illustration of being intergenerational. On the Saturday different ages were working together, using their personal skills for the good of the group, the wisdom of some and the physicality of others. The party on Sunday demonstrated intergenerational in a different way, through celebration, forging new friendships, not just all in the same room, but interacting with each other without barriers.

The service on the Sunday evening took intergenerational to another level, not just between ages, but between those who are church regulars and those who aren't. At the service there was a representation of not just the Holy Trinity Congregation, but of the whole of Stratford, and unlike some civic occasions where it could perhaps be said there is an element of feeling forced to attend. Through bringing crowns, decorated, processed into church and displayed throughout the service, those attending were offering something to the service, and were a vital part of it. There was no pressure on groups to attend, but I was amazed how many did send representatives. Later in this issue, with some more pictures of the crowns, there is a list of all the schools and groups who took part in the project and most had a representative at the service.

One great piece of feedback came from one group whose representative didn't make it to the service. WORK-SHOP describe what they do as

"Purposeful work activities for adults with learning disability and autism" helping them to learn skills to become part of the adult workforce. After the service I received an email from them apologising that their representative didn't make it to the service, but asking if I had any pictures from it. At that time I didn't, so all I could do was share the link to where the service was uploaded to YouTube. Below is the response I received to that email.

"Wow thank you! I just showed the participants and they loved it! The room was silent as they watched (I think I've discovered their new favourite thing to watch)...Thanks again for letting us be involved – they loved making and supporting this project."

Of course, I can only be in one place at any one time, but I'm sure that similar experiences were taking place in the other churches in our parish. The big question is how do we continue these experiences of being one family of God, bringing them into our daily lives and life as a parish? Not just being in the same room, but working together, celebrating together and welcoming all who make up our town. The minimum we can do is to look for these big occasions and make the most of the opportunities they offer. But imagine if every time we gather as a church family, it had that same feeling and experience? I don't mean that every time is a party, but even in the sombre seasons of our faith, we can still be excited to be amongst one another, sharing our faith with one another. Perhaps this could be a step towards continuing to see lives changed through God's love?

Worship Notes July and August



JULY

On Sunday 3 July we will celebrate the feast of St. Peter and St. Paul, traditionally the time of year when ordinations happen. This year please pray for Sarah Cushing, our Parish Administrator, who is being ordained priest at Coventry cathedral in the morning, and also our new curate, Thomas Powell, being ordained deacon there in the afternoon. Thomas' first Sunday in the parish will be on 10 July.

The theme of being called by God will then take us through July at the 10am Parish Eucharist at Holy Trinity, as we consider the different ways in which God calls us to ministry, lay and ordained.

Sunday 17 July we will be focusing on the work of Street Pastors and hearing about this important ministry from members of the congregation at Holy Trinity who are Street Pastors themselves.

Sunday 24 July we will be keeping the feast of St Mary Magdalene and, inspired by her story, considering what it means to follow your calling, even when you don't think you're up to it or others put you off.

AUGUST

August brings two important feast days which we will keep on the nearest Sunday:

7 August The Transfiguration: the remarkable episode where Jesus seems to shine with bright light and a voice is heard, saying, "This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased; listen to him."

14 August The Blessed Virgin Mary: we give thanks for the first person who said "yes" to Jesus in her life and so who is not only the Mother of God but also the first disciple of Jesus Christ



SILVERWARE AT ST HELEN'S by Angela Wylam



In last month's Clifford News the St Helen's team described how "the parishioners of Clifford Chambers" came to be the custodians of what is thought to be the second oldest silver communion chalice and paten in the country, both hall-marked for 1483 in the reign of the Tudor king Henry VII. Having been in regular use till 2010 they were moved somewhere more secure than the St Helen's vestry. The Queen's Platinum Jubilee seemed to be the most auspicious occasion for them to make an appearance and this they did on Sunday 5 June when the Reverend Kay Dyer used them at the 9.30am service.

For many of us something dating from the nineteenth century is very old, though we at St Helen's are quite accustomed and fond of our Norman arches and English Perpendicular windows. Even so it sends a tingle down the spine actually to hold something beautifully wrought in the fifteenth century. You have to wonder how many hands have held it down the years and in what circumstances. There is even a fascinating mystery as to how and why the chalice came to Clifford. Both items remained on show after the service and people were able to have a close look at them, together with several other fine silver items known as the Dighton Silver, a bequest in 1780, each with its own important leather case. We are grateful to Mike Hill who made two panels with descriptions and photographs of the chalice.

