1. Introduction

Each year, the County of San Bernardino (County) must prepare and submit to HUD an Annual Action Plan which details the proposed uses of federal housing and community development grant funds that it receives from the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD):

- Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program
- HOME Investment Partnership (HOME) Program
- Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) Program.

The Action Plans serve as the County's annual applications to HUD and are required for the County to receive yearly allocations from the three grant programs. The annual grant amounts to be received by the County are determined by a formula administered by HUD, rather than County deciding the amount of funding that it chooses to request from the CDBG, HOME, and ESG programs. These HUD grants are known as entitlement grant programs because communities receive the funds every year if they meet program requirements and criteria associated with each of the three grants.

The County is classified by HUD as an Entitlement Urban County, because it includes a number of cities which choose to cooperate with the County and receive CDBG, HOME, and/or ESG grant funds through the County. The Urban County configuration is determined by cities entering into cooperation agreements with the County for three-year periods. The current three-year Urban County qualification period covers fiscal years 2018-2019, 2019-2020, and 2020-2021.



Under HUD's grant program regulations, the County of San Bernardino may use its HUD grant funds in the unincorporated portions of the County, as well as within the cities that cooperate with the County for the purpose of receiving grant awards for the CDBG, ESG, and HOME programs.

This Proposed Annual Action Plan covers fiscal year 2018-2019 and is the fourth annual action plan under the County's 2015-2020 Consolidated Plan.

3. Evaluation of past performance

Each year, the County of San Bernardino reports its progress in meeting the five-year and annual goals in its Consolidated Annual Performance and Evaluation Report (CAPER). The County has successfully targeted funding to benefit low- and moderate-income persons and communities. The goals and projects identified in this Annual Action Plan were developed using strategies that were adopted as a part of the 2015-2020 Consolidated Plan.

The following summary information addresses the County's performance as reported in the most recently prepared CAPER which the County submitted to HUD in September 2017.

CDBG Accomplishments

The CDBG accomplishments are summarized below and outline the outcomes and performance measure requirements as well as the County's progress towards meeting each requirement, by project type. This section of the FY 2016-2017 CAPER conforms to the outcome and performance measure requirements identified in the 2015-2020 Consolidated Plan. The following is an abbreviated summary of the County's achievements through June 30, 2017.

The County exceeded the annual goals for Revitalizing Neighborhoods through code enforcement, infrastructure improvements, and public facility improvements. The following activities were undertaken in FY 2016-2017:

- A total of 58 public facility projects were undertaken in FY 2016-2017. Of those projects,
 29 were completed and 29 were underway. The improvements provided low-to-moderate-income residents with increased access to a fire station, community and senior centers, libraries, parks, museums and other recreational facilities.
- A total of 91 public service projects were undertaken in FY 2016-2017. The Public Services included adult literacy, emergency food distribution, transportation, tenant/landlord counseling and fair housing, health services, and childcare for children of women who are victims of domestic violence.
- Three clearance and demolition project were conducted in the City of Needles.
- Five enhanced code enforcement projects were implemented in various target areas in the Cities of Adelanto, Grand Terrace, Highland, Montclair, and the Town of Yucca Valley.

HOME Accomplishments

The County of San Bernardino administers the HOME Program throughout unincorporated areas of the County, the 13 cooperating cities, Chino Hills, Rancho Cucamonga, and San Bernardino. HOME funding was utilized by preserving existing housing stock and creating affordable housing units throughout the HOME Consortium. In FY 2016-2017, HUD allocated \$3,197,525 in HOME funding to the County. The County allocated \$3,678,000, which reflects a combination of current and prior year HOME funds, for site acquisition and predevelopment costs for Horizons at Yucaipa, a 77 unit housing development which includes 50 units for low income seniors aged 55 and over. The majority of construction on Horizons at Yucaipa has

been completed and income qualifying households have begun moving into the affordable units. Final reimbursements of HOME funds will be made in FY 2017-2018 and final resident counts will be reported at that time.

The County also oversaw the completion of Valencia Vista, a 76 unit affordable housing development in the City of San Bernardino. The HOME funds used for Valencia Vista were allocated to the City of San Bernardino prior to that city entering into the San Bernardino County HOME Consortium and so were treated as separate HOME funds. The funding and occupancy accomplishments for Valencia Vista will be reported by the City of San Bernardino.

The second phase of Bloomington Grove, consisting of 84 one, two and three bedroom apartments, of which 83 units are set aside for low-moderate income households, was completed in March with tenant move-ins in April 2017. A total of \$908,889 in NSP3 funds were allocated for Bloomington Grove. In all, 190 units comprise the first and second phases of Bloomington Grove, with 70 of the first phase units designated for seniors. A new 6,500 square foot County library is part of the development with the senior units built above and around the library.

Loma Linda Vets, an affordable housing development which will create 44 units for income qualifying U.S military veterans in Loma Linda and Golden Apartments which will rehab an existing townhouse style development into 40 permanent supportive housing units are currently in development.

Note that affordable housing development programs are multi-year in practice; however, the results of allocation of funds are reported in the year the HOME project achieves occupancy and closes out the project budget.

ESG Accomplishments

In FY 2016-2017, the County of San Bernardino administered the HUD-funded Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG). ESG funds were utilized to assist 1,446 unduplicated eligible homeless individuals through housing rental assistance programs, shelter, and services for households that are either at-risk of or are experiencing homelessness. Funding was allocated to qualified sub-recipients in an effort to maximize eligible service areas within the County. The County provided funding for all HUD-eligible categories: street outreach, shelter, homeless prevention, and rapid re-housing, while requesting a focus on rapid re-housing.

