

Having a chess club near the intersection of M-59 and US-23 certainly seems logical now, but in the early 1980's – not so much. There were three hubs for chess in Michigan then:

- **Detroit** where Expert **Andrew Beider** helped organize the Metro Chess League;
- Ann Arbor where USCF senior master Fred Lindsay simultaneously played, promoted, taught, directed tournaments, and sold chess supplies; and
- Lansing where the legendary V.E. Vandenberg ran the Lansing Chess Club while publishing the **Michigan Chess Magazine** for many years.

The history of the **Livingston County Chess Club (LCCC)** can be traced to the Brighton Chess Club. Started in 1981 by **Bill Bennett** in the Brighton Community School building, the club put together a team that won 1st place in the old Metro Chess League that year in one of the divisions.

Jason Morris, former Brighton Chess club member and long-time MI expert, recalls that team and other fond memories of the early Brighton gang:



Terry Griner – Terry was one of the tougher opponents that I played at the club. When I could finally beat him, I knew that I'd gotten much stronger. He was about 1800+ back then, and he punished my silly positional mistakes without hesitation and taught me a lot about 1. d4 openings. Thanks, Terry!! Nowadays, he's the excellent

Instructor-in Residence at the LCCC where he shares his

chess passion and knowledge with anyone who wants to learn – especially the younger members! Parents – you won't find a more patient teacher for your kids than Terry! **Bill Gonea** – Bill was a very sharp 1700 player who could hold his own with much stronger players when the occasion warranted it. Always quick with a joke or some insight, Bill was long-time stalwart addition to our club team. We often went to Vaughn's together (see Vaughn Blanchard below).

Joseph Butler – Joe was a very friendly man of about USCF 1400 strength. Usually the first guy to arrive, he often greeted newcomers to the club. Joe knew all kinds of chess lore, trivia, traps, and puzzles. He always had something to show or a story to tell. His favorite opening was the Kopec variation of the Sicilian Defense (he'd talk your ear off about it), but he'd sneak in a King's Gambit if you dared 1.e4 e5 against him.

Bill Bennett - Bill was our fearless leader and organizer. We often congregated at his house for chess parties on the weekends. I'll never forget the smell of cigarettes and his old Drueke cloth chessboard festooned with ash burns and tea stains. Bill would sip his Earl Gray with honey and twirl his mustache while pondering his next move. After a long think, he would often slide a piece into position with his pinky and a sly grin. He was a tricky 1600+ player who had a huge passion for the game, but more importantly for the club; he was just great with people. He always made you feel welcome when you came and missed when you didn't. His favorite opening was the Benoni Defense or any Sicilian variation, and it was a major milestone in my progress when I could finally best him. Seems like yesterday that we were all at Bill's playing double-speed or bughouse as it's called now - we did this traditionally in the last hour of the meetings. I vaguely recall Phil (Laren) yelling at Bill (his partner) to sit on his clock (not move), but Bill just couldn't resist!! Suddenly a knight was captured and passed to his opponent's partner, and WHAM checkmate!! Those were fun days!!

Other special club members included:

Vaughn Blanchard – Vaughn was a very kindly old man (he was in his 80's back then), and he just loved to play and talk about chess. I don't think he had an active rating for a long time, but it was around 1400. I used to go visit him at his house on the weekends, and we'd play for a few hours in his study. Sometimes, Bill Gonea would come over, too. Vaughn made me a beautiful wood box for my wood chess set that I cherish to this day.

Mike Reynolds – Mike played a tough game, probably a solid 1600 player. I think work and family obligations kept him from playing in tournaments or for the team, but he was a weekly regular and we were better for his company.

Don Mason – Don was (and is apparently!) a very solid positional player, at that time playing the Catalan as white almost exclusively. Back then he was pushing 1900, and I know he made it into the expert range at one point. Now, he's back in action in both OTB tournaments and at LCCC!

Phil Laren – Phil was our resident "pro", and he taught me more than all the other guys combined. Back then, he was about 2100+, actively trading blows with all the Michigan masters. He took me to my first chess tournament and probably a half-dozen others. Long before computers, Phil would analyze my games and help me find all my mistakes. It's hard on the ego to realize that your

"brilliancy" game wasn't so brilliant, but it made me more critical of my own moves and a stronger player. Phil knew Don (I think they also played postal chess in the same league and at one time lived near each other.) Phil was a postal chess master (He played about +200 rating points stronger at postal than OTB.), although he eventually did reach 2265 USCF.