Who knows when next they might be on show, but whenever that might be, if you have any sense of history, don't miss it.

TRINITY TIMES PCC REPORT BACK - 24 MAY 2022

Patrick began by welcoming new members Marie MacDougall, Heather Fletcher and Beckey Barton. Since a vacancy had now appeared for a representative on Deanery Synod, Beckey was elected to this. That in turn created a vacancy for a co-option, and it was agreed to co-opt Sarah Paine.

Elections were made for a number of other external positions.

A presentation was made on Soul Space by Pauline McIntosh in conjugation with Patrick Taylor. This explained the key points:

WHY- to follow successful Alpha courses and find a replacement that would appeal to a wider audience.

WHAT - a course based on an Emmaus workshop and a trainer with experience and literature.

HOW- develop marketing, a team of leaders and advertising in parishes, local venues and social media.

These workshops covered ten sessions, five on the life of Christ and five on living a Christian life and were held at a venue outside Holy Trinity. They have recently been held via Zoom.

Four workshops have been held, with thirty-eight participants. One homegroup has been formed and a knock-on effect has been observed with wedding couples and christening bookings.

A report back was made on the work of developing the Parish Eucharist at 10am on Sunday and the following conclusions reached:

This service must continue to be inclusive.

Three styles of worship have emerged – fully participative and creative service (e.g. Mothering Sunday, Easter, Blessing of School and Work Bags) at least once a month. A more traditional feel service including choral music once a month not planned by a worship team, but still to have resources and activities for all ages. Finally services developed by the worship teams, less defined but still inclusive. The rota, set by the Clergy team, will reflect seasonal events.

The evening service will continue to offer other options and a further choice of service is being discussed with the Diocese, to be offered at an alternative time of the week.

The proposal for this pattern was accepted and will be reviewed in the future.

A temporary screen will be allocated to the Creative Corner to assist in following the service but a review of all screen usage will be carried out as soon as possible.

A brief discussion on Safeguarding reminded everyone of the need for all employees and volunteers to receive appropriate training every three years, via the link on the Diocese of Coventry website. Team leaders should keep their members up to date, or via the Parish Safeguarding Officer.

The next PCC meeting is 19 July 2022.

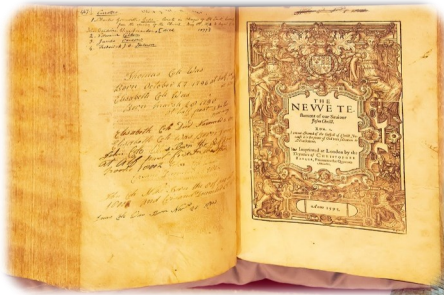

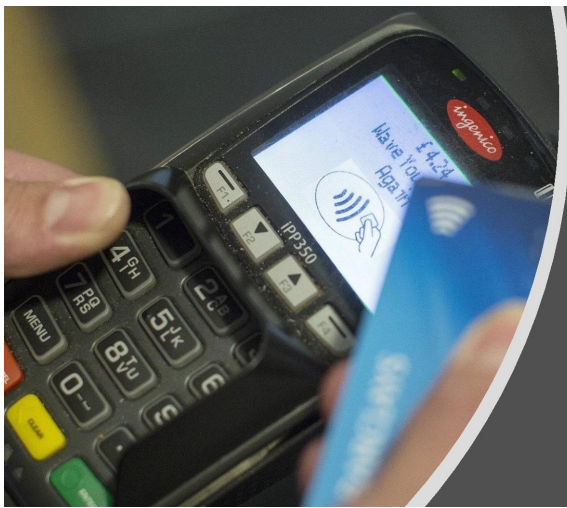
On 29 May, All Saints Church in Luddington celebrated its 150th Anniversary, with a joyful service of Evensong at 5.00pm. The Bishop of Warwick, the Right Reverend John Stroyan preached the sermon, and the Reverend Steve Jarvis officiated. The choir of Holy Trinity were in full voice. The Church was bedecked with gorgeous flowers, befitting such a lovely celebration and the Flower Team, led by Mitz, provided some beautiful arrangements. Making the occasion special was the return of the Luddington Bible, from the Shakespeare Birthplace courtesy of Tim Raistrick, which dates from 1591. The bible itself was originally in the old chapel, and was rescued from the fire that destroyed the chapel. It was presented to All Saints on the day of consecration, 8 May 1872, by John Baldwin. After the service, the congregation were able to view it, and marvel at its condition. In addition to regular members of the All Saints' congregation, the service was also attended by several members of the local community. We were also very pleased to see Elaine and Valerie, long term members of the congregation who we had not seen for some time due to personal reasons. Sadly, some people missed the service because of pre-arranged holidays.