In FY 2015-2016 the County Board of Supervisors approved a one-time allocation of \$250,000 in County General Funds for a Homeless Veterans Housing Initiative. This initiative partnered CDH, the Veterans Affairs Supportive Housing (VASH) program and two ESG providers, Community Action Partnership (CAPS) and Family Service Association (FSA). The \$250,000 was to be used to pay motel vouchers, first and last month's rent, and move-in deposits for an expected 401 homeless veterans. During 2015-2016, \$218,074 was used to serve 730

homeless veterans. The remaining \$31,926 was used in FY 2016-2017 by CAPS and FSA, and a further 139 homeless

Expanded Economic Opportunity

San Bernardino County continues to use its HUD funds to create numerous economic opportunities throughout the County. HOME funds were used for the development of two affordable housing developments which will have ongoing construction through FY 2017-18. The ongoing construction is expected to retain construction jobs in the area and will improve housing stability for low- and moderate-income residents. IN FY 2016-2017, 1,604 construction workers participated in the building of Bloomington Grove Phase 2 and Horizons at Yucaipa. In FY 2016-2017 the County used \$908,889 of NSP 3 funds to leverage \$30 million in other County funds and private investment at Bloomington Grove, a multi-phase affordable development project. The first phase of this project included the construction of a new sewer line. This was a much needed improvement to the community, which had no access to sewer service. The lack of sewers in the area had also been a deterrent to business investing in that community. This sewer line gives businesses the opportunity to expand into the area without incurring infrastructure development costs. This sewer line is expected to encourage further investment and development in the area.

Many public services funded with CDBG include counseling and career readiness training for low-income residents of the County. The County used CDBG funds to contract with Inland Fair Housing and Mediation Board (IFHMB). IFHMB provided counseling and mediation services for over 5,089 renters and counseling for low-income individuals who own or are looking to purchase a home to provide them with information related self-sufficiency, and building equity so that they can be empowered through homeownership or housing stability. Rehabilitation Workshop Employment Training is a CDBG funded project provides paid work, and training to 11 low income individuals with disabilities a year, allowing them to receive job training and a work history that can be used to find other employment. The County used CDBG and HOME funds for various construction projects, including street improvements, public facility upgrades, and the construction of new affordable housing throughout the year in numerous lowmoderate-income neighborhoods. These CDBG funded construction projects allowed area contractors to retain 435 jobs within the region. The construction of affordable housing increases housing stability of low- and moderate income residents of the County while decreasing the overall housing costs burden. Residents who are not cost burdened by housing have more money to spend and invest in the community. The CDBG funded construction projects were related to improving streets and public facilities in low- mod-income areas. improvements which increase the livability and stability in those neighborhoods. Construction of streets and public facilities often includes a component for ADA improvements. American's with disabilities live in poverty at twice the rate of non-disabled Americans. Improving access for citizens with disabilities expands their opportunities to participate in economic and civic activities in their communities.

4. Summary of Citizen Participation Process and consultation process

Citizen participation requirements are a part of the HUD regulations governing the preparation of the Consolidated Plan (see 24 CFR Part 91.105). Each Entitlement Grantee must meet minimal citizen participation requirements, including the preparation of a Citizen Participation Plan, which explains the Grantee's methodology for involving citizens in the local program planning and project/activity implementation process.

Needs Assessment Process

On October 23, 2017, the County of San Bernardino released the Notice of Funding Available (NOFA) requesting applications for agencies seeking funding under the CDBG program. An evaluation process occurred whereby each agency/organization was evaluated for eligibility. Once applications were reviewed by the County they were forwarded to each of the 13 participating cities, which consist of Adelanto, Barstow, Big Bear Lake, Colton, Grand Terrace, Highland, Loma Linda, Montclair, Needles, Redlands, Twentynine Palms, Yucaipa, and Yucca Valley. The cities were given from January 8, 2018 through March 2, 2018 to hold city council meetings to receive public comments and make funding recommendations for their respective city's CDBG allocation.

In compliance with Federal regulations and the County's Citizen Participation Plan, the proposed Annual Action Plan was made available for citizen review and comment for a 30-day comment period in March-April 2018 prior to adoption by the County Board. Information regarding the date, time, and location for the public hearing, as well as anticipated program resources, was published in multiple newspapers throughout the County. Prior to the public hearing, a draft copy of the proposed 2018-2019 Annual Action Plan was made available for public review at the Community Development and Housing Agency website.

Proposed Action Plan Process

In compliance with its Citizen Participation Plan and HUD regulations, the County's 2018-2019 Annual Action Plan was made available for public comment from March 18, 2018 to April 17, 2018. At the conclusion of the Public Comment Period, a Public Hearing was held in the County Board Chambers on April 17, 2018 to receive any final public comments. The cooperating cities also held public meetings to determine funding recommendations and have provided their recommendations to the County.

As required by HUD regulations, all comments received, and responses to the comments by the County and by its cooperating cities, and documents relevant to the process are summarized in the Plan and included in the documents submitted to HUD.

No comments or responses relevant to the 2018-2019 HUD Annual Action Plan were received by the County during the public comment period or the hearing on April 17, 2018.

- 1. Increase affordable housing options.
- 2. Reduce substandard housing.
- 3. Provide fair housing activities to Affirmatively Further Fair Housing Choice with emphasis on protected classes under the Fair Housing Act.
- Increase housing options and supportive services for low-income and special needs populations including elderly persons, homeless individuals, and persons with disabilities.
- 5. Increase the capacity of public facilities to serve additional individuals.
- 6. Revitalize neighborhoods through increased infrastructure improvements and affordable housing investments.
- 7. Provide public service activities within the cooperating cities to reach additional individuals.
- 8. Provide overall program administration and management.