"Unfortunately, time and the winds of change took members in different directions, and the club eventually dissolved. All these guys taught me something about chess and fellowship, and I'm glad to have known them all." - JCM

Hartland. Matt was teaching chess at the school at the time and the primary purpose of the club was to give students a chance to play outside of school and continue working on their game.

Since 2012, the club's current home has been at the Hartland Senior Center (M-59), technically in Howell. We are just about a quarter-mile west of US-23. The Senior Center entrance is on the west side of the building, and the building itself is both the offices for the Hartland School District and a Washtenaw Community College satellite campus.

annotated games appear usually weekly, as well as club news and player results in tournaments. We also post quite a list of club members that have performed well in tournaments.

We were very fortunate to find a place that welcomed us with open arms, asking only for voluntary donations to the Senior Center. Our members joined the Center (if senior enough) and donate when they can. Chess clubs cannot exist without wonderful people helping out – and the Hartland Senior Center certainly has.

Over time, we added more members to the club and eventually we had a good mix of beginners, intermediate, and advanced players of all different ages. **Jason Morris** returned to the club, as did **Ken Lambdin** and **Scott Marvel** who would go on to join our humble chess club afterwards and serve as some of the critical members in the early years.

Ken Lambdin became the 3rd LCCC club president and



presided over the club when Matt's career and starting a family limited his ability to run the club.

Unfortunately, "Howelling Coffee" closed its doors, but thanks to the efforts of **Ken**, we were able to reach an agreement with the owners of Jaz Deli (now Le Marsa) in Brighton located on

East Grand River Avenue on Monday October 11th 2010.

Around this time **Matt Trujillo** was introduced to a gentleman by the name of **Eric Wright** who was running a

chess club in South Lyon. Eric started encouraging his members to join LCCC on Monday evenings and eventually our clubs merged, which included **Paul Mills and Patrick Seaver**, who were the founding members of the South Lyon club and used to regularly attend our Monday sessions. Both Paul and Patrick, are good chess players, and are well-respected retired schools teachers.

We don't think chess clubs are bad luck, but the Jaz Deli also shut down and – again it was **Ken Lambdin** to the rescue - as he found the Barnes and Noble Bookstore at the Green Oaks Mall which agreed to take the club in – as long as we played on tables near their chess books! No problem!



More Club Action

This is when club regulars and current Club Officers: **Ken Tack, Vince Valente, Don Jones and our 4th Club President, Mike Nikitin** joined the club. With this fairly public location, new members began to show up regularly and it was quite often we had more players watching games than were able to play due to space restrictions.

It was then that our current club chess instructor and past Metro League player, **Terry Griner** and another member **Mike Keelan** stepped up and found us the Hartland Senior Center. This is our current home and just a dream spot to play chess!

Our club offers a Kid's Night on the 2^{nd} Monday of each month. This means that all the members are there to assist the young chess players by either smoothly pairing young opponents or giving them some one-on-one chess instruction, if they so desired.

This is the same location as the 1999 and 2011 Michigan Opens when it was called McGuire's. The hospitality and free breakfast were great all weekend. Previous events in Cadillac had slightly more than 100 in attendance.

The Open section consisted of 22 players and was dominated by Joshua Posthuma, who had just received his FIDE Master title. He only gave up a single draw out of his seven games.-J.A.





Alan Kaufman's Chess Experience and dedication to the Chess Community

- Alan started playing chess in 1956, learning at the age of 8.
- He taught chess in Southfield Schools such as his son's elementary school in the 1980's, as well as played in citywide clubs where he met Master John Brooks.
- As he played chess from a young age into young adulthood, he thought about and became an advocate for chess in schools in the state of Michigan.
- In 2003, Alan joined ICC (Internet Chess Club) and met Martha Fierro and brought her to Michigan. He wanted to change the culture of chess in South East/West Michigan.
- He also started going to the Skillman Library and DIA to watch kids from Detroit City Chess Club. He was very impressed by their talents under the direction of Mr. Kevin Fite.
- Adding to Alan's many talents, he started the Michigan Fall Festival around 2011.
- He has also been very supportive of other chess clubs, tournaments and anyone who he could help bring chess awareness to Michigan.
- He served as an MCA Board member in the past.
- In June of 2017 Mr. Kaufman donated over 500 Chess Books to the Skillman Library who dedicated a wing/section of the library just for chess books and related materials.
- In October of 2017 Alan arranged to bring GM Manual Leon Hoyos from Mexico (one of the greatest players ever from Mexico) to Michigan to attend tournaments, visit All The King's Men, speak at schools, meet with MCA, as well as, Young Detroit Thinkers, Detroit City Chess Club and lastly, Raymond Lozano. Raymond Lozano is past Executive Director of the Hispanic Chamber of Commerce of Michigan, and currently serves as Executive Director of Mexican Town Community Development. Raymond thinks chess will supplement and materially improve education, particularly in Southwest Detroit. It was stated and quoted that Ray was convinced that the visit by GM Hoyos to Detroit, with focus on Southwest Detroit, would "kick-start" the role of chess in the community's cultural life.
- Even now, Alan Kaufman continues to show his dedication to the chess community by sharing his knowledge and love of chess with all he meets. It is such a joy to see!



