WELCOME TO CLAYTON COUNTY

The Clayton County Conservation Board and staff would like to welcome you to Clayton County. Our 19 county parks and natural areas provide a variety of opportunities to county residents and visitors alike. Our board was established in 1958; since then many changes have occurred. Now we are looking down the road and planning for the next 50 years to keep our areas enjoyable for everyone. Osborne Visitor Center is the headquarters and offices for the board. Here roughly 70,000 visitors come to: fish, hike the trails, visit the Iowa Welcome Center, view the Nature Center and Wildlife Exhibit or just enjoy a quiet day with family and friends.

Environmental education has always played an important role in promoting and conserving our natural resources. Our Nature Center and Parks are visited by nearly 50 schools throughout the year. Along with school groups, public programs, special events, camps and organization presentations, our staff has contacts with over 30,000 people through education programs annually. In order to provide a high quality of services we rely on a volunteer staff of nearly 180 volunteers a year.

OSBORNE VISITOR CENTER

Located on 300-acres, the Osborne Visitor Center features an Iowa Welcome Center & Gift Shop, Nature Center, Pioneer Village, Wildlife Exhibit, & 5 miles of trail.

IOWA WELCOME CENTER & GIFT SHOP

Stop by the Welcome Center to learn more about travel opportunities in Iowa. Visit with a certified travel counselor and pick up brochures and maps. The Iowa Room Gift Shop offers shoppers a unique opportunity to purchase items produced locally. Items such as popcorn, honey and candy will hold off any hunger pangs, while lowa souvenirs, nature products, and field guides will entertain the wandering traveler.

NATURE CENTER



PIONEER VILLAGE

The town of Osborne flourished in the 1880's but after a dip in food prices and a series of fires, the town began to disappear. In 1962, the Conservation Board bought the property and began restoring the town. The village currently consists of six buildings which replicate a small town in the late 1800's. Buildings are open for public viewing from Memorial Day through Labor Day.

Situated near the Nature Center are several miles of hiking trails. Pick up a self-guided brochure in the Nature Center or trail head and wander through the forest to see birds, trees, flowers and more! Please stay on the trails to avoid contact with poison ivy and other irritable plants.



CLAYTON COUNTY CONSERVATION PARKS & CAMPGROUNDS

OSBORNE VISITOR CENTER: 29862 Osborne Rd Elkader, IA Located five miles south of Elkader, this 300-acre park features a Welcome/Nature Center, Native Wildlife Exhibit, Pioneer Village, Multi-use Trails, Pond and Shelters for day use.

BLOODY RUN PARK: 29857 Bloody Run Dr, Marquette, IA 2 Bloody Run Park is located just west of Marquette Iowa. Nestled between rolling bluffs, Bloody Run is a 135-acre paradise that provides both excellent trout fishing and camping opportunities. With over 19 primitive campsites, campers have the opportunity to enjoy nature without all the noise of the city. The campground is located right along Bloody Run Trout Stream. Camping fees are \$10 per night.

MOTOR MILL PARK: 23002 Grain Rd Elkader, IA 3 Dominated by a six-story limestone gristmill, the 155acre Motor Mill Park is located seven miles east of Elkader. The park features primitive campsites along with hiking trails and a canoe landing along the Turkey River. The Motor Mill Bridge Project was completed in 2012 and now allows for a southern access again. Camping fees are \$10.00 per night.

FRENCHTOWN PARK: 26254 Mississippi Rd Guttenberg, IA Found along the Mississippi River, this intimate park has three primitive campsites. Located with in the park is a boat ramp with access to the Mississippi River. The park is located three miles north of Guttenberg.

FRIEDENS PARK: 16723 Chariot Rd Elkader, IA 5 This small park is located five and a half miles northwest of Elkader, adjacent to the Turkey River. The park offers canoe access and primitive camping for \$5.00 per night.

JOY SPRINGS PARK: 37771 Alpha Ave Strawberry Point, IA Located along Joy Springs Trout Stream, this campground is a great destination for any trout angler. Just a short drive west of Strawberry Point, Joy Springs covers approximately 90 acres of rolling forest land. Within the park is a large shelter and five primitive campsites. Camping fees are \$10.00 per night.

LOCAL ATTRACTIONS

MOTOR MILL HISTORIC SITE

The majestic Motor Mill sits in the heart of the Turkey River Valley. The 90-foot tall mill was built in the late 1860's and operated for less than ten years. The Motor Mill site is on the National Register of Historic Places. The town of Motor was the dream of three area investors; however because of floods and insects it ceased to prosper.

In 1983 the Clayton County Conservation Board purchased the property. Currently the site offers a campground, canoe access and a peek into the past. The Motor Mill Historical Site is a must see during your visit to Northeast lowa and can now be accessed via a new stunning bridge from the parks south side.

RIVER BLUFFS SCENIC BYWAY

The River Bluffs Scenic Byway is a 109-mile driving route



BUCK CREEK: 30286 232nd St Garnavillo, IA 7 Three miles north of Garnavillo, Buck Creek is surrounded by over 100 acres of forest land and is located along the banks of Buck Creek Trout Stream. This park offers fishing and hiking opportunities and two primitive campsites are available for \$5.00 per night.

BECKER PROPERTIES: 36061 Millville Rd Guttenberg, 8 IA and 37160 Great River Rd Guttenberg, IA Located just outside of Millville, the Becker property covers 373 acres and is divided into two sections. Both of these parcels are open to public hunting and one of the parcels has access to the Turkey River.