1. Introduction

Provide a concise summary of the jurisdiction's activities to enhance coordination between public and assisted housing providers and private and governmental health, mental health and service agencies (91.215(I))

In order to create a comprehensive system that connects the County's various resources to effectively combat homelessness by creating affordable housing opportunities, the County reorganized several departments into the Community Development and Housing Agency (CDHA). CDHA is comprised of the Community Development and Housing Department, the Office of Homeless Services and the Housing Authority of San Bernardino County (HACSB). CDH, which receives and administers HUD entitlement funds, is currently working closely with the Housing Authority in the creation of affordable housing units either via new construction, acquisition rehabilitation or motel conversion to create/bring units online to be used as Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH) units for chronically homeless individuals with mental health conditions. CDH is currently working on the development of affordable units that will be used to provide housing to the chronemically homeless and formerly/homeless populations. The projects are a partnership between HACSB. San Bernardino County's Department of Behavioral Health (DBH) and Veterans Affairs (VA) to fund projects using HOME funds, VA vouchers. Project-Based Vouchers and other sources of funding (federal and non-federal). CDH works with HACSB to establish housing strategies and an inventory pipeline to be used to address homelessness. To ensure funding priorities are in line with current community development goals, the Department of Community Development & Housing (CDH) maintains open and integrated communication with many County departments and related agencies as it moves forward with its promotion of affordable housing communitywide. County departments, under the direction of the Chief Executive Officer, primarily include the Department of Behavioral Health, Office of Homeless Services, the Economic Development Agency, and Land Use Services Department. Close contact and open communication is maintained with the County of San Bernardino Housing Authority, a separate entity with close ties to County government. Individuals from these offices are also members of the County's Interagency Council on Homelessness.

Describe coordination with the Continuum of Care and efforts to address the needs of homeless persons (particularly chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans, and unaccompanied youth) and persons at risk of homelessness.

The San Bernardino County Homeless Partnership (SBCHP) consists of community and faith-based organizations, educational institutions, non-profit organizations, private industry, and federal, state, and local governments working together for a focused approach to the issue of homelessness. The County of San Bernardino, through its Office of Homeless Services, is the lead agency overseeing the jurisdiction's Continuum of Care (CoC), a program designed to

promote communitywide commitment to the goal of ending homelessness and optimizing selfsufficiency among homeless individuals and families.

Describe consultation with the Continuum(s) of Care that serves the jurisdiction's area in determining how to allocate ESG funds, develop performance standards for and evaluate outcomes of projects and activities assisted by ESG funds, and develop funding, policies and procedures for the operation and administration of HMIS.

CDH works in concert with the local CoC, which is governed by the Interagency Council on Homelessness (ICH), and the County's Homeless Advisory Board (HAB) to develop strategies that address the identified needs and demands of homeless persons and those at risk of homelessness. The CoC, ICH and CDH staff members meet on a monthly basis to discuss homeless trends and reviewing statistical data to devise strategies that best meet the identified and documented needs.

Based upon the collaborative efforts of the CDH Department, the local CoC, ICH and the HAB, priorities are set and the use of CoC and ESG funding is determined based upon the needs of the homeless and the priorities of the County. Currently, the County has prioritized addressing homelessness for those of the highest and greatest need (chronically homeless), veterans, and unaccompanied women, while providing services for those who are at risk of homelessness. Programmatic performance measures are developed by the CoC, in collaboration with ICH and other advisory boards/ad hoc committees, and are created for the purposes of unifying the County's homeless delivery system.

Collaboration with the SBCHP and the County's Office of Homeless Services was instrumental in the development of projects and activities assisted with ESG funds, along with related outcomes and performance measurements. A part of this coordinated process includes the planning and operation of the County's Homeless Management Information System (HMIS).

1. Summary of citizen participation process/Efforts made to broaden citizen participation

Summarize citizen participation process and how it impacted goal-setting

CDBG NOFA

On October 23, 2017, San Bernardino County released the Notice of Funding Availibility (NOFA) requesting applications for agencies seeking funding under the CDBG program. An evaluation process occurred whereby each agency/organization was evaluated for eligibility. Once applications were reviewed by the County there were then forwarded to each of the 13 participating cities, which consist of Adelanto, Barstow, Big Bear Lake, Colton, Grand Terrace, Highland, Loma Linda, Montclair, Needles, Redlands, Twentynine Palms, Yucaipa, and Yucca Valley. The cities were given from January 8, 2018 through March 2, 2018 to hold city council meetings to receive public comments and make funding recommendations for their respective city's CDBG allocation.

HOME NOFA

San Bernardino County releases a Notices of Funding Availability (NOFA) or Request for Qualifications (RFQ) under the HOME Investment Partnerships Program (HOME) approximately every other year, based on the availability of HOME funds, to solicit project applications from qualified developers of affordable multi-family housing. These NOFAs and RFQs, with a description of the application process, are advertised in multiple local newspapers throughout the County. A selection committee made up of County staff and at least one third party independent economist, review the developers for capacity in completing large-scale multifamily affordable housing projects and the projects for feasibility, viability and how they will meet County goals. The County released a NOFA in February 2015 and received multiple eligible project applications. These projects are currently under consideration as proposed future projects contingent upon the ability to secure necessary funding (tax credits, state grants, etc.) and approvals. The HOME projects selected for funding are included in the Annual Action Plan.

In compliance with its Citizen Participation Plan and HUD regulations, the County's 2018-2019 Annual Action Plan was made available for public comment from March 18, 2018 to April 17, 2018. At the conclusion of the Public Comment Period, a Public Hearing was held in the County Board Chambers on April 17, 2018 to receive any final public comments. The cooperating cities also held public meetings to determine funding recommendations and have provided their recommendations to the County.

The County Board of Supervisors funded programs and activities that address priority needs in the community while keeping with the goals and priorities established in the 2015-2020 Five-Year Consolidated Plan based on public input, applications received through the NOFA process,

Explain how federal funds will leverage those additional resources (private, state and local funds), including a description of how matching requirements will be satisfied.

HOME funds are heavily leveraged through the use of gap financing. All HOME projects require matching contributions of at least 25% for each dollar of HOME funds. The County plans to meet this requirement and has met it in previous years by specifying in every HOME NOFA that a project must be far enough along in the development process for the developer to have identified and secured its primary funding sources before HOME funds can be committed. Additionally, San Bernardino County has over \$65 million of HOME match accumulated from prior year HOME projects. Matching funds will typically consist of Mental Health Services Act (MHSA) funds, Neighborhood Stabilization Program (NSP) funds, and Successor Agency to the former Redevelopment Agency land subsidies.