Dr. Edward Mandell's Chess Experience and dedication to the Chess Community

- All The King's Men started at Universal Mall around 1998 and has since expanded and moved to Roseville, MI within the last 4 years and most recently, to Warren.
- He learned to play chess at 8 years old from his father's friend, and he was inspired to play and learn more about chess.
- Dr. Mandell taught chess classes in schools, gave private lessons to beginners and employs instructors to teach chess.
- One of his biggest influences was Harold Steen who taught him about chess life, how to instruct others in the game and how to help inspire children by encouraging them to play. Harold would buy sets from Dr. Mandell to help bring chess equipment into schools. Because of Harold Steen, Dr. Mandell developed a respect and esteem for those around him who truly wanted to help others.
- The Motor City Open, started by Dr. Howard Gaba in the 1950's which a few people continued after his passing until 2001 when Dr. Mandell tried his hand at hosting the Motor City Open (his largest event) continuing the tradition.
- He has made significant contributions to the chess community for the last few decades.
- He attributes his ability to run chess tournaments by learning from Dr. Paul Grams, who impressed him, because he would never turn a child away who wanted to learn or play in a tournament. Always seeking to help, he would offen pay for them. When he saw people like Dr. Grams and Mr. Steen do this, he learned that helping kids who were less fortunate was a blessing, and would try to make the equipment and/or tournaments affordable.
- Dr. Mandell has also been very supportive of other chess clubs, tournaments and anyone who he can help bring chess awareness to Metro Detroit and the State of Michigan.
- Dr. Mandell has held chess classes in Detroit over the years and with this sometimes, families who could not pay for the child were still allowed to attend.
- He is very passionate about promoting chess and generate chess excitement in the community.
- In April of 2018, Dr. Mandell hosted the first Blitz competition between the "Motor City's" top players (from Metro Detroit) and "Wind City's" players (including Suburb and local Chicago area) at All The King's Men and it was on Facebook live, as well as, other social media.

The draw with Advait put me in tied 5th place, with 4 points out of 6 rounds. Together with **Michael Zheng** and **Sasha Konovalenko**, we tied for 5th place in the Barber, Denker, and NGTOC State Team Championship.

2018 National Girls' Tournament of Champions – July 28 – July 31, 2018

iddleton, Wisconsin was a great place to host **L** the National Girls' Tournament of Champions, as well as the Barber and Denker. The venue was spectacular, a grand-looking spacious and Marriott that would be home to chess players from July 28th to July 31st. Even though the city was new to me, I felt right at home. Possibly because there were trees and sidewalks like in Michigan cities and the familiar face of Brad Rogers that made Wisconsin feel a bit more recognizable. Or maybe it was just the growing excitement for the tournament to come.

This vear organizers brought a new twist to the opening ceremony rituals that normally came: putting each of representatives alphabetical order by state. The players present were strong at the game of chess. The same couldn't be said of our alphabetical skills. Once arranged as desired, the ceremony began at 3 PM, and everyone filed into a small ballroom where introductory speeches were made. Laughs burst out as the list of representatives was read out. It's always exciting to find out what new jokes the master of ceremony will come up with.

The first round at 7 PM the same night was calm. Playing as black, I was in no rush in the

Myopponent from opening. Connecticut slowly ran out of moves, eventually blundering a rook that would end the game in my favor. With a good start to the tournament, I felt like playing an aggressive game with white for the 2nd round. The opposing representative from Georgia had a chance to counter my threats out of the opening but didn't take the risk. Launching a kingside attack proved to be too much to defend for her, and she cracked under the weakness of her broken pawn structure.