Although on the chilly side, a wonderful spread was enjoyed under a marquee in the Churchyard, a special cake, with prosecco or soft drinks served. The team wish to extend their very grateful thanks to everyone who came together to make this a service to be remembered with thanks, in particular, to Steve J., Linda, Steve and Jean, Debbie and Chris, Dave and Penny for their help setting up, serving and tidying up afterwards.

We were very fortunate with the weather. It managed to stay dry until after we had tidied up and headed home.

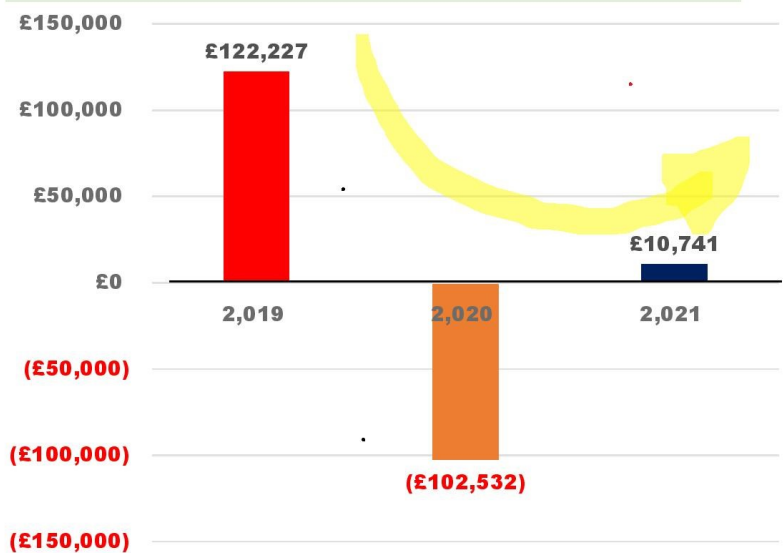

Parish finances returned to a small surplus in 2021



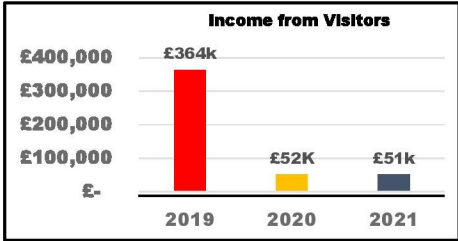
How does that

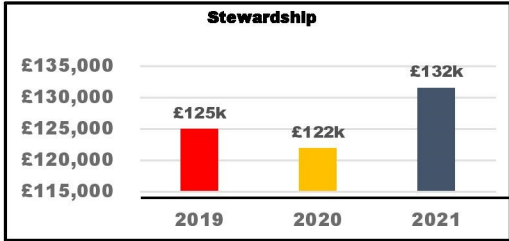
How important is visitor income to our recovery?

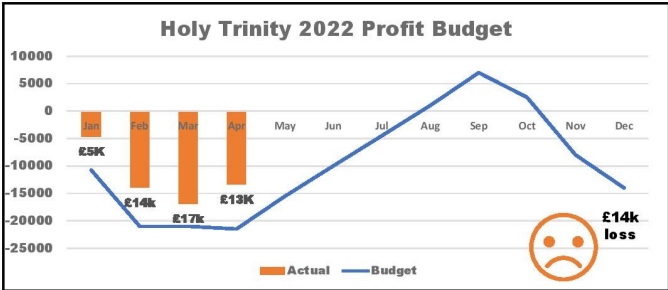

“Let Us Build A House, All Are Welcome” is a favorite hymn of mine and not only do I think the words give me a sense of belonging to the family of Holy Trinity I also like singing it too!