ESG funds must be matched 100%, on a dollar-for-dollar basis with non-federal funding sources. San Bernardino County has met the ESG match requirement in previous years and plans to meet it for the 2018-19 program year. ESG funds received directly from HUD are leveraged through contributions from ESG subrecipients who are selected for being well established as homeless providers in their communities and show strong connections with multiple funding sources. The matching amounts are specified in each subrecipient's contract. Matching funds may also include the value of any donated materials, the value of any lease on a building, any salaries paid to staff to carry out the program of the subrecipient, and the value of time and services contributed by volunteers to carry out the subrecipient's program. In addition to HUD ESG funds, the County is anticipating receiving a total of \$636,413 in ESG funds from the State of California, Department of Community Development and Housing for program year 2018-2019. As with the HUD ESG funds, the State ESG funds will be used to provide emergency shelter, homeless and homelessness prevention services. While the performance of the State ESG program will not be captured in the County's CAPER or performance measures included in the County's Action plan, it is anticipated that the available funding will add an additional 1,500 individuals served.

CDBG funds are leveraged through the County's CDBG Consortium cooperating cities and County general fund. The CDBG allocations for each city and the County unincorporated areas are not usually enough to fund the full needed budget of projects. Project budgets for projects in County unincorporated areas are often supplemented with County General Fund and various state grants. The 13 cooperating cities and CDBG subrecipients who contract through the cities use their city general funds, private donations and other state grant funds.

Describe the reasons for allocation priorities and any obstacles to addressing underserved needs

The County of San Bernardino developed its allocation priorities with the goal of providing housing and community development improvements for as many low- and moderate-income residents as possible with their CDBG, HOME, and ESG allocations. CDBG funds used in the unincorporated County will be focused on public facility, infrastructure, or fair housing projects that can serve a significant number of residents. CDBG funds used in participating cities to fund public service, public facility, and infrastructure projects will be concentrated in incorporated cities where greater population density allows for cost effective delivery of services.

Each year as part of our preparation of the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Annual Action Plan submission to HUD, we ask those cities participating with the County in the CDBG program to prioritize projects. The County of San Bernardino's 2018-19 CDBG Countywide allocation is anticipated to be \$6.19 (Estimated 5% Reduction) million dollars.

Due to the uncertainty of the HUD allocation to County's CDBG program for the upcoming year, CDH has estimated a 5% reduction in the overall CDBG allocation from the 2018-19 program year. Individual city allocations were also based on the Census 2014 poverty and overcrowded housing counts and populations, which could result in a city's allocation being greater or lesser than the 5% reduction. Please note; these allocation amounts are subject to change based on HUD's actual allocation to the CDBG program. Once the actual allocation amount is known, cities will be notified to adjust the amounts awarded to each project or to defund specific projects in accordance with their submitted project prioritization requests.

Should the County's allocation be higher than the anticipated estimate, the excess funds will be set aside as contingency until individual project adjustments can be made. Details of each projects' contingency plans are included with project descriptions in AP-38 Projects Summary. Consortium cities and County departments will have the opportunity to request budget adjustments for specific projects based on actual allocation amounts.

Project budget adjustments which do not meet the criteria for instigating Plan Modifications will be handled administratively. The criteria and thresholds which instigate Plan Modifications are outlined in the Citizen Participation Plan. No adjustments to project budgets are being made at this time.

Available HOME funds will be used for multifamily new construction or rehabilitation; eligible areas include the unincorporated County and all HOME Consortium cities. While the County has not identified specific target areas for the use of HOME funds, priority will be given to affordable rental projects located in high opportunity (i.e. high school proficiency, high labor market engagement, and high job access), low poverty areas (poverty concentrations below 50%), as described in the County's 2015-2020 Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing Choice.



Rationale for the priorities for allocating investments geographically


The County of San Bernardino developed the geographic priorities outlined above with the goal of providing housing and community development improvements for as many low and moderate income residents as possible with their CDBG, HOME, and ESG allocations. CDBG funds used in the unincorporated County will be focused on public facility or infrastructure projects that can serve a significant number of residents; city funded public services, public facility, and infrastructure projects will be concentrated in incorporated cities where greater population density allows for cost- effective delivery of services.

The maps on the following pages identify low- income areas in the County. The first shows areas that are income-eligible for CDBG spending, defined as block groups in which 51% or more of the population lives in low- or moderate- income households. The second map identifies racially and ethnically concentrated areas of poverty (RCAP/ECAPs) in the County, which are defined by HUD as census tracts with a minority population share above 50% and an individual poverty rate above 40%. As the County evaluates the use of HOME funds over the next year, consideration will be given to RCAP/ECAP locations and the opportunity to deconcentrate poverty by locating new affordable rental housing outside these areas.


Map - San Bernardino County Block Groups with 51% or More Low/Moderate Income Residents

AP-60 Public Housing – 91.220(h)

Introduction

The Housing Authority of the County of San Bernardino (HACSB) has been one of the leading providers of affordable housing in San Bernardino County for over 70 years. HACSB serves in excess of 30,000 people, most of whom are seniors, disabled individuals and children.

Actions planned during the next year to address the needs to public housing

In January 2017 HACSB came under the newly formed Community Development and Housing Agency (CDHA) This reorganization will foster a higher level of collaboration among HACSB, the Community Development and Housing Department (CDH) and the Office of Homeless Services (OHS) which comprise the CDHA. HACSB participates in HUD's Moving to Work (MTW) program for housing authorities to design and test innovative, locally designed housing and self-sufficiency initiatives. The MTW designation allows participating agencies to waive certain statutes and HUD regulations in order to increase housing choice for low-income families, encourage households to increase their self-sufficiency, and improve administrative and operational cost effectiveness. HACSB's participation in MTW allows the agency to test new methods to improve housing services and to better meet local needs.

Actions to encourage public housing residents to become more involved in management and participate in homeownership

HACSB undertakes a variety of initiatives to increase resident involvement, including a comprehensive, updated website that provides information on all facets of the housing authority operations, policies and procedures. HACSB has established programs that represent all San Bernardino County residents living in the HACSB Developments. The New Resident Advisory Board (RAB) was established to represent housing residents and voucher participants. Housing Authority staff work closely with RAB members to discuss potential policy changes, especially new initiatives with the Moving to Work Demonstration Program, get feedback on messaging and communication to residents, recruit participants for hearings and special events, and much more.