My third round this year proved oddly similar to the one in the previous year. Beforehand, I'm talking to my friend Veronika, joking how horrifying it would be if we were paired against each other; we had drawn every game we had ever played together, sometimes by sheer luck. Of course when the pairings come out we were on the same board, and this time I was playing as black against the OK (Oklahoma, haha) player. The first few moves she played were those that followed one of my favorite lines in the Queen's Gambit, until she pushed a random pawn and crushed my hopes of a nice opening position. It was like wanting a pet unicorn; I knew things wouldn't go the way I planned, but I couldn't help but want them to. The game took a standard middlegame turn of

hanging pieces and attempting to win material to no avail. Eventually, I turned up with an extra bishop for two connected queenside passed pawns, but neither of us would be able to make progress or win, ending with the familiar sequence of events and another draw like last year.

Round 4 the next morning against a Floridian at first looked to be a draw. A queens' endgame with locked pawns didn't seem to have much potential – until I was up a pawn. An exciting king march followed, as my opponent hoped for perpetual check as I slowly moved up a passed pawn. It took walking the whole board 3 times with my king to finally promote my pawn to a queen and bring a victory. This launched me up to the top board, playing black against a Vietnamese WIM from Arizona. I had lost to her a year ago as white, so the change in color brought a new hope of improvement. Unfortunately, the opening was incredibly passive with no chance to break through in the position. The endgame didn't look to be in my favor, and there were only rooks and pawns, most likely to be theoretically drawn. We shuffled our pieces back and forth for a few moments before both agreeing that there would be no progress.

paired as black (the 4th time) against top seed NM Martha Samadashvili. had preparing a new opening for a while, only to be completely lost not losing, but confused - within the first couple moves of the game. With no certain plan in mind besides getting through the game, I played how I wanted to, doing an artificial castle while locking in her pawns. Towards the end I gave up a pawn to go for a rook endgame that would be drawn, and it was, until I missed the only saving move that would take me through another king journey across the board. She outplayed me in the endgame and took the win.

In the end, the 2018 NGTOC was an unforgettable experience. Seeing old friends and making new ones was amazing, and every game I played brought a new lesson to learn. Four out of six points got me to 8th place. The Michigan team placed 7th overall due to team effort from **Ben Li**, **Michael Zheng**, and me. I would like to thank the MCA for their support that got me to this tournament, and I'd like to thank my family for cheering me on!

Halfway through, result was already terrible enough for me, but I made it worse. The fourth round I was playing against Tennessee's representative. Sadly, for various reasons, I was not able to convert a tangible advantage. Therefore, the game ended up in a draw The Michigan again. other representatives (Denker NGTOC) were doing much better than me at this point. I decided not to get too depressed and to treat each game as round 1. Before the start of round 5, Mr. Rogers stopped by my board and

wished me "Good luck." I was playing the champion Kentucky. Even though I was tired, super Ι was more determined than ever to win the game! The final round I got to play against a very strong player from Maryland who had drawn a couple of the top seeds in the event. But I came back to my full strength and I was brave. Move by move, I advanced to my victory! Because of this game, I won the "biggest upset" award for that round! And thanks to my come back, I was able to be tied for the 6th place!

Chris still follows chess, plays on chess.com, and occasionally coaches. To help with annotations, he uses Chessbase and Stockfish.

Just returned from working in Australia, Dr. Jason Morris has been playing chess since he was 9 - (Thanks mom for teaching me!). He was and still is a HUGE Fischer "fanboy". His other favorite players are (in no particular order) Ivanchuck, Shirov, Morozevich, and Nakamura. His highest USCF rating was 2120, and has been a rated expert for 30 years - in his own words: "not because I'm stupid, but because I just don't have time to study and play anymore!"). His best chess result was probably going 5 wins - 1 loss - 0 daws at the 1992 Pan Am College Team Tournament, where the Michigan Technological University team that he captained won clear 2nd place. Currently sporting a 2041 USCF rating, Dr. Morris laments: "Unfortunately, life interferes with me getting any better, but who knows?"



Posthuma Perfect at 2018 MICHIGAN Invitational

For the first time in some time the MI Invitational was held and was dominated wire -to-wire by Josh Posthuma. Josh swept the field with a perfect 9-0-0, and he pushed his FIDE Rating over 2300 in the process to earm the FM title. Coming in second place was FM Seth Homa. Every round was contested, and there were many exciting games with the G/90; i30 time control.

The event was directed by NA Brad Rogers, and in the process has earned the final FIDE Arbiter Norm, and has since been awarded the FA title.