When I first started coming to Holy Trinity, I was met with such an enthusiastic welcome from our beloved Andrea Blood, and I was also impressed on how members of the congregation and clergy were interested in getting to know me. I was a little unsure at the time if I was going to take to church life as since leaving school, I had only visited churches for weddings and funerals and for an occasional service with my aunt. The service seemed to drag on and I couldn't see how it was relevant to my life and the world I lived in. My belief in God was in me but I thought I didn't need a church to help me with my relationship. Of course, I was wrong.

As my career took off and life took on a very fast pace, I gave little thought to church until life began to give me the experiences that make us question so many things about ourselves and God. I began to feel that life was unfair in many ways, taking loved ones from me and the atrocities that exist in the world, but something deep inside was pushing me towards the church. When I moved to Stratford, I decided that I needed to connect again with the church and began attending services at Holy Trinity and somehow, I felt I had come home. I felt an immense sense of belonging and presence of God when I attended the services and began to make friends. I attended the Alpha course and enjoyed discussing all the things that I had kept inside, and I began to feel lighter from my burden and happy to share with my fellow students.

I have now been with the church six years, and I help to welcome new worshippers to the church with the Welcome Team and have been touched by how quick a stranger becomes a friend. I haven't found all the answers to my questions yet, but I do know I am being guided and for me, this is exactly what I need and I believe that God is helping me to find my place through difficult and happy times.

The Welcome Team invite all new worshippers to fill out a card so we can contact them and let them know about church life and we invite them to a Welcome Mingle so that they can get to know other new worshippers and meet in a relaxed atmosphere with members of the clergy and church wardens etc.

Later we invite new worshippers to attend an evening with Patrick and Steve at the church. Patrick guides us on a fascinating journey through the church from Christening to death and beyond. Everyone finds it very interesting and opens the wonder of where we worship and how relevant it is to our Christian life. I'm pleased that many of the new worshippers have already become involved actively in the church, volunteering to assist with Trinity Tots, AV team, church guides for visitors, sides people and bell ringing to name just a few.

The Social Team also become involved in helping new worshippers with all the wonderful events they arrange. In May we organized a Maytime walk and one of our newer worshippers Lynn Suter, led a happy band of walkers for a delightful walk along the river Avon. I took on a much gentler walk that led us to the Greenway and a meander to the old railway bridge where we met with the river walkers and made our way across the racecourse and on to Bobby's railway café for coffee and cake. It gave us all a chance to interact and relax on our walks and we had a lovely time. As everyone enjoys a walk, further walks will be arranged by the social team in the future so keep your eyes and ears peeled for the announcements. As we said on the day, it is not always easy to meet new people at a church service but if you do see someone you don't know or haven't spoken to in a few weeks, just say 'hello' and welcome them to our great church. As the hymn says, "All are welcome, All are welcome, All are welcome in this place".