The HACSB coordinates programs, activities, and services offered to residents, including:

- Family Self- Sufficiency Program designed to assist residents with achieving self-sufficiency. This effort is accomplished through goal setting, intervention, advocacy and community collaboration. Residents can get assistance with seeking employment, job training, and educational opportunities.
- Homeownership Program designed to help interested participants find an appropriate mortgage lender and work with the participant through the process of buying a home.
- Programs for Children a variety of programs and services are made available to residents at various HACSB sites that include but are not limited to: scholarships, after- school tutoring, health, safety, gang prevention programs, nature projects, etc.

If the PHA is designated as troubled, describe the manner in which financial assistance will

be provided or other assistance

Public Housing Authorities are evaluated by HUD's Public Housing Assessment System (PHAS) on their performance, annually or biennially. The frequency of performance evaluations is determined by how well they have performed historically. Any PHAS whose score indicates a "Troubled" housing authority must enter into a Memorandum of Agreement with HUD to improve their performance over an unspecified period of time.

HACSB has a history of scoring as a "High Performer" and in 2008 was designated as a Moving to Work (MTW) Agency by HUD, which makes it not subject to PHAS evaluation and scoring. As a result, HACSB was transformed by executing innovative initiatives based on the three key MTW objectives: saving taxpayer dollars through efficient work; helping our families achieve economic independence; and ensuring a family's freedom of housing choice. Currently, there are 39 Housing Authorities participating in this designation out of approximately 3,200 Housing Authorities nationwide.

As a Moving to Work Demonstration site, HACSB is no longer subject to the traditional PHA and Section 8 Management Assessment Program (SEMAP) scoring; however, HACSB continues to meet the "High Performer" standards that originally allowed it to gain the MTW designation.

AP-65 Homeless and Other Special Needs Activities – 91.220(i)

Introduction

In 2017, the County of San Bernardino conducted a Point-In-Time count of the County's homeless population. The count identified 1,886 homeless residents in total, 1,179 of whom were unsheltered. The following characteristics were found in the homeless population:

- 360 chronically homeless adults or, 37% of the unsheltered homeless population.
- 26 children in 15 unsheltered homeless households or, 2.4% of the unsheltered homeless population
- 14 homeless unaccompanied children under age 18 years, or 1% of the unsheltered homeless population.
- Youth age 18-24 years count was 102, or 9% of the unsheltered homeless population.
- 111 homeless Veterans (including 43 who were chronically homeless), or 8% of the unsheltered homeless population.

Describe the jurisdiction's one-year goals and actions for reducing and ending homelessness including

During the 2018-2019 program year, the County of San Bernardino anticipates assisting 1,500 individuals or families who are homeless or at risk of homelessness through the following activities:

- 1) Emergency shelter vouchers, with approximate anticipated ESG funding of \$180,000;
- 2) Rapid re-housing, with approximate anticipated ESG funding of \$200,000; and
- 3) Homelessness prevention, with approximate anticipated ESG funding of \$100,000.

Reaching out to homeless persons (especially unsheltered persons) and assessing their individual needs

The County of San Bernardino will continue to engage in street outreach and engagement activities in order to outreach to homeless populations. These activities include an annual Point-In-Time Count which helps identify homeless residents and assess their needs. The following needs are assessed during the annual count: chronic homelessness, homeless children and unaccompanied youth, the racial and ethnic makeup of the homeless population, mental health needs, and presence of a chronic health need or disability. The County will support and facilitate an expansion of street outreach to include multi-disciplinary practitioners from law enforcement, social services, health care, mental health care, faith-based groups, volunteers, non-profits, community-based organizations, and substance abuse recovery centers in alignment with its overall plan to end homelessness.

Addressing the emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless persons

According to San Bernardino County Homeless Partnership (SBCHP)'s guide to homeless service providers, approximately 150 agencies provide emergency shelter, transitional housing,

permanent housing, domestic violence shelter, and other supportive services (i.e. case management, rental assistance, utility assistance, and food banks) to homeless residents in the County. Resources are provided in 24 cities and unincorporated areas across the county. The County will continue its support of these agencies, service providers, and programs.

Helping homeless persons (especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth) make the transition to permanent housing and independent living, including shortening the period of time that individuals and families experience homelessness, facilitating access for homeless individuals and families to affordable housing units, and preventing individuals and families who were recently homeless from becoming homeless again

The County of San Bernardino will continue to support several agencies that provide mainstream services that help homeless residents transition to permanent housing, shorten the experience of homelessness, and prevent future instances of homelessness. The County has a Homeless Provider Network and an Interagency Council on Homelessness to help plan for and meet the needs of homeless residents within the County. Many programs are located in and specific to cities throughout the County. However, the County will also support countywide resources and service provision which includes the Transitional Assistance Department (TAD), which provides financial, nutritional, and medical assistance. TAD programs operate through the Department of Human Services and include programs to assist the homeless including financial assistance and welfare to work programs, food stamps, child care subsidies to encourage employment, cash assistance to elderly and disabled immigrants, a general relief program that provides loans for housing, food, and transportation, a refugee assistance program that provides medical and financial assistance to refugees, and Medi-Cal which provides health insurance to low-income residents.

Helping low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely low-income individuals and families and those who are: being discharged from publicly funded institutions and systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care and other youth facilities, and corrections programs and institutions); or, receiving assistance from public or private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education, or youth needs.

The County of San Bernardino has several strategic steps to address homeless prevention which are detailed in the County's 10-Year Plan to End Homelessness. The County will continue to support and facilitate action on these steps. One of these strategies includes case manager assessment during intake to social and human services agencies. These assessments will help determine needs and eligibility for resources and coordination in discharge planning from medical, foster care, mental health, and corrections facilities. Another strategy includes the provision of supportive and social services, such as, behavioral health, credit repair, benefits counseling, employment services, landlord-tenant mediation, rental and utility assistance, and veterans benefits (when applicable).