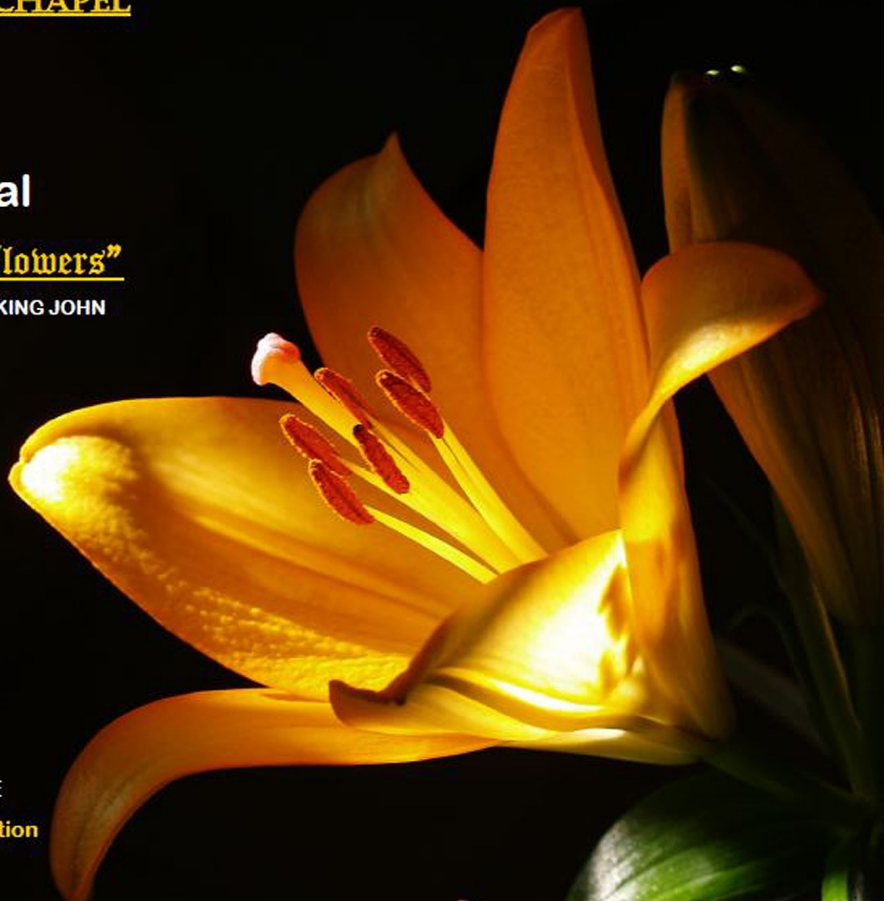

The Oberammergau Passion Play is the most famous event of its kind in the world. Every ten years, almost the whole community of a village in Bavaria are involved in a season of performances presenting the story of Holy Week and Easter – in fulfilment of a vow taken over three hundred years ago in thanksgiving for deliverance from the plague. Given that Covid was the cause of deferring the 2020 performances, that vow had a special relevance this year.



Ursula and I were privileged to attend a very early performance, and some others in the congregation will be following us. It is indeed an experience, with (literally) a cast of thousands as actors, singers, orchestra or backstage, in a huge and partly open-air theatre with remarkable acoustics but not very good sightlines. A full script, in English and no doubt other languages (the play is of course all in German), is available, and it could be difficult to follow the performance without it. Also, the total play experience lasts for a full eight hours, though that includes a three-hour interval for dinner!

That script keeps very close to the Gospels, including many extracts from Jesus' earlier teaching, and in that sense is quite traditional. But one aspect of the tradition – reflected of course in some Gospel passages themselves - was its focus on the Jews as Christ-killers. In fact Hitler strongly promoted the play as a propaganda tool. That of course has become a great embarrassment. The latest version of the script goes out of its way to emphasise that Jesus and his followers were themselves Jews (some Hebrew prayers and rituals are included, to great effect) and that some of the Jewish religious leaders were on his side (Joseph of Arimathea gets a lot of lines). The debates in the council of priests are a substantial and very thought-provoking feature of the play – and, when the crowds are worked up to demand that Pilate should release Barabbas, a considerable minority refuse and call for Jesus' release instead. In addition, the commitment of Jesus to the poor and marginalised is considerably heightened, though he is emphatically not a conventional revolutionary and still repudiates the way of rebellion and violence.



Maybe such emphases just sound “politically correct”. But they came across rather as reminding us that righteousness and evil are rarely concentrated totally on opposite sides in the many conflicts, religious and otherwise, between human beings. You feel that, yes, this is “the greatest story ever told”, but it has its ambiguous sides; it is mainstream Christian but it does not follow a neat formula. And, interestingly, given that Roman Catholicism is the dominant version of the faith in Bavaria, there is quite a lot in it that sounds decidedly Protestant!

Not all the participants, I am sure, are committed Christians (indeed there was at least one Muslim in the cast). But articles published locally testify to the meaning for their own faith journeys of participation in this massive event – particularly in learning about the continuity between Judaism and Christianity. Whilst it certainly makes an impression on the huge audiences, its biggest impact must be on the participants themselves.

That may be equally true for groups like Trinity Players who are involved in such drama on a very much smaller scale. Belonging to such groups can be important to many people in their faith journeys. Having said that, the Church has learnt afresh over recent years that there are no spectators in worship – only participants. And in that sense every Eucharist is a mini-Oberammergau, even if not five hours long.

Bells ring out for Platinum Jubilee



The bell ringers at Holy Trinity enthusiastically took part, alongside many other churches throughout the United Kingdom, in the ringing leading up to the Service of Thanksgiving at St Paul's on Friday 3 June. Locals commented on how lovely it was to hear our bells as a prelude to them enjoying the service from St Paul's in the comfort of their own home.