The Community Action Partnership of San Bernardino County (CAPSBC) has several programs for low-income residents that can serve as an aid to homeless prevention activities. CAPSBC

offers a family development program that offers emergency assistance including rental, food, transportation, and motel assistance. The organization also offers a food bank to provide food and nutritional assistance. Residents may also be offered case management services that include educational training, vocational and employment training, and training on budgeting. The County will continue its support for these projects and services.

In addition, the County will continue to support and facilitate mental health and supportive services to the homeless through the County's Department of Behavioral Health. The Department of Behavioral Health includes several programs targeted at assisting low- income and homeless residents with mental health needs, such as, the mentally ill homeless program (30 days of basic needs, case management, employment, and outreach services to homeless mentally ill adults), the housing program operated in conjunction with the housing authority (provides mental health services and long term permanent housing for homeless mentally ill or mentally ill/substance abuse residents), and the employment program (provides employment skills evaluations, preemployment services, job coaching and collateral services to residents with mental health needs).

Discussion

Through the partnerships and services providers involved in the SBCHP, the County will actively work to ensure that homeless individuals make the transition to permanent housing and independent living by prioritizing safe and stable housing and making affordable housing options more accessible to homeless residents. Many homeless that struggle to transition into permanent housing and independent living suffer from mental illness, substance addiction, or have disabilities. Recent trends through the Homeless Prevention and Rapid Re-housing Program and Housing First model prioritize placing homeless individuals and families in permanent housing quickly, and then linking them to supportive services in the community. The County of San Bernardino will continue to support local organizations to assist homeless persons with transitional and permanent housing.

AP-75 Barriers to Affordable Housing – 91.220(j)

Introduction

Barriers to affordable housing can present in a variety of aspects and multiple entities including, but not limited to government and political agencies, banking and financial institutions, insurance industry regulations, zoning regulations, social and economic variables, neighborhood conditions, public policy legislation, and fair housing enforcement. This section will describe specific strategies the County will employ to address public policy barriers to affordable housing.

Actions it planned to remove or ameliorate the negative effects of public policies that serve as barriers to affordable housing such as land use controls, tax policies affecting land, zoning ordinances, building codes, fees and charges, growth limitations, and policies affecting the return on residential investment

The County of San Bernardino will continue to work with government, public, private, and non-profit community agencies to remove or ameliorate the negative effects of public policies that serve as current barriers to affordable housing. Action steps as recommended and accepted by the County are summarized below:

The County of San Bernardino will work to encourage that comprehensive neighborhood plans and zoning ordinances/regulations promote a variety of housing types including single and multifamily homes, apartments, townhomes, duplexes, and live-work units in order to increase variability and affordability.

The County of San Bernardino Community Development and Housing Department will evaluate the extent to which County programs and services meet the needs of populations with limited English proficiency by conducting the four-factor analysis. The four categories are: the number of proportion of LEP persons eligible to be served, the frequency LEP persons come into contact with the programs, the level of LEP persons need for services and resources available by Agency staff to provide LEP assistance.

The County of San Bernardino will evaluate the extent to which housing counseling is available to provide credit repair advice to members of the protected classes and to low- and moderate-income residents, in order to ensure that to the maximum extent possible, residents have access to means of improving their ability to obtain and maintain decent, affordable housing. In the case that counseling is unavailable, inadequate or not well advertised; the County should work with its community partners to increase its availability and use.

The County will support education and outreach efforts by community partners regarding needs assessments for affordable housing and subsidized housing.

AP-85 Other Actions - 91.220(k)

Introduction

To address each challenge listed below, the County of San Bernardino will undertake the identified activities, or continue activities already underway, during the 2018-2019 program year.

Actions planned to address obstacles to meeting underserved needs

The County has experienced several significant obstacles to meeting underserved needs in recent years. The loss of redevelopment monies reduced public funding available to address needs and led to reductions in department staff, meaning that remaining staff are tasked with covering the County's vast and varying geographies. Although the job market and foreclosure rates have improved, the lengthy slow economy and elevated unemployment and foreclosure rates will require several years to see the overall benefits of the improve

With limited resources and continued housing and community development needs, the Department of Community Development and Housing (CDH) will seek to build on partnerships with other County departments over the next program year. CDH will also explore opportunities to collaborate with non-profit agencies, social service providers, and affordable housing developers to develop a coordinated affordable housing strategy that maximizes the impact of both County grant funds and other public and private investments.

CDH will continue the collaborations currently underway, including:

- Use of ESG funds with Shelter Plus Care through the Department of Behavioral Health and the Office of Homeless Services:
- Use of HUD VASH vouchers through Veterans Affairs;
- Use of Mental Health Services Act (MHSA), HOME, and NSP funds in the development of new and/or rehabilitated affordable housing; and
- Collaboration with the Housing Authority of the County of San Bernardino (HACSB) and the County of San Bernardino Department of Workforce Development (WDD).

Actions planned to foster and maintain affordable housing

Monitoring and rehabilitation are the primary tools the County plans to use to preserve existing affordable housing units. Over the next program year, the County will monitor approximately 10-20% of HOME units, including on-site inspections and file reviews to ensure program specifications are being met. HOME funds will be used for multifamily housing rehabilitation or construction of new affordable units.

The Inland Fair Housing and Mediation Board will continue to provide tenant/landlord mediation services free of charge to County residents. These services assist in the prevention of landlord mistreatment of low- and moderate- income residents, many of whom would not otherwise have the resources to contend with abuses and remain in their current housing.

The County has established a Homeownership Protection Program Joint Powers Authority with

the Cities of Ontario and Fontana to coordinate assistance to low and moderate income homeowners with underwater mortgages. While the County is still exploring program options to address foreclosures, it has established a website (http://saveyourhomesbcounty.org/) designed to provide information about foreclosure prevention assistance that is currently available and to prevent homeowners from falling prey to refinancing companies attempting to scam those in need.

Actions planned to reduce lead-based paint hazards

Estimates show that 9% of owner-occupied units and 15% of renter-occupied housing units in San Bernardino County are at risk of lead-based paint hazards, based on age (built prior to 1980) and presence of children.

In the upcoming program year, the County will ensure that any multifamily rehabilitation projects on buildings constructed prior to 1978 are done using lead-safe work practices, including proper lead removal or abatement. HOME monitoring site visits will include a Housing Quality Standards (HQS) unit inspection that looks for signs of lead paint hazards, such as peeling or flaking paint, particularly in properties constructed prior to 1978. Program funds will be expended on lead-based paint removal as the County does not operate any homeowner housing programs.

Two organizations in San Bernardino County address lead-based paint hazards, neither of which is funded using HUD entitlement monies. The Community Action Partnership of San Bernardino County (CAPSBC) is a non-profit agency that provides lead-safe weatherization and lead hazard reduction services to households with children under age six living in low- and moderate- income housing built before 1978. Services are also available to property owners who rent housing to families meeting these requirements. Both single and multifamily housing units are eligible for these services.

The County of San Bernardino Department of Public Health operates a Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention (CLPP) program designed to educate the public, identify and care for children with exposure to lead, and prevent exposure to lead. The CLPP program includes case management services, lead testing, community outreach and education, nutritional education, and investigation of complaints about unsafe renovation and remodeling activities that may put children at risk of lead exposure.

Actions planned to reduce the number of poverty-level families

The County's ESG program, in collaboration with the Continuum of Care, will continue to coordinate with homeless providers and mainstream housing and service programs to provide case management, including counseling, addiction rehabilitation programs, and other life skills training. One goal of these programs is to increase program participants' ability to find and keep employment, allowing them to maintain housing and move out of poverty.

CDH will continue to work with the Department of Workforce Development (WDD) to promote HUD Section 3 hiring for all of its loan and grant programs. Services provided by WDD include career counseling, job search assistance, skills assessments, and occupational training services. The WDD also offers business development assistance programs, which may lead to business expansion and new job openings. The San Bernardino County Workforce Investment Board

(SBWIB) oversees the programs offered through WDD and is comprised of private business representatives and public sector partners appointed by the County Board of Supervisors.

The County has established a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) among CDH, WDD, and the Housing Authority of the County of San Bernardino (HACSB) to provide resources and services to developers, contractors, and subcontractors working on projects subject to Section 3 of the Federal Housing and Urban Development Act of 1968 job development regulations. Under the MOU, these three entities collaborate to provide County residents employment opportunities with businesses awarded County contracts funded with federal money and to inform contractors of business development assistance available through WDD. Developers, contractors, and subcontractors working on affordable housing and/or capital projects funded with HOME and CDBG funds are required to take part in this program, and must certify participation in a meeting with CDH, HACSB, and WDD. The County of San Bernardino will continue this program over the 2018-2019 program year.

In addition to collaborating for Section 3 hiring, the HACSB will continue to assist its residents in their efforts to move out of poverty through job skills counseling and training programs offered through a partnership with WDD.

Actions planned to develop institutional structure

The County of San Bernardino has implemented a customized grants management, loan servicing, and project monitoring system designed to replace separate tracking systems and increase efficiency of record-keeping. The County will continue optimization of this system over the upcoming program year, but does not anticipate additional changes in technology or record-keeping systems.

Actions planned to enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies

Given that the County of San Bernardino has limited funding available to address an array of housing and community development needs across a substantial geography, collaboration with existing housing agencies, social service providers, cooperating cities, and other County departments, is crucial. The County plans to strengthen its relationships with homeless service providers through continued participation in the Interagency Council on Homelessness, the Homeless Partnership Network, the Housing Collaborative, and the Continuum of Care review panel.

The County will also seek to strengthen its relationship with communities in unincorporated areas, including with service providers and other County departments working there. Collaboration will also be encouraged among private housing developers, service providers, and other non-profit agencies throughout the County. Improved communication and cooperation will allow for a more effective affordable housing strategy in which County efforts can build on those of the private/non-profit sectors and vice versa.

Program Specific Requirements

AP-90 Program Specific Requirements – 91.220(I)(1,2,4)

Introduction

In AP-90, the County of San Bernardino provides information that is required by regulations governing the three Entitlement grants that it receives annually from the United States Department of Housing and Urban development. The grants are the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program, the HOME Investment Partnerships (HOME) Program, and the Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) Program.

Community Development Block Grant Program (CDBG) Reference 24 CFR 91.220(I)(1)

Projects planned with all CDBG funds expected to be available during the year are identified in the Projects Table. HOME Investment Partnership Program (HOME) Reference 24 CFR 91.220(I)(2)

1. A description of other forms of investment being used beyond those identified in Section 92.205 is as follows:

It is anticipated that HOME Program funds will be used as gap financing for multifamily housing projects. The County will use its HOME Program funds with permanent financing from private lenders, Low Income Housing Tax Credits (LIHTC), and other funding sources such as the Mental Health Services Act (MHSA). No additional forms of investment have been identified at this point for use with HOME program funds during this program year.

2. A description of the guidelines that will be used for resale or recapture of HOME funds when used for homebuyer activities as required in 92.254, is as follows:

Neither the County nor its subrecipients plan to undertake any single-family homebuyer assistance or rehabilitation activities during the 2018-19 program year. Should the County decide at a later date to create any type of single-family assistance or rehabilitation activity for this program year, the Community Development and Housing Department (CDH) will submit a substantial amendment which will include a full description of the proposed project, participation and selection requirements (the County does not give preference to particular population segments), and the resale and recapture provisions to be used for that activity.

3. Direct subsidy includes HOME investment that enabled the homebuyer to purchase the property. This includes down payment assistance, closing costs or other HOME assistance provided directly to the homebuyer and/or the difference between the fair market value of the property and a reduced sales price attributable to HOME development assistance. Development subsidies (i.e., the difference between the cost of producing the unit and the fair market value of the unit) cannot be subject to recapture since the homebuyer did not realize a direct benefit from these funds. A description of the guidelines for resale or recapture that ensures the affordability of units acquired with HOME funds. See 24 CFR 92.254(a)(4) are as follows:

Neither the County nor its subrecipients plan to undertake any type of homebuyer assistance activities during the 2018-19 program year. Should the County decide at a later date to create a homebuyer assistance activity for this program year, (CDH) will submit a substantial amendment which will include a full description of the proposed project, participation and selection requirements (the County does not give preference to particular population segments), and the resale and recapture provisions to be used for that activity (to include the methods for recapturing funds). Plans for using HOME funds to refinance existing debt secured by multifamily housing that is rehabilitated with HOME funds along with a description of the refinancing guidelines required that will be used under 24 CFR 92.206(b), are as follows:

Neither the County nor its subrecipients plan to use any of its HOME funds to refinance existing debt secured by multifamily housing rehabilitated with HOME funds during the 2018-

19 program year. Should the County decide at a later date to refinance existing debt, the Community Development and Housing Department (CDH) will submit a substantial amendment which will include a full description of refinancing guidelines that will be used.