We rang rounds and call changes on the ten bells and took time at the end to record the event with a group photograph of us all in the Ringing Chamber.

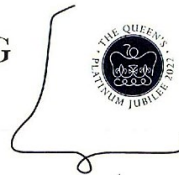

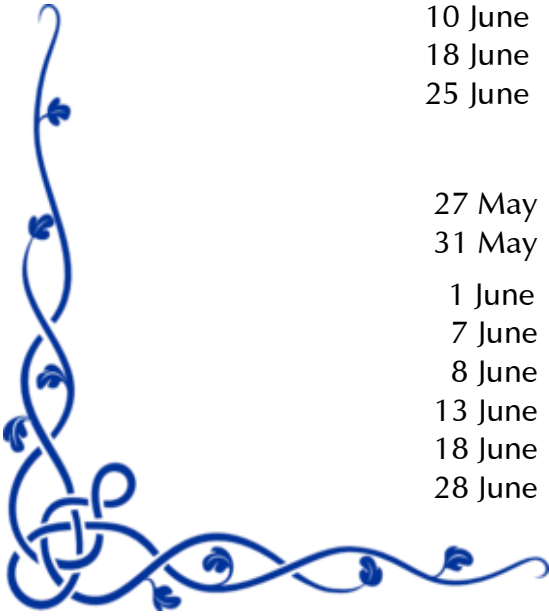

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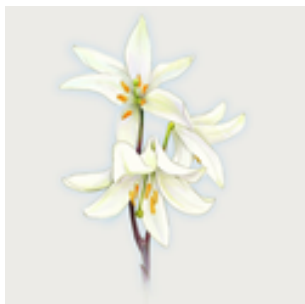
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Holy Trinity Tower lit up for the Queen's Platinum Jubilee

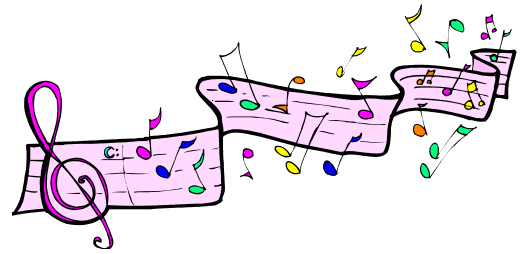

CONTEMPLATIVE PRAYER

The first Tuesday evening of every month



The meetings begin with a relaxing and stilling exercise, and asking the Holy Spirit to guide us when we pray. We start by sharing some material - usually a bible passage but sometimes a poem or a picture which may be circulated to members in advance. We then have thirty minutes of silence for prayer. We end with a reminder of the material, say the Grace together and quietly disperse.

The time of silence helps to support each of us as we pray, binding us together as a praying community. We offer this as a contribution to the spiritual life of our Church, and take its effects out into the world with us as we leave.

FANOUROPITA CAKE

The Greek Fasting Cake for Lost Things

Our new Operations Manager, Lola, invited parishioners to meet her and enjoy coffee and cakes one Saturday morning in May. Lola produced this wonderful Greek Orthodox cake which honours Saint Fanourios on 27 August each year, and explained that this is the saint Greek people ask to help them find lost objects. If and when the object is found, they thank Saint Fanourios with this cake. Traditionally the cake has nine ingredients to symbolise the nine mysteries of the church, the days of creation and the angels' battalions. It was so delicious that the recipe is printed here.

Ingredients:

- 225 ml seed or olive oil (seed oil will make a lighter cake)
- 225 gm granulated sugar
- 225 ml orange juice
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon ground cloves
- 400 gm self-raising flour
- 80 gm raisins
- 80 gm chopped walnuts

Method:

Preheat the oven to 180C or 160C fan

Put the sugar and oil into a bowl and whisk until the sugar dissolves. In a separate bowl, combine the orange juice with the baking soda and mix with a fork until the baking soda froths up and dissolves. Add this mixture to the sugar and oil and whisk together thoroughly.

In a third bowl mix together the flour, ground cinnamon, ground cloves, raisins and walnuts. Add these dry ingredients slowly to the liquid, while whisking all the time until the cake batter is smooth.

Transfer the smooth mixture to a round oiled cake tin of 28 cm diameter and bake for 45-60 minutes. Test the cake with a skewer to ensure it is cooked through, and leave it in the tin to cool down. Once cooled, you can ice it if desired.