APPENDIX A ESG PROGRAM STANDARDS

Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) Reference 91.220(I)(4)

2. If the Continuum of Care has established centralized or coordinated assessment system that meets HUD requirements, describe that centralized or coordinated assessment system.

The County of San Bernardino coordinates homeless services with entitlement and non-entitlement cities throughout the County. The County Department of Behavioral Health, Office of Homeless Services (OHS) serves as the lead agency for the County's CoC. The County government oversees the distribution of ESG funds for its service area that includes all unincorporated areas as well as the 13 non-entitlement cities within the County CDBG Consortium. Any subrecipient organizations that receive ESG grant funds from the County of San Bernardino are required to coordinate with and report their homeless services data in the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) administered by the County's Office of Homeless Services on behalf of the CoC. All service providers in the CoC use a common assessment tool, data collection methods, and targeting strategy. As permitted by HUD, client data from providers of services to domestic violence victims are not reported in the County's HMIS system. These agencies must maintain and report data to the County in the same format as is used for HMIS.

The County utilizes a coordinated assessment system to assist with service provisions to the program participants of the CoC and ESG programs. The County's coordinated assessment system, known as the Coordinated Entry System (CES) is based on the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS). The CES system is used as the preliminary screening to assess client needs utilizing a screening tool known as the VI-SPDAT (Vulnerability Index - Service Prioritization Decision Assistance Tool) surveys applicants to determine risk via a scoring system. Based upon the scoring, applicants are then prioritized for services and referred to the appropriate service providers based upon the applicants' assessed needs and the prioritized target populations, as identified by the CoC Written Standards for the CoC-funded and ESG-funded programs.

The County also uses a "211" Homeless Services telephone information system that operates on a 24-hour basis and may be used to refer residents of the County to nearby service providers. However, the County has developed a coordinated intake system that is standardized for use by ESG service providers. This system will be operational during 2016 and its goal for centralized intake is to, "enhance the quality of client screening and assessment and better target program assistance to where it can be the most effective." This new system will decrease fragmentation and direct clients toward resources that are most efficiently and effectively used. This system is also designed to reduce the practice of sequential referrals to numerous providers for each client.

When using the centralized intake system, any person seeking services will continue to contact "211" (a toll-free number) directly, to obtain initial screening prior to being referred to the appropriate service provider in the Continuum of Care. Every service provider will be using the same assessment tool, data collection methods, and targeting strategy for financial assistance as well as for case management prevention, rapid re-housing and any other services. Using a coordinated access process will result in a more accessible and uniform system used to connect persons who are homeless or at risk of homelessness with appropriate resources available in the County's Continuum of Care.

3. Identify the process for making sub-awards and describe the ESG allocation available to private nonprofit organizations (including community and faith-based organizations).

Eligible homeless services provider recommendation are the result of a selection committee process which began with a Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA) released in October 2014 to find qualified contractors to provide Emergency Solution Grant services for multiple years to coincide with the goals of the 2015-2020 Consolidated Plan. The NOFA is transmitted electronically to all identified service providers participating in the Continuum of Care, Interagency Council on Homelessness (ICH), and the Homeless Provider Network (HPN). The information is also posted on the website for the County of San Bernardino Department of Community Development and Housing.

In making awards of the ESG funds, the County is mindful that service providers should be geographically and strategically located throughout the County. To review proposals submitted to the County, an Evaluation Committee is used. The Committee consists of staff from the CDH, staff from other County departments (i.e., Department of Behavioral Health and the Office of Homeless Services, and the Housing Authority of the County of San Bernardino). Standardized rating and scoring procedures and forms are used in this process. Recommendations from the review process are used by CDH to develop a list of recommended funding choices for consideration and approval by the Board of Supervisors.

Six service providers were chosen for ESG funding for an initial one-year term, with the option of annual extensions, for a total possible term of five years that is subject to annual monitoring and satisfactory performance review.

4. If the jurisdiction is unable to meet the homeless participation requirement in 24 CFR 576.405(a), the jurisdiction must specify its plan for reaching out to and consulting with homeless or formerly homeless individuals in considering policies and funding decisions regarding facilities and services funded under ESG.

The County developed new ESG Program Standards in 2012 to comply with new requirements under the new ESG Final Rule. At that time, the County included a formerly homeless person on the review committee that developed the new County standards (see Appendix). No changes in the ESG program standards are included in the 2018-2019 Annual Action Plan.

The County works closely with the Continuum of Care and its service providers to ensure that

homeless persons or persons who were previously homeless have access to the policy development and operations processes of the COC. The CoC, governed by the ICH, is instrumental in guiding decisions and creating policies that govern the County's homeless service delivery system. The ICH is a board that is comprised of various homeless service providers throughout the County. The ICH Board membership is comprised, in part, of formerly homeless individuals who have active voting status on the Board and are integral to the voting process used to determine homeless priorities, strategies, funding recommendations, program enhancements that impact both CoC-funded programs, as well as the ESG program. CDH's homeless operations are in collaboration with the local CoC and ICH.

5. Describe performance standards for evaluating ESG.

The County will continue to utilize the evaluation process which began during its 204-2015 program year. Under this process, performance standards rely on "percentages of successful outcomes" and look at housing stability for six months and twelve months following receipt of ESG assistance. New ESG contracts associated with 2018-2019 funds will continue to emphasize the goal of tracking beneficiaries for up to a year following termination of assistance.
